A Message from Father Apostolos

The Bells of Christmas Day



The American poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was acquainted with tragedy. Rising to prominence in the years before the American Civil War, Longfellow's gifts were skillfully deployed to assuage his own grief of personal loss and that of the nation writhing under the lash of destructive violence. Twin catastrophes struck the Longfellow home when his beloved 2nd wife of 18 years perished in a house fire, and when his eldest son, Charles, enlisted against his father's wishes in the Union army.

Among the many poetic contributions of Longfellow's career, the carol "I heard the Bells on Christmas Day," published in February of 1865, retains its place in American hearts. The carol begins with a hopeful note;

I heard the bells on Christmas Day Their old, familiar carols play, and mild and sweet The words repeat

Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And thought how, as the day had come, The belfries of all Christendom Had rolled along The unbroken song
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

But the wrenching impact of a country at war with itself cannot be ignored as Longfellow describes the mockery being made of any appeal to the Prince of Peace whose birth is celebrated at Christmas.



It was as if an earthquake rent The hearth-stones of a continent, And made forlorn The households born Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And in despair I bowed my head; "There is no peace on earth," I said; "For hate is strong, And mocks the song Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"

Indeed, hatred, biases, bigotries, and divisions seems unassailably strong and deeply entrenched, now as then, and violate the sacrifices made by many of our forebears who valiantly served in the US armed forces to neutralize the fetid wells that periodically gush forth such darkness. As we espy the many conflicts raging within and without our nation, we can relate to the lines "And in despair I bowed my head, 'there is no peace on earth,' I said..."

And yet, we hear the stirring words of the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ announced by angels to shepherd boys "Glory to God in the highest, Peace on earth, goodwill to all people." Are such words as these just maudlin pleasantries or do they still apply? Jesus comforted His Disciples when He told them, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid."

Despite such assurances, fear stalks the land as hatreds abound in the breathtaking idiocy of public discourse.

A Message from Father Apostolos, continued

If we read Jesus' words carefully, however, we note the difference between the world's "peace" and the Peace He gives us. The Beatitudes include the blessing "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the sons of God." Peace, then is not the mere absence of conflict, but the positive presence of the Divine. Indeed, Peace is included in the spiritual gifts listed by St. Paul; "But the Fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, goodness, patience, gentleness, and self-control."

Upon reading this list, we are struck with the realization that these Divine Gifts are frequently disparaged nowadays as weak, outmoded, and insufficient. The *Pax Romana*, or the "Peace of Rome, was experienced very differently by those who wielded violent authority and those against whom it was wielded. Yet, Jesus promises us that even as the world, having rejected Him, or - worse, having crafted a false "christ" in its own shattered image - shudders under the consequence of this rejection, we can still walk in His peace.

"I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." Our peace rests in the sure knowledge of how the story ends. If the summation of our every hope and dream is mundane and earthbound, then anxiety and dread are the logical response to the events that cast long shadows over humanity today. But as citizens of the "city not made made by human hands, eternal in the Heavens," we can live in the grace of the Prophet Isaiah's encouragement; "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is fixed on Thee because he trusteth in Thee."

Just as Peter strolled across the roiling surface of the Sea of Galilee in the storm, his eyes fixed on Jesus Christ in the deep darkness, we too can walk on the waves amidst the tempest so long as we keep our eyes on Him. And, like Peter, we will begin to sink under the waves if, instead, we look away from Him and fix our gaze on the waves. Likewise, if we cast our eyes back to Sodom and Gomorrah as did the wife of Lot, for which glance she was - as God had warned - turned into a pillar of salt, there is a price to be paid.

Finding shelter in any storm is essential. Coherent souls do not remain outdoors in the gale, but seek shelter and safety as lightning strikes. The Holy Church of Jesus Christ is our shelter and to remain outside this shelter in the teeth of the storm now upon us bespeaks an astonishing lack of coherence and sanity. We can rest secure in the embrace of Mother Church as devoted children in the healing atmosphere of prayer.

Wadsworth's carol finishes on a hopeful note as he recalls that God reigns supreme and His position on the Everlasting Throne is secure. Peace will win out in the end after wayward humanity has exhausted itself in pursuit of conflict and self-flagellation.

"God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail, With peace on earth, good-will to men."

May we embrace this season of the Coming of the Prince of Peace in positive and sensible ways. Unplug! Filter out the many sources of contrived and curated "news" which only unsettle us and keep us locked in a dreadful space of dispirited hopelessness. Give yourself and your family the gift of Peace this Christmas. Choose not to be manipulated by the algorithm of Meta and Google. Robert Louis Stevenson once wrote "Sooner or later, we will all sit down to a banquet of consequences." Quote so. But we need not be spectators to this grim spectacle.

"God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; the wrong will fail, the right prevail, with peace on earth, goodwill to men."



Step 3: Complete the paper pledge card and mail to the church office or bring to Stewardship Sunday to be blessed at the altar.



STEWARDSHIP 101 FAQs



Q: Why do I need to fill out a new pledge card every year?

A: This is a question I get asked a lot by both new and established parishioners. While it may seem repetitive to some, there is a method to the madness I promise you!

First, it's important to understand that this is standard practice at most churches and definitely the established protocol at all Greek Orthodox churches. This is an expectation set forth not by Holy Trinity, but by the Archdiocese.

Why is this an Archdiocese protocol, you may ask? Because it is important that once a year we take a moment to reflect and take stock on our financial commitment to our church.

Our circumstances change. We may move, change jobs, start a family, become empty nesters or retire and thus, our financial situation changes as well. Our annual commitment should reflect this.

Q: How much should I pledge?

A: The Bible is clear and asks us to tithe which is giving 10% of our income to the church. We lovingly ask that each of us give our "fair share." If you can afford to give more we hope you feel called to do so. For those who are unable then we ask that you give what you can. Each year, it is important that we take a moment to truly reflect on our financial commitment and give sacrificially. This is one of the most significant aspects of why our Stewardship is done on an annual basis.

Q: Why do I need to be a Steward?

A: In order to be a "steward in good standing" one must complete a pledge card each year and make a financial contribution toward that pledge.

One must be a "Steward in good standing" in order to vote during a parish assembly, run for a seat on the parish council or be an officer in a church ministry.

The Archdiocese understands that when we are invested financially in our parish we are more active and involved.

"For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Matthew 6:21

Q: Is Stewardship just about financial giving?

A: Stewardship is made up of three components - time, talent and treasure. In order to be fully engaged and committed to our parish we are called to give not just financially but also of our time and lending our talents to the church when and where they are needed. When we are regularly attending services, active in the ministries and life of the parish and practicing sacrificial financial giving, we then realize the full benefits of being an Orthodox Christian.



All 11-12 Graders who wish to participate will be assigned a classroom to volunteer in as an assistant teacher.


