Leading your household in godly principles despite cultural pressures



Renew Daily


Recommit to your choice through daily devotion and action

Make the Decision

Deliberately choose to serve the Lord above all else

Joshua's powerful declaration, "Choose you this day whom you will serve," remains one of the most consequential challenges in scripture. This choice isn't made once and forgotten—it's a daily commitment. When we reflect on all God has brought us through, the decision becomes clear. "Did the world step up and help you? Did the rich and famous throw you a lifeline? Did the gods of this world pull you through? I dare say NO! God did it! God did it for you!"

As For Me and My House



When Joshua declared, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord," he established a powerful principle of spiritual leadership. This statement reflects the understanding that "if you live under my roof, you are going to live by my rules." Spiritual leaders must take responsibility for guiding their households in godly ways. "I've got to serve Him if I want my children protected from the evils of this old world! I got to be right if I want those I love to be right."

A household united in serving God creates a sanctuary of faith, protection, and blessing that impacts generations to come. When we choose God, we position our families to experience His provision and protection.

Transformation Through Service

Renewed Mind

"Be not conformed to this world but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind." When we serve God, He blesses us with a transformed perspective that clarifies our purpose in His kingdom.

Divine Protection


God protects those who choose to serve Him. Like Joshua and the Israelites, we can trust that God will fight our battles when we remain faithful to Him.

Kingdom Purpose

God "uses the redeemed to help others open their spiritual eyes so that the blind can see." Our service to God extends beyond ourselves to impact others.

When we choose to serve the Lord, transformation follows. The Apostle Paul calls us to "present yourself a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God which is your reasonable service." This dedication leads to a renewed mind, divine protection, and a clear purpose in God's kingdom. Just as God fulfilled His covenant promises to the Israelites by delivering the Promised Land, He fulfills His promises to us when we faithfully serve Him.

Standing Against Opposition



Opposition is inevitable when we choose to serve God. Joshua faced numerous enemies as he led the Israelites, but God consistently delivered victory. When we face those who oppose our faith, we must remember that our battle isn't against flesh and blood. Rather than responding with anger or retaliation, we're called to be "strong and of good courage" while allowing God to fight our battles.
