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

Message from Father Apostolos

Not up for Discussion



The long-established publication *Christianity Today* just released the results of its annual "State of Theology" survey which tracks the adherence of respondents to foundational Christian doctrines such as the Divinity of Jesus Christ, the Holy Trinity, Salvation, and Moral teachings.

Survey responses were consistent with recent trends. However, the acceleration of these trends was troubling. For instance, 56% of Evangelical respondents indicated a belief that Jesus Christ is <u>not</u> the only way to Heaven. This reflects the heresy of Universalism ("apokatastasis" in Greek) espoused by Origen of Alexandria and denounced by the Holy Fathers in 553AD at the 2nd Ecumenical Council of Constantinople.

More troubling, 75% of Evangelical respondents expressed a belief in the statement Jesus is the first and greatest being *created by God.*" This heretical notion is bald-faced Arianism which was dispatched by the Holy Fathers of the Church, e.g. Sts. Athanasius, Alexander, Nicholas, Anthony, and Spyridon, at the 1st Ecumenical Council in Nicaea in 325AD. Further, 43% of respondents *denied* the Divinity of Jesus Christ altogether. (Arianism again!)

Among the many other disturbing results uncovered; 68% affirm that worshiping in a parish is *not* necessary; 53% doubt the accuracy of Holy Scripture; 48% agreeing with the statement that God *learns and adapts* to different circumstances, hence is mutable and imperfect (!) We may be tempted to dismiss such surveys as irrelevant to us as Orthodox Christians, but we would be unwise to do so.

Holy Orthodoxy has always faced a headwind in our American culture antithetical to the Ancient Christian Faith. And as successive waves of Orthodox faithful from our native lands have become successively Americanized, our grasp of essential Orthodox doctrines has successively slipped.

Much of this disintegration can be attributed to the cult of the "individual" which elevates all views, all opinions, all hermeneutics (how truth is discerned from error) to equal status, especially on social media platforms.

The term "individual" is nowhere to be found in Holy Scripture, the Greek synonym ιδιατης from which the word "idiot" is derived, being the nearest approximation and signifying one who isolates oneself. We do speak frequently of personhood and even ascribe the term to the Godhead Who has revealed Himself is a Trinity of Divine Persons.

Embarking upon my catechumenate period ages ago, I was immediately struck by two aspects of Orthodox theology: its intellectual honesty and its internal consistency. Escaping the subjectivity of the Evangelical world, I found solace in the 2,000-year preservation and application of the "truth once delivered to the saints" (Jude 1:3)

In the ensuing years, it has been ever reinforced that one must not supplant the teachings of the Orthodox Church with one's own private views. As is often stated, the articles of the Nicene Creed (which comprise the basis for our Parish-wide Faith and Family catechism lessons) are not presented salad-bar style. We cannot simply pick and choose what teachings we will and will not embrace.

One cannot credibly refer to oneself as an Orthodox Christian while rejecting the essential and non-negotiable elements of Orthodox teaching as outlined above. We must exercise extreme caution when tempted to follow this or that popular modern "preacher" on social media.

Responsible and serious-minded Orthodox adherents must avail themselves of the educational and catechetical opportunities provided in the local parish and must reinforce them by reading solid Orthodox theological writings. Especially in the din of competing voices and the blur of images racing past us, consistent and ongoing study of our Faith is indispensable.

To be a disciple of Jesus Christ is to be a lifelong student. Thank God we enjoy many opportunities to enrich our knowledge of Holy Orthodoxy here at Holy Trinity Cathedral; Catechism and Bible Study classes, Faith and Family Catechism and supporting materials, our Young Adult Reading Ministry, and the Lending Library in the Narthex.

May we avail ourselves of these opportunities as faithful Orthodox Christians and embody the purity of the Gospel message in the bosom of the Church!

There are far too many parishioners who put in countless hours, take time off of work and even vacation days to help set up, prepare, cook, bake, organize and volunteer at our Festival. This is all done side-by-side, working together for the greater good. Our Festival is our church's largest fundraiser. In addition, it invites people onto the grounds of our church community and gives them a glimpse of what a true church family looks like. Clearly, our Festival is a beautiful example of the true meaning of Stewardship.

Endowment Fund



THE HOLY TRINITY CATHEDRAL ENDOWMENT FUND



The Holy Trinity Endowment Fund was established in 1992 with an initial deposit of \$2,000. The goal was to build the Endowment Fund whereby the interest and appreciation would one day provide sufficient income so Holy Trinity would no longer be totally dependent on an annual festival to supplement stewardship income.

The Endowment Fund is obligated to preserve the donor's contributions such that the principal will remain inviolate and be held in perpetuity by the Church. The funds are prudently managed by the investment committee, which reports to the Parish Council. The investment committee only approves withdrawals from the earnings and appreciation, over and above the donor's contributions, and are used only to benefit Holy Trinity and its ministries.

