In September, 1915, Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the Reverend Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH) to research and promote achievements of Black Americans and other Black persons. Together they developed what was then called Negro History Week. Today, extended to Black History Month, February is devoted to celebrating God's handiwork in and through the contributions of Black Americans and other Black people of African descent. Here are just a few historical trail-blazers:

BLACK HISTORY MONTH CONT.



Vice President Kamala Harris; former President Barack Obama; First Lady Michele Obama; Father/Daughter Doctors. Louis Wright Graduated fourth in his class at Harvard Medical School. While serving in World War I, developed the intradermal injection vaccination technique. In 1948, became the first clinician to study the use of the drug Aureomycin in humans. Dr. Jane Cook Wright developed new techniques for administering chemotherapy to cancer patients. In 1967, she was the highest-ranking Black woman in a US medical institution; Lloyd Auston, Secretary of Defense; Shalanda Young, Acting Director/Deputy Director, The Office of Management and Budget; Michael Stanley Regan, Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (first Black male in this role); Marcia Fudge, Secretary of Department of Housing and Urban Development; Cecilia Elena Rouse, White House Chair of the Council of Economic Advisors; Linda Thomas-Greenfield, Representative of the USA to the United Nations as well as representative of the USA in the security council.

Candace Jackson-Akiwumi; Katanji Brown Jackson; Tiffany Cunningham; Eunice Lee; Holly Thomas; Julien Neals; Angel Kelly; Karen Williams; Patricia Giles; Clarence Thomas; Omar Williams; Maame Ewusi-Mensah Frimpong. Dr. Cornel West; Rev. Dr. Michael Eric Dyson; Misty Copeland, Principal Dancer American Ballet Company; Amanda Gorman, Poet.

In remembrance; Hank Aaron; Colin Powell; Cicely Tyson; Mary Wilson (Supremes); Sidney Poitier; bell hooks, writer; Toni Morrison, writer; Maya Angelou

A majority of the celebrated are the first Black person in their field or role. We rejoice in the milestone achievements of them and many more. At the same time we strive for the day when it is no longer noteworthy that a Black person is in a particular role or making a significant contribution.








BOOKS BY OUR COLLEAGUES

This 12-Day devotional is an attempt to give voice to 15 women lighthouse keepers of the 19th and 20th century. Poignant facts are told about their heroic efforts to keep the lights shining for the multitude of strangers at sea. Yet many women who sustain life go unnoticed for decades. The juxtaposition of scripture references of unnamed women of the Bible invites readers to discern their own faith journeys. This devotional is meant to be part of a beginning conversation about transformation, gender equity, dignity, and servant-leadership roles women have held for many centuries, whether publicly recognized or in the shadows. One has to wonder whose stories have yet to be unearthed. May this book be an inspiration to seek "the more" about God's beloved. "Brave Beacons!"


