

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Safety Officer's Report

Stress-Free Docking by David Steele, San Jose Sailing Club

The biggest source of anxiety, frustration, hull damage, trial and error, strategizing, discussion and conflict has been docking. I finally found a docking technique that's almost effortless and fail-safe. I'm embarrassed to admit that I stumbled across this technique a few years ago but dismissed it as a hassle to set up (in reality, it isn't).

Using a Stern Bridle for Stress-Free Docking

Setup Step 1: When setting up the boat for docking, set up a line attached to the boat at the mid cleat. Don't have a mid cleat? You can use any mid or forward attachment point such as a shackle on your toe rail, jib fairlead, or even your bow cleat. This is the standing/bitter end.

Setup Step 2: Run the line outboard somewhere aft, such as your aft cleat, sheet turning block, etc. This line must run free, so using a snatch block, existing sheet block, shackle, or even running through the middle of the aft cleat horn will work.

Setup Step 3: Bring the line to your cockpit sheet winch and give it a few wraps. This is the running end. It only takes a minute or two to set up while getting fenders and lines ready for docking.

Docking Step 1: Make sure you have enough slack to lasso your dock cleat (10-15 feet of line in your hands should do it). If you're single handing, place this slack in a location ready to deploy without falling into the water. If you have a helper they will position themselves to lasso the cleat and you will give them slack from the running end on your sheet winch until they have enough.

Docking Step 2: Approach your dock as normal, however with this technique you don't have to worry about the boat being too far from the finger to step/jump off, so you can give yourself lots of room and avoid hull scrapes.

Docking Step 3: When even with the outermost dock cleat, simply throw the line over it. Just hold the bight in outstretched hands with a coil or two in each hand and toss over the cleat. If you're single handing, you would leave the cockpit briefly to do this and immediately return to the cockpit. If you have a helper, at this point their job is done. If you miss the cleat, no problem, retrieve the slack/bight and toss again. This can easily snag a dock cleat from 6-10 feet away if needed. Be sure the running end is secured/cleated at the winch while doing this step.

Docking Step 4: From the cockpit, pull the running end (wrapped around the sheet winch) until the boat is against the dock then cleat it. You can use your winch handle if needed.

Docking Step 5: Unless you're docking downwind or the wind is pushing you onto the dock, put your engine in forward idle and the boat will stay against the dock allowing you or your helper to step off safely at your leisure to secure the dock lines. And that's it!

The ability to keep your boat in position against the dock safely while single handing or with crew can greatly decrease risk of injury to yourself, your crew, your boat, your neighbor's boat, the dock, and anything on the dock. While these instructions might seem wordy and complicated when breaking it down, this docking technique is actually simple and easy to execute. Give it a try!

Yachty Things

Naughty Cal Corner

Have you ever noticed the device in the SBYC parking lot right next to the clubhouse wall? It is about 3' high and painted white, with two handles. Your correspondent, Wind Lass, thought it was time to explain what a windlass is, and the difference between a windlass and a capstan.

Our device was made by the Hyde Windlass Company (active from 1895 to 1969) in Bath, Maine, and it works! If you try it, make sure you wind it the right way, so the ratchet works. The heavy iron pieces drop into and engage on the sprocket so that it can't go backwards. You might want to have a second person help you turn it, to avoid injury, as it is quite hard work. Most likely, ours was used to raise the anchor on a sailing ship. Does anyone know where it came from and/or how the SBYC got it?

The difference between a capstan and a windlass is that a capstan has a vertical axle, and a windlass has a horizontal axle, so that although our "relic" is made by the Hyde Windlass Company, it is in fact a capstan. (They made both!) A modern-day winch, on a keelboat perhaps, is a small form of a capstan.
