Over the past months, STEMS4Girls has been hard at work evaluating our impact over the last seven years in areas like capacity and sustainability, partnerships, volunteerism, and our STEM literacy program. Our organizational restructuring plan is nearly complete. Despite the heavy workload, we continue to find ways to keep it moving. We've stayed active year-round doing STEM literacy activities, recruiting, grant writing, fundraising, and inspiring students to explore and develop their STEM identity through civic and community engagement. This summer, we launched a dynamic You Belong in STEM youth initiative, a youth-led civic engagement and STEM enrichment program. We are growing and looking forward to experiencing continued increases in youth participation along with the support of the community.

STEMS4Girls is entirely volunteer-run, which can occasionally make maintaining consistency a bit tricky. We were in a transitional phase with new volunteers joining while others moved on. With their support and yours, we continue to turn stumbling blocks into ladders of success. Moving forward, we plan to keep offering accessible and affordable STEM enrichment activities and tutoring services to communities with limited access to handson science and technology experiences outside the classroom and home. Our aim is to equip future generations with critical thinking, social, and problem-solving skills that are vital for success in the 21st-century workforce.

Connecting with Kids in the Community

One of the reasons I decided to move to Leon County in Tallahassee was not just because it had a small town feel but because it was growing. And who doesn't appreciate growth? It had a vibe I could get used to, especially once the dirt roads and church parking lots were paved. Its nearly impossible to wear high heel shoes and walk on a gravel-filled parking lot. If allergies had continued affecting my well-being and ability to explore the city, I was ready to say good by to the small progressive town that had the 5 attributes I was looking for in my next move. While trying to figure out my next move, the community was invited to attend a Community Budget Workshop hosted by the then City Manager, Anita Thompson-Favors, where residents could learn about the budget process and provide input. Attending those events was a game changer for me. I met so many wonderful people, gained valuable information about available resources, and even swapped my wooden tennis racket for an aluminum one. Southern hospitality from public servants was on full display, and it was a first for me. The rest, as they say, is history - I'm still here in Tallahassee. The allergy symptoms completely vanished, and I built connections with city and county public servants who would go on to support the mission of STEMS4Girls, Inc.

Volunteers Who Go Over and Beyond

Starting a new school year, volunteerism is the bond that helps us move forward as a team.STEMS4Girls is strengthening its intergenerational volunteer efforts by applying

strategies and tools gained to become a service enterprise organization supported by Volunteer Florida. As a volunteer-run group, we offer opportunities for personal and professional growth within a diverse community, ranging from baby boomers to high school students. With the support of the community we aim to recruit, train, and retain dedicated volunteers.

From day one when traveling to Domi Station to get assistance with writing our organizing papers, I met Mrs. Kay Pelt-Walker. She introduced me to Leon County's volunteer program and showed me how to create a need for volunteer support. By the time I returned home, I had received 5 responses from college students who wanted to earn community service hours. We remain a popular choice for college students to earn community service hours, develop leadership skills, and give back to the community. So far, we've had over 1,000 individuals respond to our call for volunteers, contributing more than 6,840 hours of service, which amounts to a monetary value of over \$171,000.

Additionally, some of our amazing volunteers have earned awards or gained admission to prestigious universities and employers of their choice, thanks to their contributions as team members advancing our mission and vision. Valencia Lawrence shared her story as a volunteer and generously donated her award to STEMS4Girls. She says, "I have been apart of STEMS4Girls since December 2017, and I have watched it grow from a prodigious vision into a remarkable reality. I joined STEMS4Girls because I relate to its mission, I could see the lack of minorities, especially women in STEM fields. By being a part of this organization, I can help bridge that gap and bring STEM to underserved and overlooked communities. It also allows me to use and develop my interests and talents to help my community and strengthen our impact. I enjoy the feeling that the work that I do helps change the lives of others." ~Valencia Lawrence

With a rise in youth applicants this summer, a youth-led initiative "You Belong in STEM" was launched to empower rising youth scholars to engage and have a voice in civic projects that address social and economic challenges in their communities and globally. Previous projects include addressing food insecurity, which won the Meta Facebook Engineer for a Week Impact Award, facilitated by board member Dr. Marcel Nguemaha, participating in the Leon County MLK Jr. Parade, organizing a YSA Service Day 9/11 project featuring a march to a local fire station with donuts, and creating two videos: one titled "Why Do Bullies Bully Nice People," an antibullying video, and another encouraging eligible high school students to pre-register to vote. We're excited to see what they'll accomplish this year.

#4 STEM Literacy

Delivering Impact



This anti-bullying video was created from conception to publication by our STEM Literacy participants. Established in 2017 by our board members, the STEM Literacy initiative seeks innovative ways to introduce young children and youth to STEM education and career opportunities. Through programs like our Saturday and Summer Afterschool STEM Literacy Program, Community Engagement, Volunteerism, and Collaborative Partnerships, we aim to inspire and empower the next generation to explore and build their STEM identity. Our approach focuses on enhancing Florida's science and math standards through hands-on projects that develop critical thinking skills essential for success in the classroom, workforce, and life. Recently, we introduced tutoring support in language arts skills due to a higher-than-expected number of participants receiving unsatisfactory grades on their report cards. We continue to see the importance of offering these services in neighborhoods with limited access to resources. One sixth-grade student exclaimed, "I want to be a mechanical engineer!" Another said, "I like math!"

Growing up as a first-generation college graduate in a family of 10, having a mentor or tutor could have significantly improved my academic performance and readiness for college. STEMS4Girls After-school STEM Literacy Program is that spark, inspiring a child's knowledge, self-esteem, and confidence beyond the




