Town of Tanque Verde?

Tanque Verde Valley is the area east of the City of Tucson, from Sabino Creek in the north, to the boundaries of Saguaro National Park to Irvington in the south, with a 2020 US census estimated population of 16,250.

A group of Tanque Verde Valley residents recently started a nonprofit organization called the "Town of Tanque Verde" to research the feasibility and advisability of transitioning the Tanque Verde Valley to a town through incorporation.

The stated purpose of the organization is to get more support for Tanque Verde Valley and improve the social welfare of Valley residents.

One reason the nonprofit was formed was in response to the recent increase in activity by the City of Tucson to annex and rezone areas of the Tanque Verde community.

Initial research will include identifying and discussing both the benefits and disadvantages of creating a town.

Tanque Verde & Houghton Housing Development Project

The property owner of 11.6 vacant acres on the northeast corner of Tanque Verde and Houghton has sought to rezone the land, currently zoned for **Suburban Ranch (SR)** which limits the number and type of buildings to one house per 3.3 acres.

In 2016, the developer asked for annexation into the City of Tucson and stated the intention to rezone to **RX-1**, which has a minimum lot size of 36,000 sq ft (about 0.8 acre), which would allow for about 14 houses. However, in 2019, the owner asked to rezone to **R-2** to build 86 two-story, 24-foot high units. That effort failed, in part because of opposition from the Tanque Verde Valley Association and the Rancheros, an independent coalition of neighbors. Opposition reasons included traffic, housing inconsistent with nearby neighborhoods, risk of flooding, and destruction of a designated "Important Riparian Area".

In 2021, the developer asked the City to rezone to **R-1**, with plans for 37 single-family residences. The City received one written comment for approval, 48 written protests, and an electronic petition signed by over 2,000 people opposing rezoning.

A public hearing was held July 7. The developer met with neighbors and presented a plan at a follow-up hearing on August 4.to build fewer two-story units and 33 houses instead of 37.

On August 18, the Zoning Examiner issued a recommendation to City Council to deny R-1 rezoning. Reasons included that the development does not promote environmentally sensitive design that protects the integrity of existing neighborhoods, complement adjacent land uses, or enhance the overall community. Assuming City Council accepts the recommendation, the developer still has the option to seek RX-1 zoning.

Water **Scarcity**

Water scarcity and water rates are in the news, which directly affect our neighborhood. In December, rates went up by 10% or more for Tucson Water customers in our area and other parts of unincorporated Pima County. How can we conserve precious groundwater, support a green neighborhood, and save money, too?

Often, the largest portion of household water goes to irrigation and pools. Landscaping with native species, combined with rainwater harvesting basins, can dramatically reduce water costs. And remove thirsty invasives like *Rhus lancea* and *Arundo donax* that steal irrigation water and choke out native plants.

Native trees, shrubs and grasses help rainwater infiltrate the ground to recharge groundwater, instead of running off bare land, and to reduce flooding and ponding. Call Sara to participate in a native species planting event in November.

Pool covers reduce evaporation—30 gallons per day or more in some months—plus reduce chlorine loss and extend the swimming season. A pool water basin can capture 50 to 100 gallons of backwash and support certain salt-tolerant plants like mesquites if designed correctly. Ask Sara to see a backwash basin in action.



Trees & Washes

Tree **Planting**

Your HOA works with Pima County Regional Flood Control District (PCRFCD) to restore habitat and reduce ponded water in our washes by purchasing and planting native riparian (water-loving) trees.

One project in progress is in the Gold Dust Wash, between Gold **Dust and Sutter** Mill, which often has standing water during the monsoon. Twelve new trees will take up and store surface water as they grow, providing bird and other wildlife habitat.



A second project is along the north bank of the wash between Soldier Trail and Hole #14. Four native mesquites were planted to create shade, pull standing water in that section of the wash, and help restore the native mesquite bosque.

Thank you to neighbors who support these projects by digging holes, maintaining the mulch, weeding, and donating water to get young trees established. Volunteers and donors include Alice Smith & Mike Rodriguez, Tosh & Brad Lawrence, Amber & Wyatt Fee, Tiffany & Chris Gallego, Mike & Karen Howe, and Sara Birtalan & Brian Adair.

Tree **Trimming**

At HOA request, Pima County Department of Transportation (PCDOT) recently trimmed street trees from the right of way along Tanque Verde Rd and at the intersection of Forty Niner Dr and Dry Gulch. The HOA has built positive relationships with PCDOT and PCRDFC. The county's communication and professionalism when working in our area are impressive. Please thank the crews when you see them and let the HOA know of any questions or concerns.

Arundo Removal

Take part in Tanque Verde Creek revitalization! Invasive giant Arundo donax ("false bamboo") chokes and kills willow, cottonwood, and other riparian trees while guzzling up to four times as much water as native plants. Volunteers removed 20+ tons so far. Workshops are on Saturdays in September and continue through the cooler months, marching our way from Wentworth to Tanque Verde Loop. watershedmg.org/RRN

Motorized **Vehicles**

Please remember that **no** motorized vehicles, including trucks, go-carts, side-by-sides and motorcycles, are allowed in Pima County washes, which includes the 49ers. The HOA has also received



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complaints about young people driving golf carts on public streets, which the Sheriff's Department confirmed is not legal.
