Of course, you can Google anything about home school or any subject and plenty of tutorials and worksheets will show up. Also, use public libraries or online library sources. Use technology to your advantage: science projects and experiments, online book discussions (or create one), cooking lessons, DIY videos (for Life Skills), music or art appreciation, and the list goes on.

Make sure to get your transcript from school before you leave during a school year. Have everything set up to home school legally **before** you leave public school. That way you can pick up where you left off and not worry about losing days of schooling. Contact a local legal homeschool association (so you can legally homeschool) and a support group (to do field trips, etc.).

Be creative. Allow your child creativity in his or her work. The main things to remember are to keep a journal of what you have done for each day and save a good sampling of each subject for each semester of work. Make sure you have all your high school credits covered by the time you wish to graduate (if you are homeschooling those years).

Your records, transcripts and diplomas should not include Reborn Third Option Homeschool at all. YOU are the school official, principal, guidance counselor and teacher. I have no legal authority to sign transcripts or diplomas; therefore, I will not. I recommend that you attach a copy of your Disposition of Application (document you received from me at the start of the membership year) in which your student graduates, which does include my signature and our seal, to your student's transcript. This Disposition is your documentation that verifies that you have homeschooled in accordance with SC state law, making your transcript legitimate.