Over the course of the past twenty-nine years the committee has held steadfast to this mission, and as a result, generous donors from our Church, desiring to leave a legacy in perpetuity for their family, have made contributions totaling \$644,340.00.

This is your opportunity to put your lifetime thumbprint in the history of Holy Trinity Cathedral.

We have been blessed by the generosity and foresight of the individuals and families listed on the next page. We benefit today from their kindness and vision. If your circumstances allow you to give a gift above and beyond your annual stewardship commitment, then please take this occasion to join the others in creating a legacy by pledging your gift to Holy Trinity Cathedral's perpetual Endowment Fund. Gifts of \$10,000 or more will be separately listed along with others who have reached that level.

Your gift, no matter the amount will be combined into the general endowment fund, and will be greatly appreciated.

The simple and smart way to give a portion of your estate to Holy Trinity: ask your banker, broker, realtor, life insurance agent to simply put a TOD or POD designation on your property or account, and select the percent of that account you wish to pass to Holy Trinity. TOD= transfer on death, POD= payable on death. This designation will transfer that percentage to Holy Trinity, on your passing, and avoid costly probate.

Sunday School Is Now '4F'

New Mode of Religious Education!

Dear Parents and Students of Holy Trinity Cathedral,

As the School Year is somehow already upon us, we are so excited to begin our new year of Youth Ministry here at Holy Trinity with some invigorating new opportunities for all ages.



For a great confluence of reasons we are changing up our usual model of Sunday School. It is no secret that our numbers in Sunday School have dwindled more and more in the last decade. This is not something we have done wrong but a universal fact in almost all parishes across the country, Orthodox and non-Orthodox. There is a lack of student attendance, parent commitment, and volunteers to even make the most simple class function. We had wonderful teachers last year, new curriculum, used only our Education Building Classrooms and yet still many went through weeks at a time of having no more than 2-3 students. We do not have the manpower to execute Sunday School in it's traditional form this year week in and week out. Knowing this, we aren't throwing in the towel and quitting but we *must* try something different to find what works so we can instruct our children in their faith and guide them to salvation.

After speaking to a few different parishes with their alternatives to Sunday School we've moved that the main event for the spiritual education of our youth at the church will now take place on the 3rd Saturday of every month (you can give your feedback on the time below). On these Saturdays we will have three 45 minute sessions that will give about the same amount of education time as the old model of Sunday School. Because of this shift, your child's attendance at each meeting is *critical*, please make every effort to make these the priority of your day.

Please mark these dates in **bold** on your calendar:

October 15: The Saints

November 19: Gratitude and Eucharist

December 17: Christmas **January 21:** The Sacraments **February 25:** Life in Christ March 18: Lenten Retreat

April 8: Lazarus Saturday Breakfast and Holy Week Retreat (After Lazarus Saturday Liturgy)

May 6: Commands of Christ



To add to this, we will also be catechized as an entire parish at the end of every Sunday **Divine Liturgy before the Dismissal.** Fr. Apostolos and Fr. Alexander will continue to offer the homily in it's proper place after the Gospel (but a bit shortened) and whichever priest is not preaching (and sometimes a guest speaker) will offer to the community a 5-10 minute lesson at the conclusion of Divine Liturgy for all to benefit from. This lesson time will allow us to methodically work through The Nicene Creed, the center of our faith, as a whole community. The bulletin will include discussion points based on the lesson for a family to discuss on the way home. Liturgy will then be concluded

and all can enjoy Fellowship Hour together as a community.

We will also be including a handout "Church in the Home" to foster discussion about that Sunday's Gospel reading and how we can apply it in our lives.

Next week we will follow this with another email discussing the vast array of other ministries that will be offered here at Holy Trinity to supplement your family's growth in Christ and His Church.

St. Nicodemas Book Discussion Club

Pan-Orthodox Book Discussion Club

This month, we launched our fall potluck and discussion series with a talk by Fr. Apostolos Hill on "Cultivating a Life of Prayer". Twenty Orthodox young adults from 18-35 gathered at Holy Trinity Cathedral for an evening of fellowship and conversation. After enjoying a delicious meal together, we heard Father's presentation on the aspects of developing a prayer rule that can be memorized and be done spontaneously. We learned about the importance of making peace with silence and how both intentionality and stillness help us to enter into prayer. An important takeaway was that prayer rules can be short, even just 3 minutes; however, creating the discipline of giving 3 minutes of intentional time to God daily, even if we are tired, is of great spiritual benefit. At the end, we had a brief small-group discussion and prayer ropes were distributed to anyone who wanted them. If

anyone, young adult or not, would like a prayer rope, please see Fr. Apostolos.

