- Pacific Grove Is home to black-tailed deer, a species native to Monterey County and they have adaptive strategies that allow them to use human spaces for their own needs.
- The start of rutting season generally begins in mid-October and lasts through early **December.** The rut can also start as early as the end of **September**.
- The rut is the peak-breeding season for deer, their behavior changes. Rutting activities include rubbing their antlers on trees and rocks causing the velvet covering to come off. They will also spar with each other to establish dominance.
- Does often go into heat within a consistent 24-72 hour period each year. The buck will stay with the doe for 1-3 days and then leave.

They do care

The process by Urban Trapping Wildlife Control for removal:

- ** They examine and photograph the carcass
- ** They remove the carcass
- ** Disinfect the area and surrounding ground where the carcass was lying
- ** They contact the local CA Dept. of Fish and Wildlife to discuss the carcass
- ** If requested, will transport the carcass to the local CDFW
- ** CDFW may have a necropsy done to determine cause of death
- ** If warranted those results are sent to the State
- ** Urban Trapping Wildlife Control then completes a report



Group pays for removal of dead deer

A DEER advocacy group is partnering with a wildlife specialist to remove deer carcasses from residential properties in Pacific Grove at no charge.

The group, P.G. Deer Awareness, advocates for the protection of the animals through education and outreach. Based on an inventory the group started taking in 2021, the deer population has grown dramatically, from 82 in 2022 to 173 in 2023.

The number of deaths has also increased, which can present a conundrum for homeowners who come across a dead deer on their properties, according to the group, headed by former P.G. Mayor Carmelita Garcia and Renee Nesper.

The nonprofit has come up with a solution, and it won't cost homeowners a cent.

No charge

In March, it "entered into an agreement with Dan Burton of Urban Trapping Wildlife Control," Garcia told The Pine Cone. "As a result, P.G. Deer Awareness now provides a free service to deceased deer from private properties."

Burton told The Pine Cone that since January, he's removed six deer in the city,

including one Tuesday night. The deer awareness group pays him for the removals. Deer usually die from illnesses, old age or vehicle collisions.

According to Burton, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife will test the deer carcasses for chronic wasting disease, a highly contagious and 100 percent fatal illness that has not yet been detected in California.

"If chronic wasting disease infected our local P.G. deer herds, it would decimate the population," Burton said.

Wide berth

Meanwhile, Garcia reminded residents that fawning season has arrived and to watch out for the little ones. Protective mothers have been known to charge people in Pacific Grove, so it's important to give the does and their young ones a wide berth.

"Please stay away if you happen to come across them," she said. "If you see a doe standing in the middle of a street, most likely she has a fawn in that general area and is protecting it from intruders."

IMPORTANT REMINDER FROM PG DEER AWARENESS

Fawning season is projected to begin mid April and run until July. Our first reported birth last year was on April 13, 2023. Deer are very generational, so, if you had fawns born in your yard or in nearby neighborhoods, does will return to give birth. As a reminder,

if you see a fawn by itself, do not panic. The mother is out forging and will return. Please drive carefully and be on the lookout during this very special period of time.

CAUSE OF DEATH LUNGWORM IT'S A PARASITE

Adult deer are somewhat resistant, but they can still get lungworm if they are stressed or don't have good nutrition.

Lungworm can cause health issues and even death in deer.

Deer can get lungworm by eating infective larvae that are passed in the feces of other deer.

The larvae can also be found on pasture or in snails and slugs that deer eat.

In severe cases, the worms can become so abundant that they make it difficult for the deer to breathe, a condition known as "lungworm pneumonia". This can and most often develops into Chronic Wasting Disease.

Once consumed, the larvae pass through the deer's stomach and intestines, and then migrate to the lungs through the lymphatic and blood systems.

In the lungs, the larvae develop into adult worms that live in the airways and lay eggs.

The eggs are then coughed up and swallowed by the deer, where they hatch into larvae and are passed in their feces again.

Deer that are weaned in the fall are most susceptible to lungworm because they haven't yet developed immunity, and the autumn environment is favorable for the parasite's survival.

These deer are so lucky to live in such a beautiful place!!


