From the President of the Board of Trustees



Dear Friends,

When my mother moved to Washington, D.C. to begin her married life with my father who was just beginning as a junior partner in his law firm, her sister Joan Baldwin painted a painting for her which always hung over the fireplace in our family room. It was a modern impressionist rendition of a cloud on a large rectangular canvas with a sunrise over the ocean within the cloud, and a lobster boat on the ocean checking a trap as they do in the mornings just outside our family's house. She called it "Dreaming of Maine," which was her reminder to her little sister of where "home" for them really was.

True to form, in early June after school was over, my mother was ready to leave. My poor father had to pack up the station wagon and drive us to Cape Neddick for a summer with our grandparents and aunts while he commuted back and forth as best he could from a hot and humid Washington.

Many of you live in Maine, as I will when I retire. Others like me now are only able to travel to Maine for the restricted length of time when our duties and responsibilities elsewhere allow. For some, this is for a week or a month, and for others, several months until it gets cold again, so the community that gathers is different every Sunday.

But for all of us, for however long we are there, St. Peter's by the Sea Episcopal is our common home, the place where we gather to worship God as his people in song and prayer and sacrament, to give thanks for our many blessings, and to hear his holy word.

How blessed are we then to have such a "home" and to have each other – each of us with our own stories and experiences of work, place, friends, and family.

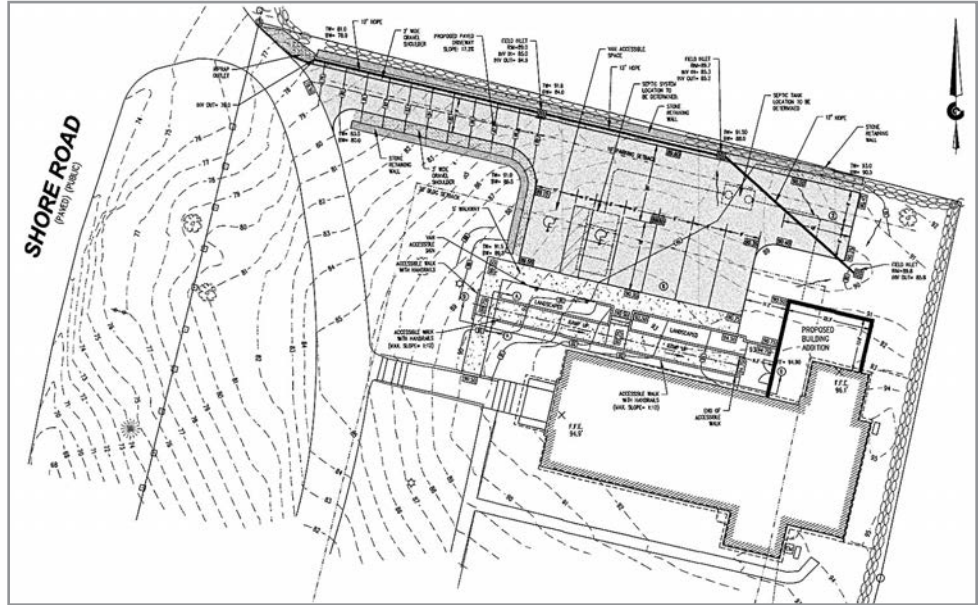

St. Peter's Addition Provides Improved Access



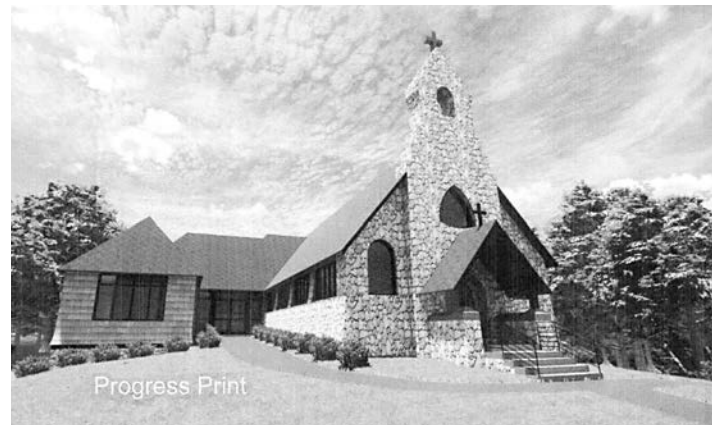
For 126 years summer congregants have climbed "Christian Hill" to access Sunday worship, weddings and funerals. Even with a circular driveway, the uneven stone pathway and very high steps provided a significant barrier to those with mobility issues. The lack of easily accessible bathroom facilities just added to the challenges endured by the faithful. As long-term St. Peter's by the Sea Episcopal Board member Louesa Gillespie has remarked, "My goal is to have easier access to the church for everyone – in my lifetime!"

By action of the Board of Trustees in February 2025, St. Peter's inked a contract with a local builder to construct a small addition – or extension – of the Sacristy on the north facade of the church. The addition will include two bathrooms, a "parlor" area where wedding groups and bereaved families can congregate, and a small work space for the St. Peter's Guild. Perhaps more importantly, the area will also provide 5-6 handicapped parking spaces, a drop-off area for those unable to withstand the rigors of climbing "The Hill," and barrier-free access to the church.

