

PICYA (Pacific Inter Club Yachting Association)

The November 4th PICYA Delegates Dinner Meeting will be held at the Berkeley Yacht Club, which sits on stilts along the bay's eastern shore. Registrations can be made through the website PICYA.org and attendance can be via Zoom or in person. This is the "Awards" meeting and SBYC has lots to celebrate. It is expected that we will be recognized as a 3-Star Club, which is a very good start to future awards! Many thanks go to each of you for participating in PICYA-sponsored events throughout the year.

Another reason to celebrate comes in the person of our very own PICYA Delegate Gus Meyner. Gus, who has a wealth of boating experience and has represented numerous Bay Area yacht clubs over the years, will be the recipient of a very special award...The Jo Bates Memorial Delegate of the Year Award. He will be recognized as the "delegate who has best served in the image of (the legendary) Jo Bates, for the greatest contribution of time and effort for the good of the PICYA." Way to go, Gus!

The PICYA's always interesting Fall Management Conference was held on October 19th at the Stockton Yacht Club. Many thanks go to our Delegate Gus Meyner and JoAnn Barr for attending. Topics covered included an overview of the PICYA events planned for 2025. It promises to be a great year.

RBOC (Recreational Boaters of California)

The RBOC has been opposing a southern California, Marina del Ray, proposal to require recreational boaters to obtain a permit before applying copper containing bottom paints. Although the RBOC's opposition was adamant, the proposal was approved and will go into effect in two years. The RBOC is now requesting additional time before the mandate goes into effect, saying that more study needs to be done before the final regulations are implemented. Of further concern is that boaters statewide could come under such mandates in future years.

COTY (Club of the Year Competition)

We have crossed the October 14th finish line of the 2024 COTY interclub competition. I am pleased to say that we are running with the fleet! As noted above, it is our expectation that we have notched 150 points, which is just what we needed to be recognized as a 3-Star Club! Over the past year, SBYC has attended conferences, delegate meetings, the Commodores Ball, donated funds towards better Bay boating, purchased PICYA yearbooks, published a newsletter with PICYA/RBOC and safety articles, hosted a South Bay Opening Day, had boats into Bay Area yacht clubs, participated in community service events, paraded for Opening Day on the Bay and had a great time doing it all. We finished the year STRONG and can be proud of our standing among the over 100 Bay Area yacht clubs.

Safety Officer's Report

A Very Useful Tide and Current Website ~ by Lu Abel

NOAA has a very interesting tide and current web site. From it you can get tidal predictions for any tidal station anywhere in the USA (as well as current predictions for any station offering them). Beyond that, though, you can get a lot more information, even down to actual measured tides and currents for many stations.

The website is titled very appropriately as https://tidesandcurrents.noaa.gov/ and shows the whole country. Simply zoom in (ala Google Maps) until you are in the area of interest to you (eg, SF Bay). One of the things I really like about this page is that the locations of tidal stations are shown on the map. So, for example, you can see that the "Alameda" station is located on the outside of the island by the USS Hornet.

Interestingly, as it comes up, this site shows no tidal stations inside the Estuary, yet both of my tidal prediction apps on my iPhone show stations in the Estuary. With a bit of fiddling with the web site, specifically in the upper right corner changing "Type" to "Tide Predictions" all these missing stations popped up. They appear to be mathematical prediction points and not actual measurement points like Alameda Station. Click on a station on the map and you'll get a popup that gives the name of the station and the times of the next two high and the next two low tides. In addition, there is a link to "Station Home Page" on the left side.

A station's home page – especially the page for a "real" station as opposed to a "mathematical" station is a treasure trove of information – instantaneous information (like current tidal level and, interestingly, the difference between actual water level as it is affected by winds and weather and the predicted tide), predictive information (eg, times of future high and low tides), historical information (including even a picture of the station!), and various data points (eg, what's the difference between MLLW, the reference for tidal data, and MHW, the reference for bridge clearances?).

I could go on-and-on (I haven't, for example, even talked about current prediction features of the site), but this is clearly a very useful and informative site. Definitely worth bookmarking on your web browser. NOAA buoy info is available through a companion smartphone app, NOAA BUOY REPORTS. It is channeled through a private developer, Juggernaut Technology Inc., but basic buoy information is free to view.

Naughty Cal Corner

A schooner, aside from being a drinking glass, is a sailing vessel with two or more masts that are rigged fore and aft, i.e., not square sails. Despite perhaps sounding Dutch, the word is derived from the Scottish word "scoon," meaning to skip stones over the water.



BUT have you ever wondered how produce was transported to San Francisco from the Santa Clara Valley before there were easily passable roads or a railway?

The answer is clear in a picture in the SBYC clubhouse on the extreme left near the galley. There you will find a photograph of the 59' "Alma," the last survivor of the San Francisco Bay scow schooners,



built in 1891. She was discovered in the mud at Alviso in 1959, and is now fully restored and sailing in San Francisco.

These scow schooners were quite beamy, making them stable and, importantly, had flat bottoms enabling them to sail into the shallow creeks of the bay to pick up cargo from places still named today such as Eden Landing, Dixon Landing, Smith's Landing.
