Saturday, May 24 High Tide at 11:10am 7.09 ft




Thank You!

Sea Scout Ship 300, a charter of the SBYC

Our spring quiz fundraiser earned the Ship \$220, to be put towards a small RIB (Rigid Inflatable Boat) and engine, for safety on the slough. No one correctly answered all 100 questions, but Kathleen Hall had 91 correct, Matthew Blum had 93 correct, and Elliot Snethin had 95 correct. Among the answers that stumped many was the name of the ship that hit the bridge in Baltimore in 1980, the "Blue Nagoya" (not "Dali," which was much more recent), and the action that a dinghy can do but a yacht cannot, and leads to the definition of a dinghy, is having a retractable centerboard. Intriguing answers included "being used as a tender," "being launched from a beach," and my favorite answer: "being paid for in installments." Thank you to all who contributed and played.

Our first outing of the month was to History Park in San Jose for the annual Scout-o-Rama event. This brings together all levels/branches of scouting: Cub Scouts, Scouts, Venturers, Explorers, and Sea Scouts from the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council area, which covers Palo Alto to Parkfield. There were, literally, hundreds of Scouts and families. The program started with a parade of flags. Notice which group led the parade by clever maneuvering. Yes, Ship 300!



Our booth included a sailing yacht (Lisa's new West Wight Potter), a kayak, and a magnet fishing game, which proved very popular. All booths were judged, and our booth was one of 10 finalists but not the ultimate winner. A lot of great connections were made and thanks to all Sea Scouts, parents, and adult leaders who made it through the 90° heat.

RBOC (Recreational Boaters of California)

The RBOC has been our primary legislative representative for many years. They were our representatives at the 2025 California Boater's Congress, held on May 27-28 in Sacramento. This event was co-sponsored by the RBOC and Boat US, in review of issues of importance to boaters and gathers input towards the formation of the RBOC's legislative agenda. Environmental issues regarding coppercontaining bottom paints and invasive mussel protection protocols were on the agenda. Another hot button issue was the proposal to increase the ethanol component of marine fuels from the current 10% to 15%. The RBOC is in opposition to this proposal, as older engines may suffer damage from the hotter burning fuel.

COTY (Club of the Year Competition)

SBYC is cruising ahead into the 2025 boating year and the annual COTY interclub competition, which is well underway. We had members attend the PICYA Spring Leadership Conference in support of Bay Area boating. Also, we were represented at the PICYA's April Delegates Meeting at the Village West Yacht Club in Stockton. At April's Opening Day on the Bay weekend, we had a boat, the Ellenberger's Hummingbird, in the waterfront parade and members aboard the Committee boat. Add to that that we hosted our annual South Bay Opening Day event on May 24th. It, too, was a COTY event with interclub races in the channel. Our own Shirley Reekie helped organize the decorated boat parade, which included kayaks, powerboats and even 3 sailboats. It was a great day in celebration of shallow water boating in the Steamboat Slough!

There you have it SBYC...as always; we're the fun club!





Safety Officer's Report

Sailing Books to Own By Lu Abel


I walked past my bookcase the other day and realized that on it are the three books that recreational boaters (including sailors) should consider owning. At this point I'll note my distress at the attitude of many younger folks these days - "I don't need to be prepared ahead of time; I'll just look up a solution for the problem on my smartphone when I need it." Yeah, do that when your boat is sinking or is on fire or has become dismasted. Especially for our newer members coming aboard with the club, a little bit of forehand knowledge prevents many interesting situations from becoming a full-blown crisis.

These books are known by the names of their original authors, all deceased, with the books now updated by others. The magic names are Chapman, Dutton and Bowditch. **Chapman's Piloting and Seamanship**; **Dutton's Navigation and Piloting**; **Bowditch's American Practical Navigator**. Chapman is the most basic of the three, but the most relevant for a recreational sailor, especially one who is not planning a long offshore voyage. It goes all the way from "you call the pointy end of the boat the bow" to boat handling to how to read a chart and aids to navigation to emergencies afloat to ropes and knots (formally known as marlinspike) to electronics for boats. Even the customs of proper display of flags on your boat (ever wonder why when you visit a yacht club the American flag is often not the highest on the flagpole?).

Almost-current edition of Chapman

I suppose many reactions at this point are "how much for all this knowledge?" I just checked Amazon: less than \$35 for the old-fashioned print edition, \$27.99 for Kindle. Put simply, Chapman's is almost a thousand pages of "everything you wanted to know about boating and your boat." It absolutely should be on every sailor's bookshelf – including yours!

If you own just one book on sailing, Chapman's is the one! If you own two, keep one Chapman's on your home bookshelf and one on your boat.

The first ship-to-shore radio transmission was sent in 1899 from a lightship to the coast at San Francisco. The receiving station was located at the newly-rebuilt (second of three) Cliff House, which was by then owned by Adolph Sutro. The message was "Sherman is sighted," referring to the return of a troopship from the Spanish-American War. Does anyone remember swimming at the Sutro Baths, perhaps in a rented wool swimsuit?! The Sutro Baths was also the subject of an 1897 movie by Thomas Edison, one of the first moving pictures made.