The firm of Mangel DeStefano Architects was engaged to provide various iterations of the plans and to develop the necessary infrastructure to support the expansion. After working through the plans and developing some cost-saving economies, the finalized plans were approved on a design-build basis with YFI Custom Homes.

Clearing of the property to the north of the church toward the Cliff House will begin as soon as the snow recedes and construction can proceed during the summer season. However, the breakthrough of the church wall for barrier-free access will need to wait until the church closes for the season in mid-October.

The Rev. Dr. Patrick Gahan and Kay will be in residence in May and June.

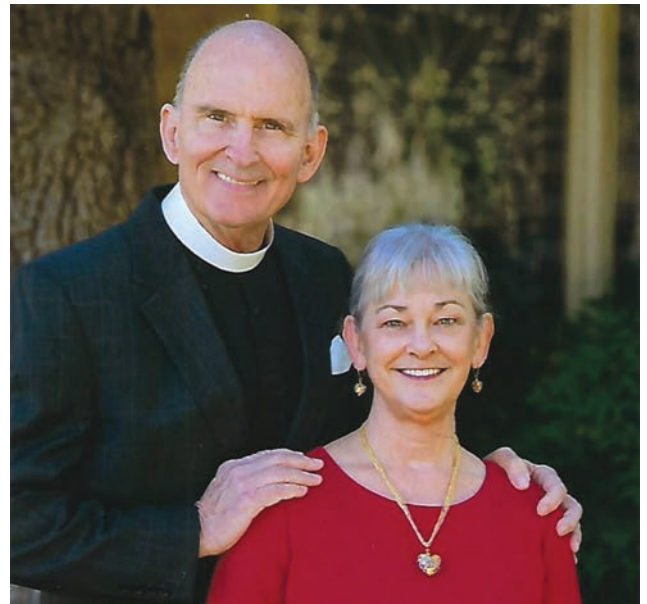

St. Peter's Community Sharing Makes It Happen

Since 2020, in the height of the COVID epidemic, St. Peter's by the Sea Episcopal has made it a practice to donate the church plate collection to well-vetted organizations whose work will benefit the wider York County Community. The York Hospital, Seeds of Hope (Biddeford), and the Hope Fund of York County Community Action Council have been yearly recipients of the yearly grants.

Last year, St. Peter's made a \$25,000 commitment over a five-year term to support the updating of the cardiac catheterization lab of York Hospital. That ambitious undertaking was made a reality with the opening of the new lab facility in February 2025. Funds from the plate offering were put toward Recovery Room #2 and, although the facility is already in use, the grand opening will occur in August of this year.

The generosity of the St. Peter's community didn't stop there. Seeds of Hope, a shelter for the unhoused in Biddeford, has made enormous progress in renovating the former Episcopal church to accommodate the increasing number of 'neighbors' who would otherwise weather the cruel winter in tents or other temporary shelter. St. Peter's has regularly donated toward the renovation efforts, and this past year saw the completion of the new commercial-style kitchen which will obviate the need for use of disposable dishware and decrease the use of prepared foods in favor of kitchen-produced foods.

The cost savings will be substantial and provide a more sustainable environment in the years ahead. Seeds of Hope re-purposed their upstairs storage area (formerly the narthex, nave, and sanctuary) to accommodate up to 55 zero-gravity chairs for overnight sleeping. Also added were two full bathrooms, an inclinator for the disabled, and ramp access to the former church. St. Peter's by the Sea Episcopal is pleased to continue its support of this worthy venture to help care for our unhoused neighbors.

Property Report Winter 2025

Winter on the Maine Seacoast can be a challenge to ocean front structures as evidenced by a tree that toppled over onto the rectory garage in early January. Luckily, no significant damage occurred and those hired to remove it got some free firewood.

Other projects went along smoothly.

Rather than maintaining the only remaining chimney, no longer used and deteriorating, we had the upper section removed and the resulting hole roofed over. Many thanks to Glenn Farrell's crew who worked in twenty-degree weather over three very windy January days to accomplish the task.

We also improved storage in the downstairs rectory by modifying the cabinets in the butler's pantry and adding cabinets in the kitchen.

The church came through the winter very well.

Historic Brasses Restored

After 97 years of use, the brass lectern from which the Word of God is read each Sunday, has been restored to its original luster. Years of salt air corrosion and liquid brass polish applications left the 1928 vintage lectern in a sorry state. For years, springtime volunteers have attempted to brighten the brass items including the lectern, crosses, altar desk, and collection plates. However, the white encrustation of Brasso in the grooves of the ornamental pieces and corrosion marks took their toll.

Last year, several smaller brass pieces were taken to C.M. Almy in Pittsfield, ME, for restoration. The results were so remarkable that it was decided to take the larger pieces for similar treatment. The decorative faces of the winged cherubs on the lectern are now clearly evident and the years of corrosion have been erase, then polished and lacquered, thus protecting them from the salt air and obviating the need for the use of Brasso.
