

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Safety Officer's Report

Digging to China by Lu Abel

This month's column is not on boat safety at all, but the results of a challenge sent to me by a member.

It's simple: My home is located at Latitude 37.768125 North, Longitude 122.284526 West (note that he sent these coordinates in six-place decimals of a degree, not in degrees, minutes and seconds (or degrees, minutes, and decimal minutes as one needs to plot on most charts); this is actually an advantage). So what point on Earth is directly opposite my home? If Elon Musk loaned me his fabled boring machine and I drilled directly through the center of the earth, where would I come out? (Assuming of course that I didn't stop to view all the sights described by Jules Verne in his famous 1850s novel Journey to the Center of the Earth.)

I looked at this question when I first received it and had no idea how to calculate. A good night's sleep (perhaps pondering the question in my dreams) and I discovered that answer is fairly simple. The opposite point's longitude is simply 180 degrees off from my starting longitude – that's the opposite side of the earth from where I am! The Prime Meridian is 0 degrees; the Date Line is at 180 degrees (the only two longitudes where it doesn't matter if you say East or West).

Let's say I'm on the Date Line. If I'm going to come eastward to my home longitude of 122.284526 West, then the point opposite me has to also move to the east. 180 - 122.284526 is 57.715474, the number of degrees of longitude I am east of the Date Line. To stay opposite me, the longitude of the point opposite me must also move 57.715474 degrees to the east from Greenwich, in other words to 57.715474 East longitude.

I like to visualize the answers to problems, so imagine holding a globe so the South Pole is pointing directly at you. Meridians of longitude would look like spokes on a wheel. Think of the Date Line at the top of the circle and Greenwich at the bottom. Now move clockwise to California and draw a line directly across the pole – you're at the point opposite in longitude and it's east longitude. The "opposite" latitude is incredibly simple it's just the beginning latitude with North/South reversed! Visually, think of looking at the Earth with the North Pole at the top and the South Pole at the bottom and the Equator horizontally across the circle. Parallels of Latitude simply go up or down from the Equator. So if I'm at a certain latitude and draw a line from it through the center of the Earth (center of the circle we're visualizing), it comes out at the same number of degrees, but south if the original latitude was north or vice-versa. So the answer to the question "where on Earth is the point directly opposite your home (Lat 37.768125 N, Lo 122.284526 W)?" is Lat 37.768125 S and Lo 57.715474 E. Put that into Google Maps (remembering that by convention we don't show N, S, E or W, but rather south latitudes and west longitudes are shown as negative numbers, so enter - 37.768125 57.715474) and where on Earth is the point directly opposite my home? Not in China, but in the Indian Ocean, almost directly east of Cape Town and SSE of Madagascar.

(Post Scrip fun...the point opposite you on earth is called the antipode.)

Naughty Cal Corner

Three common expressions that come from the sea/sailing:

"He/she is a loose cannon" meaning someone who is unpredictable or uncontrolled. This comes from when cannons were rolled out for firing on a sailing ship, and sometimes the fastening of the cannon to the ship could come untied, resulting in the gun pitching wildly across the dock as the ship rolled.





"Have you heard the latest scuttlebutt?" meaning have you heard the latest gossip. In sailing ships, the scuttlebutt was the cask or barrel where drinking water was stored and as sailors loitered near it, the gossip was passed around.

"Skyscraper" now means a very tall building, but the term was first used for the top-most sail on a square- rigged ship; it was triangular and set above the square skysail or the square moonraker. Sometimes, the wind aloft was stronger than closer to sea level, hence the need for sails positioned high up.

The skyscraper would go above the highest sail shown here.
