

Street Safety: Wentworth Rd

Pima County Transportation conducted a speed study last fall after complaints about speeding on Wentworth Rd between the Tanque Verde Creek and Tanque Verde Rd.

The speed limit will be lowered this spring from 45 to 35 mph on Wentworth between the creek and Tanque Verde Rd. The speed limit between the creek and Speedway Blvd will remain 35 mph.

Pima County cited the functional classification of the road, number of driveways, and number of side streets as reasons to make the speed limit 35 mph for the entire stretch between Tanque Verde and Speedway. New signs should go up soon.

About a dozen neighbors removed litter from Tanque Verde Rd, between Conestoga Ave and Wentworth Rd, on Saturday morning March 6.


Update: Car Break-ins

In February, cars were broken into in the 49ers and Guest Ranch Estates. Arrests were made. Breakins dropped off. Let's stay vigilant. Lock doors, remove valuables, and report unusual activity to the Sheriff's Dept at (520) 351-4900 or 911.

Pets & Cars

The same issues come up again and again in HOA meetings and chats with neighbors about what would make the 49ers an even better place to live. As a friendly reminder—

- Please walk dogs on a leash in any public area and pick up after them, even in the washes.
 Pima County's leash law (§ 6.04) is stricter than the Arizona regulation (§ 11-1102).
- Please observe the 25 mph speed limit. You save just 40 seconds driving one mile at 35 instead of 25 mph. It's not worth the extra risk to the walkers, runners, bikers, and pets (on leashes!) on our streets.
- The 49ers streets are public roads. Only licensed drivers may drive, even in golf carts.
- All motorized vehicles are illegal in washes, which are not considered to be open and existing roads or trails. Subsequently, washes are not areas where vehicles may operate.

Sustainable Yard Renovation

In the Winter newsletter, I wrote about embarking on a comprehensive home landscape design to incorporate native plant and habitat knowledge, rainwater harvesting, and sustainability.

Demolition was next.

Several neighbors expressed regret about removal of two rose bushes at the old driveway entrance. Unfortunately, the prior homeowners let them die. Sorry about that, but the good news is that one of the roses is coming back. If interested, call me at (520) 256-8139, and the rose bush is yours!

New developments include:

- Wall demolition, removal of four cypress trees (woodchipped & kept for future use), Bermuda removal, asphalt driveway removal (yay!)
- Watershed Management Group consultation and plan which emphasizes rain harvesting and using native vegetation, which enhances habitat for insects, birds, and pollinators
- Installed gutters to convey water to basins
- Planned excavation and rock work to armor basins to keep rainwater on site
- Planted several hardy creosotes to begin revegetating barren ground. Creosotes are unique habitats unto themselves and 22 species of bees use them as a food source.
- Poured large concrete patio in the backyard which draws us into some great night sky watching and support gatherings with friends and neighbors, especially post pandemic!



By mid-May, a new "modern" metal picket fence should be in place and, hopefully, excavated basins to capture much needed rainfall.

Although it may be hard to see progress, things are moving along, Thanks for your patience.

Come on by anytime for a visit and to discuss sustainability ideas and examples for your yard.

Entrance Beautification

Your HOA board is working with the Club and landscape firms to **explore options** to improve the entrance area at Tanque Verde Rd and N Forty Niner Dr. The Club has expressed a willingness to do dead stump removal, light excavation work, and ongoing watering and maintenance work at no charge in exchange for an investment by the HOA in the vegetation itself, planting, and other landscape installation.

Trees & Washes

Responsible Pool & Spa Draining

In spring, many of us drain our pool and spa water into the wash. Please discharge water responsibly. Chlorinated water can damage vegetation and erode the banks of washes, if not careful. And for acid washed pools, the highly acidic water can even kill trees.

The website below provides good guidance. Water should sit for 72+ hours after the last chlorine addition to de-chlorinate, and the pH level should be near neutral (between 7 and 8) before discharge.

Check out www.tucsonaz.gov/tdot/ instructionspool-and-spa-owners for tips, including a list of
plants that can be watered with backwash water
(about 75 gallons for the average backwash) to
save on your landscape water use.



Tree Support During Drought

2020 was the driest calendar year in Tucson on record and 2021 is off to a dry start. Even mature trees can use assistance to survive until the next rain. Our neighborhood trees provide multiple benefits throughout the year, including cooling shade during the hottest months.

Many neighborhood irrigation systems water trees near the trunks. However, the critical roots, where water is needed most, are under the edge of the tree canopy. Watering at the trunk can lead to stunted, rotted roots and shorter lifespans.

Water deeply and infrequently. Shallow watering evaporates before roots have a chance to use the water.

Spread mulch under the tree, beyond the canopy, to prevent evaporation of soil moisture, cool soil temperatures, and provide organic matter to build soil. **Tree trimmers will often provide** mulch for free—just ask them when they're in the neighborhood.

Dig a wide, shallow basin or build up a berm on one side, to hold water where it is most effective at the canopy edge.

Always consult a certified arborist for tree maintenance. Some tree trimmers are overly aggressive, adding unnecessary stress to the tree and shortening tree life.

For arborist and rainwater harvesting recommendations, ask Sara Birtalan.

CC&Rs

Storing **Trailers**

Want to store a trailer at your house? Please remember that, per our CC&Rs, the trailer **should not be seen** from the street, from a neighboring property, or from the golf course.

The trailer must be completely concealed 1) in a closed garage or 2) stored in your

backyard so long as the trailer and its contents do not protrude



over your backyard wall and the wall and gate are solid in nature, not see-through.

Sorry—tarps & tents don't count!

The bottom line is that if it can't be stored in either of these manners, you'll have to keep it **off-site**.
