We will publish the newsletter four (4) times per year, on the third Friday of the month in November, February, May, and September.




# FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Thank God for humor!"



# SEASONAL REFLECTIONS

#### GIVING THANKS

We give thanks to the God of our salvation. Reflecting upon the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday, I am reminded of the song, "Every day is a day of Thanksgiving," some of the lyrics are;



Every day is a day of thanksgiving.
God's been so good to me, every day,
God's blessing me. Every day is a day
of thanksgiving. Take the time to
glorify the Lord, today.



The Book of 1 Chronicles 16:8-13 provides some reasons for giving thanks to God. Supreme among them is God's name.

God's name is above all names and worthy of honor. The writer admonishes us to glory in God's holy name. Further, the writer encourages us to remember God's wonderful works; God's miracles; and God's judgments. The writer goes on to urge us to give thanks to God because of God's deeds among the people; to tell of God's wonderful works. The refrain of the song echoes in my mind, "Every day is a day of thanksgiving."

The holiday is set aside to stop and give thanks. As with most things in society today, there is also the shadow of suffering that is worth acknowledging. As co-laborers with Christ, we would be remiss not to mention that some view the Thanksgiving holiday as a source of pain. Fifty-one years ago, on November 27, 1970, The United American Indians of New England declared the Thanksgiving holiday as a national day of mourning\*. It serves as a reminder of the hardship and slaughter of loved ones, loss of land and denial of dignity.

I am convinced that God does not consider it robbery to stand in solidarity with those in pain; to walk alongside them and to compassionately see them. Our thanksgiving holiday is not ruined by extending compassion. In fact, I am certain our Thanksgiving celebrations are enhanced when we fulfill our Christian duty to rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep. We do not need to give into a binary perspective of either/or, that is, either we celebrate Thanksgiving or we mourn with the hurting. Instead, we can exercise a both/and perspective, giving thanks on Thanksgiving Day for what God has done and praying for atonement of sin and comfort for the hurting, forgotten and ignored.

Adding to our daily thanksgiving in honor of our siblings is a path to living in harmony with one another.

#### **VETERANS DAY**

Thank you to all veterans for your service and sacrifice.

A reflection for Veterans Day by from a workshop offered on August 18, 2009 by Dr. Wayne Eastlack.

Anxiety Disorders: Research, Diagnosis and Treatment



While sitting at O'Hare Airport in Chicago a man walked past and Wayne asked him if he was a Marine. The man said "Yes. How can you tell?" Wayne told him by his haircut and the way he was walking. Wayne shared with the man he had been a Marine and served in Vietnam in the 3rd Recon 3rd Marines from 1968-1969. The Marine told Wayne he was headed back to Iraq for his fourth tour of duty. Wayne asked him why he was going back as he only had to do three tours. The Marine replied, "I have lost the switch." The Marine went on to explain that he no longer has the ability to connect with his wife and children. His wife has taken the kids and left him. He is going back to his Marine Unit as it is the only way of life he knows and feels at home. Wayne went on to explain to those at the workshop of how in the Marines one is taught how to not feel as if you feel you have lost your edge. Wayne shared with the Marine of his work as a psychologist. Wayne gave his contact information to the Marine and told him that at any time he, his wife and children can come to his facility in NC and he will provide them all with free treatment and lodging for as long as it takes. Wayne said at the workshop that he does not know if he will ever hear from the Marine.

Wayne, the son of a preacher, was drafted after receiving his Master's Degree in Psychology. He was serving in Vietnam in the Marines and was responsible for a troop of 11 men who went to rescue soldiers in enemy territory. While he was in Vietnam his fiancé at home became a "flower child" and then began to see Wayne as a baby killer with what he was doing in Vietnam. As a result, she broke off the engagement and ended their relationship.

Wayne always flew with his men in the chopper on every mission. The first mission he was not able to go with his men on a mission he asked a Sergeant to take his place. While on that mission the chopper was shot down and everyone was killed. While in Vietnam Wayne always wore a jacket with the writing on the back "You and Me God!" After the chopper was shot down his commanding officer told him even he has to take some time and deal with what happened. Wayne proceeded to place his jacket on a pole and shot it with his gun until it was in shreds. Wayne shared he was so mad at God for letting the chopper be shot down that he lost his faith in God.

A while after he returned to the States he received a phone call from a woman who said they had never met but she was supposed to be the maid of honor when he was engaged. She said she called to tell him that she supported his efforts and all he did when he was in Vietnam. He asked her if they could meet so he could buy her coffee or a meal. The only place open was a 24-hour truck stop and they sat there talking for hours. She later became his wife and they have two children.

After being married 14 years they were living near DC. His son had asked Wayne several times to take him to see the Vietnam Memorial Wall. His wife said to Wayne one day that they should go and take their son so he will get to see it. When they arrived at the Memorial, his son went running toward the wall. His wife said to go and run after their son. As he approached his son there was a woman talking to him. His son then said to him, "Daddy, we have to find the names of your men." The woman knew what was going on and told Wayne she can help him find the names of his men. He said he would wait and come back when it was not so crowded to look for the names. She said, "It is always this crowded." She shared with Wayne she had lost her husband in Vietnam and she now spends her time at the Memorial to help those who come to visit.

At that moment Wayne began to have heart palpitations and realized he was having a panic attack. He practiced deep breathing and was able to ease the symptoms of the attack. The woman helped Wayne find the name of the Sergeant that had taken his place on the chopper the day it was shot down and all were killed.


Wayne said he placed his hand over the Sergeants name and began crying and said, "It should have been me." The woman replied, "Mister, it was not supposed to be you or it would have been. God has a plan for your life and you are not doing it."

Wayne's wife said to him later as they stood near the Memorial that she needed to speak with him. She said to him, "We're going on being married 15 years and I have never felt your heart. Get better this year or I am leaving. I've waited all of this time for your heart." Wayne shared that he did not feel he had the right to get better after losing all of his men. His wife said to him, "You know the words but not the music."

He did find a therapist who was able to bring him home to himself. The therapist helped him realize his underlying fear of why he avoids being close to his wife and children. If he avoided getting close to them and God took them away from him, he would not hurt. The therapist told Wayne, "I need to walk you through the mine field in Vietnam. When it gets bad, stay focused on where you are going (the picture of his wife and children) and not where you are coming from." Wayne said, "For the first time since coming home from Vietnam I felt relief and realized I was only then truly back home." Wayne said it was then that he began to rekindle his faith in God. Wayne's wife now refers to him as "My second husband."

### ADVENT