Seven parishes were represented at the September gathering! On October 23rd, we will have a featured speaker, Mr. Sam Herron, and panel discussion on the topic of "Music Ministry in the Church". <u>All young adults, whether they are part of the club or not, are welcome to attend our monthly potlucks!</u>

We also welcomed Fr. Jacob Saylor and Fr. Jeffrey Frate to our spiritual advisory board. They will be joining Fr. Apostolos Hill and Fr. Alexander Eliades in overseeing our virtual meeting and participating in the potlucks, as their schedule permits. Book Reviews

"Way of the Ascetics" by Tito Colliander Submitted by Justin

A compelling and concise guide to asceticism, summarizing the work of the fathers.

I especially love how concise it is. It is easy to read and every sentence is rich and meaningful. The book and each of the chapters are very short. It compels you to challenge yourself and lays out the tools one needs for spiritual warfare, pulling from the fathers of The Church.

"Orthodoxy and Heterodoxy" by Andrew Stephen Damick Submitted by Tyson

Explores the differences between major sects of Christianity and other major religions and the Orthodox Church.

I think it is an excellent read, for anyone from cradle Orthodox to non-Orthodox, since it gives consideration to many other religions while succinctly describing the Orthodox faith. It is not an apologetic work, and was not supposed to be, but it does help Orthodox Christians understand who they may interact with, as well as provide some evangelistic teachings. I especially love how it promotes *living* the faith more than merely talking about it, as that is a potential pitfall when engaging with this topic.

On Wealth and Poverty, by St. John Chrysostom Submitted by Nick Marino

Explains what the rich and poor should do respectively for their salvation by deeply examining the parable of The Rich Man and Lazarus.

This book contains 7 sermons that St John gave about The Rich Man and Lazarus. A couple of themes include: (a) how everything will be inverted in the Kingdom of God when it comes to wealth and poverty, (b) how in this world we are all merely actors, and our true selves will be revealed at the time of our judgment. I highly recommend this book because it teaches what each group needs to do to make it into the kingdom of God. For the rich, it's ensuring that you give alms to the poor and not use your money for a decadent lifestyle. For the poor, it's not despairing in your state of poverty within this world and enduring with patience. My only issue with the book is, as with a lot of St. John's sermons, it can be hard to follow at times because he either goes on tangents (though these are related to the main topic) and/or he spends a lot of time saying that he is emphasizing a certain point before making said point.

"The Institutes: Twelve Books on the Cenobitic Monasteries and the Remedies for the Eight Principal Passions" by St. John Cassian Submitted by Mary Pardhe

A handbook on monastic life followed by an explanation of the eight principal passions and ways to overcome them.

The first part of the book was intended to be a guidebook for monasteries that sought to be patterned after the life of the Egyptian desert monastics. The discussion on the daily prayer cycle was especially valuable since it discussed the spiritual significance behind the prayers done at each hour. The last eight chapters discuss the eight principal passions and provide practical guidance on how to overcome them.

"The Jesus Prayer for Those Living in the World by St. John Cassian Submitted by Max Lang

Fr. Stephanos is a spiritual child of Geronda Ephraim and gives instructions on the Hesychastic tradition of the Church for people who are not monastics. This has inspired me and helped me better understand the Jesus Prayer. I really appreciate the practical element of this book as well as all the examples given in various first-hand accounts.

Saint Thomas the Holy and Glorious Apostle

Commemorated on October 6



The Holy and Glorious Apostle Thomas was born in the Galilean city of Pansada and was a fisherman. Hearing the good tidings of Jesus Christ, he left all and followed after Him. The Apostle Thomas is included in the number of the holy Twelve Apostles of the Savior.

According to Holy Scripture, the holy Apostle Thomas did not believe the reports of the other disciples about the Resurrection of Jesus Christ: "Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25).

On the eighth day after the Resurrection, the Lord appeared to the Apostle Thomas and showed him His wounds. "My Lord and my God," the Apostle cried out (John 20:28). "Thomas, being once weaker in faith than the other apostles," says Saint


John Chrysostom, "toiled through the grace of God more bravely, more zealously and tirelessly than them all, so that he went preaching over nearly all the earth, not fearing to proclaim the Word of God to savage nations."

Some icons depicting this event are inscribed "The Doubting Thomas." This is incorrect. In Greek, the inscription reads, "The Touching of Thomas." In Slavonic, it says, "The Belief of Thomas." When Saint Thomas touched the Life-giving side of the Lord, he no longer had any doubts.


According to Church Tradition, the holy Apostle Thomas founded Christian churches in Palestine, Mesopotamia, Parthia, Ethiopia and India. Preaching the Gospel earned him a martyr's death. For having converted the wife and son of the prefect of the Indian city of Meliapur [Melipur], the holy apostle was locked up in prison, suffered torture, and finally, pierced with five spears, he departed to the Lord. Part of the relics of the holy Apostle Thomas are in India, in Hungary and on Mt. Athos.
