

AX BASEMENT FINISHED

In what was perhaps the most ambitious project undertaken by the active chapter undergraduates in the past several years, the basement of the chapter house was completely renovated into a TV-game room complex this past January.

The project, co-ordinated by past presidents Carlos Harrington and Ken Schwenke, has long been a goal of the actives. It was not until recently, however, that the increased size of the chapter created both the need and the means for the renovation. According to Brc. Harrington, "With almost fifty

In the Red Cross blood drive last month, Theta Chiplaced a close second to the combined Army-Air Force ROTC, an organization of some 200 people.

active members, the noise level of the downstairs was making studying in the chapter house difficult, if impossible. We hope our new basement can help alleviate some of the noise problem."

Plans for the project began better than a year ago, when the brothers of the chapter decided that a renovated basement was a desirable addition both from scholast ic and social standpoints. Initially, many problems were encountered with getting a short term home ima provement loan, because of the corporate status of the house. Because of the funding problems with the banks, in November of 1975 it was decided that a co-operative financing arrangement between the alumni and the actives was the best alternative. The arrangement that was agreed upon was that' the alumni would loan the undergrads \$800 to be paid back in the 76-77 school year; the balance of the 2800 dollars necessary for the renovation were taken from the actives budget.

The project involved an almost complete change in the basement as it existed before. The work, most of which was contracted to H.J. Bourgon & Son, involved pouring of a new concrete floor, putting in new walls, installing a heating floop, installing electric circuits, and laying new indoor-outdoor carpeting. This was not to say, however, that the brothers of the

chapter did not put in efforts in the renovation. Many of the labor intensive operations, such as sheet rock installation & sanding, painting, and final touches were left to the brothers. A total of over 200 man hours of brother's time was spent in the physical work alone. In addition to the work previously mentioned, a new barnwood bar has been built by the bros at the east side of the basement.

In order to more or less compensate for having the new bar, the old T.V. room on the first floor is currently being converted into a chapter library. "We hope," said Bro Harrington, "that the combination of a new recreation area that will help keep the house quieter along with our new study area, will help this chapter to reach even greater heights than it already has.

On November 20th, 1975, Chancellor Melvin Eggars paid the brothers of Alpha Chi Chapter a visit at a dinner held in his honor in the chapter house.

Speaking to a full house of brothers and pledges, Eggars praised the spirit of brotherhood at Theta Chi, citing the many activities that Theta Chi been involved in on campus since he assumed the chancellorship

three years ago.

Also in attendance were Chancellor Eggars' wife and Brother Law. rence Van Deusen, the most senior surviving brother of our chapter. Brother VanDeusen pointed out his long standing friendship with the chancellor, rising from the fact that he had once been Chancellor Eggars' economics teacher.
