Ben Is Back in Town

After five silent years, and at a cost of 81 million pounds for repairs, Big

Ben is once again bonging from its home in the Elizabeth Tower in Parliament Square. Though seen and heard by millions over the years, most people are unfamiliar with its history and mystery.



- Big Ben's gongs were first broadcast on BBC on New Years Eve in 1923.
- No one really knows why it's called Big Ben. One theory says it as named after heavy-weight boxer Benjamin Caunt, a celebrity at the time.
- At one time the British government planned to use fake Big Ben bongs during World War II to confuse enemy planes trying to find Westminster.
- The clock is still adjusted using pre-decimal pennies. Adding one penny to the pendulum causes the clock to gain two-fifths of a second in 24 hours.
- ♦ The clock is hand-wound three times a week. Each winding takes about 15 hours to complete.



Things You May Not Know about the New King

Things not widely known about King Charles III include:

- His Majesty founded The Prince's Trust with his Navy severance pay of just over £7000 in 1976. The charity has now supported over one million young people. We visited the Trust on our first tour in 2007.
- The King, as Prince of Wales, was given the title, 'Keeper of the Cows,' by the Masai in Tanzania in 2011 to recognize his work as a farmer.
- ♦ A champion of environmental issues for over 50 years, The King first spoke publicly about his concerns on pollution and plastics and their impact on the natural world in 1970.
- ♦ In 1975, His Majesty became a member of the Magic Circle, a society of stage magicians founded in London in 1905, after passing his audition with a magic trick.
- The King purchased an Aston Martin DB6 Mark 2 Volante in November 1970, which has since been converted to run on E85 bioethanol made from by-products of the wine and cheese industries.




This Month's Book Recommendation

The Sweetness at the Bottom of the Pie by Alan Bradley, National Geographic Books, 2010

Flavia de Luce is a precocious 11-year-old and amateur sleuth. In the summer of 1950, she discovers a dead bird with a stamp affixed to its beak at the front door. Soon thereafter she finds a dead man in the garden.

Flavia finds such mysterious goings-on exciting. "I wish I could say I was afraid, but I wasn't. Quite the contrary. This was by far the most interesting thing that had ever happened to me in my entire life."

Readers follow her investigation as she battles with her mean older sisters and fights to clear her father of a murder charge.



Set in the English countryside, this coming of age novel has received multiple awards, including the Crime Writers' Association Debut Dagger Award, the Dilys Award, the Arthur Ellis Award, the Agatha Award, the Macavity Award, and the Barry Award, and was nominated for the Anthony Award. It's subsequently been translated into multiple languages.

Meet Nicola Beauman by Joanna Valentine

As any seasoned traveler will tell you, the people we meet are often the best thing about travel. Here's a profile of one of the most extraordinary people we've met on our tours: Nicola Beauman, founder and owner of Persephone Books.



We eagerly anticipate the delivery of the monthly newsletter from Nicola Beauman. Always beautifully written and full of references to other material, her newsletter gives us a sense of calm and the will not only to carry on, but to fight the good fight.

Ms. Beauman will turn 80 next year, and she will also celebrate two important milestones – the 25th anniversary of the publication of the first book by Persephone Books and their reaching 150 titles. The books have all have a distinctive gray cover with designer prints for the endpapers and bookmarks.

Their authors are "forgotten women" writers from the 20th century.

In May of 2022, we stopped in to visit and have a discussion of a collection of short stories. Ms.Beauman had prepared tea with homemade scones. She sat with the office dog in her lap as she spoke to us of writing and her life. She asked us to each tell her what a typical day in our lives was like. It was a charming and memorable afternoon, and none of us left without a book, a shopping bag, or other souvenir from the store.

The Full Monty Series

The Full Monty stars Robert Carlyle, Mark Addy and Tom Wilkinson reunite in a new TV series set 25 years after the hit movie.

Peter Cattaneo's 1997 comedy followed an unlikely group of men who turned to stripping to earn a living after the steel mill they worked in shut down.

It won an Oscar for best original musical or comedy score and was nominated for three others, including best picture and best director.

The eight-part series will launch on Disney+ on June 14.

The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry

Retired pensioner Harold Fry lives in Kingsbridge with his wife Maureen, whose marriage to him has become despondent and quiet. One day, Harold receives a letter from his old friend, Queenie Hennessy, who is dying from cancer and is living in a hospice in northern England.

Harold then decides to walk the length of England to reach Queenie in Berwick-upon-Tweed without the use of transport or support from Maureen. Along his 450 mile journey he encounters a variety of people who show interest in his hiking achievement. As he walks he reflects on his life and we learn his and Queenie's story.
