Hunger in our Community—A Spring 2021 Status Report:

It has now been a year since Covid turned everything upside down. Where are we at in regard to hunger and food insecurity in Cook County? Organizations like the Chicago Food Depository collect data to help answer these questions.

There is hope. Estimates of food insecurity are improving. But they are still higher than pre-Covid rates. They estimate that 11.8% of Cook County residents will experience food insecurity in 2021, compared to 9.3% in pre-Covid 2019.

In addition, while the US unemployment rate was 6.2% in February, it was 9.5% in Cook County. The official figures do not reflect the full picture of the joblessness. Job recovery stalled this past winter, but is expected to improve as the year progresses. So, again, there is hope. For those who had difficulty finding work before or worked in lower paid positions, it will take much longer to see progress. So, what is the conclusion of this good news/bad news study? There is a long way to go, but we are slowly moving forward.

There are still many families in need, but there is hope for better times. And we at Operation Blessing will continue to respond to the need before us.
