THIS MAY BE A PERFECT TIME TO START A VICTORY GARDEN

Victory gardens, were also called war gardens or food gardens for defense. They were vegetable, fruit, and herb gardens planted at private residences and public parks in the United States during World War I and World War II. In the war time, governments encouraged people to plant victory gardens not only to supplement their rations but also to boost morale. Besides indirectly aiding the war effort, these gardens were also considered a "morale booster" in that gardeners could feel empowered by their contribution and rewarded by the produce grown. This made victory gardens a part of daily life on the home front.

I have many memories of my grandmother's vegetable garden at her summer home near Sonoma. She loved going there just to work in the garden. She had everything from vegetables to fruit trees. The family enjoyed the tomatoes and the string beans as well as enjoying the jam she made from the peaches on her peach tree. That was quite a garden that she had and it all started with a few seeds.

During this current corona virus crisis, the idea of a Victory Garden is making a come-back. With the beautiful weather we're experiencing, home-grown vegetable gardens are spiking in popularity once again. Right now, Grocerv shopping requires careful planning and some stores are selling out of basics. While being stuck at home, gardening can be fulfilling and a relaxing hobby. Go online to Victory Gardens and check it out.

What to Do

You can start planting seeds indoors using egg cartons, muffin tins and tin cans to start as long as there is adequate drainage and enough space to get the root system started.

You'll want to follow the specific seed starting instructions for the type of seeds you bought

1. Make sure the containers have drainage holes

2. If possible, plant your seeds in seed starting mix, which typically doesn't contain soil.

3.Plant the seedlings at the right depth- check the seed packet to make sure.

Place the containers in a warm area. The top of a refrigerator is a popular spot (Note: But once seedlings) emerge, you'll want to move them to a cooler, yet sunnier spot)

How to Transplant Seedlings

Once the seedlings are thriving, you'll need to transfer them to larger containers or plant in soil outdoors. If you're considering a container vegetable garden check which vegetables and herbs are good for small spaces. If you don't have an outdoor space, a sunny windowsill or kitchen counter can hold a thriving herb garden. Being in the garden is a peaceful, tranquil time whether creating an herb garden or just planting spring flowers to enjoy through the summer. "Goditi il tuo Giardino"

CHICKEN AND CARCIOFO ARTICHOKE BAKE

Betty Battaglia

3 to 4 chicken breasts Olive oil Chopped parsley

1 chopped tomato 1 c. sliced mushrooms 3 to 4 sliced baby artichokes 2 to 3 cloves chopped garlic 1/2 c. wine or chicken broth

Saute 3 to 4 chicken breasts in olive oil till brown. Place in 350° oven for 30 to 40 minutes. Make a sofritto of a handful of chopped parsley and 2 to 3 cloves chopped garlic. Saute in oil. Add 1 chopped tomato (removing seeds), 1 cup sliced mushrooms, 3 to 4 sliced baby artichokes. Add 1/2 cup approximately of wine or chicken broth. Cook till artichokes are cooked but firm. Pour over baking chicken breasts the last five minutes and loosely cover with foil. Serve.

From Sewing to Fight Cancer to Stitching to Fight COVID-19

Regina Bortolus epitomizes the humble 'angel' among us. As a member of Mani di Angeli, a group within the *Italian American Women's Guild* comprised of Bay Area women, she has led a group of dedicated women who have spent many hours creating and sewing dolls for pediatric wards at local hospitals and heart pillows for new-ly diagnosed cancer patients that are clients of BACC.

In the midst of COVID-19, Regina, the lead seamstress for the group has pivoted her talents to help fight the spread of the disease. The idea to make the masks came from her friend, Lubiana, also a member of Mani di Angeli, whose daughter works at Kaiser and told her mother the dire need for masks for their nurses and doctors. Copying the medically approved model of the mask, she has produced more than 200 masks to share with Kaiser, Mills Peninsula and Stanford Hospitals.

"I am a seamstress by trade and this is helping keep me sane," Regina said. "I have not been out in 4 weeks, but my gracious neighbors have been delivering my supplies and groceries."

She has been especially resourceful in finding supplies to make the masks from covered wire in the garden supply box to gathering elastic from her daughter who works at Joann's Fabrics.

The Kaiser staff has been extremely thankful and even offered to pay Regina, who replied, "Just say a prayer for me."

BACC nominated **Mani di Angeli** as our coveted Volunteer Group of the Year in 2019, because of the work they do sharing hundreds of hearts pillows for our clients each year to use under their arms after they have had a mastectomy, lumpectomy or for added comfort while they are receiving chemotherapy. They are wonderful support for our entire community.


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


