ITALY'S CELEBRATED HOLIDAYS, EVENTS AND RELIGIOUS FESTIVALS

JANUARY

January 6th: Epiphany which marks the end of the Christmas season, and features the folklore figure La Befana. It's a celebrates the arrival of the "Magi" (Wisemen) to visit baby Jesus

January 17: The Feast Day of San Antonio Abbot—considered to be the Father of the monks

FEBRUARY

Carnevale is generally celebrated in February. This pre lenten Festival is the highlight of the month, 40 days before Easter.

February 2: Candlemas is know as the Feast of the Candelora. It is a traditional Christian feast marking the presentation of Jesus at the Temple. And the purification of the Virgin Mary.

February 3-5: The Feast Day of St. Agatha. This is a major religious. day celebrated in Catania, Sicily. It honors the Sicilian Virgin Martyr known for her faith, chastity and patronage of breast cancer.

February 3: St. Biagio Day celebrates with a tradition of eating cakes like panettone and drinking wine for a blessing of the throat and good health.

February 14: St. Valentine's Day (La Festa di San Valentino) focuses primarily on romantic love with dinner and gifts like Baci chocolates and a tradition of love locks on bridges.

February 15: St Faustino's which is the Patron St. of Brescia and is also known as Singles Day an alternative to Valentine's Day.

February 18: Ash Wednesday is known as Mercoledì Delle Ceneri. It marks the solemn end of Carnevale festivities like Venice's famous masked balls and feasts and the beginning of Lent.

MARCH

March 8: Festa Della Donna (Women's Day) in Italy its celebrated, as a vibrant occasion honoring woman's achievements, solidarity and the fight for equality, marked by gifting bright yellow mimosa flowers.

March 9: The Feast Day of St. Frances of Rome (Santa Francesca Romana). The City 's co-patron saint known as a model of mercy, a founder of a lay Benedictine order (Oblates of Mary), and the patron Saint of drivers, with special car blessings.

March 15: The Ides of March, while not a public holiday it celebrates the anniversary of Julius Caesars assassination in 44BC, marking it date associated with betrayal and ill-fortunate , famously "Beware the Ides of March" by Shakespeare.

March 17: On this day Italy celebrates National unity, Constitution anthem and Flag Day (Festa dell'Unità Nazionale, della Costituzione e dell'Inno) marking the the anniversary of the of the proclamation of the Kingdom of Italy in 1861.

March 19: St Joseph Day Festa di San Giuseppe celebrates the foster Father of Jesus, as a patron of workers, families and the poor traditionally marked by feasting, on special foods like Zeppole. It also concedes with Italy's Father Day.

March 29: This year Palm Sunday is celebrated on March 29th. It is the Christian moveable Feast that falls on the Sunday before Easter. The Feast commemorates Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem.



PRESEPIO ITALIANO

A Living Tradition of Faith, Craft, and Community

Every December, as Italy prepares for Christmas, a familiar scene begins to appear in homes, churches, and public squares: the **presepio**. More than a simple nativity display, the Italian presepio is a cultural cornerstone—an art form, a family ritual, and a centuries-old storytelling tradition that continues to shape the country's holiday identity.

St. Francis and the Birth of a Tradition

The roots of the presepio reach back to 1223, when **St. Francis of Assisi** organized the first live nativity scene in Greccio, Italy. His intention was simple: to make the story of Christ's birth tangible for ordinary people. Using a humble cave, live animals, and local villagers, he transformed scripture into an accessible, emotional experience.

From this moment, the presepio evolved from a devotional practice into a widespread custom. By the Renaissance, churches commissioned elaborate nativity sculptures, and noble families displayed finely crafted scenes in their palaces. But it was in the homes of everyday Italians that the presepio truly took root—becoming a multigenerational craft and a cherished symbol of Christmas.

The Neapolitan Presepe:

Where Art Meets Theatrical Life

Nowhere in Italy has the presepio reached greater artistic heights than in **Naples**. The **Neapolitan presepe**, flourishing especially in the 18th century, transformed the nativity into a vibrant tableau of daily life. While the Holy Family sits at the center, the surrounding scene explodes with activity: market vendors, musicians, beggars, nobles, fishermen, tavern keepers, angels, artisans—each figure capturing a slice of Neapolitan culture.

What sets the Neapolitan style apart is its blend of sacred and secular. The contrast was intentional. In the bustling villages and alleyways, artisans used the nativity to depict the social world around them, reminding viewers that the divine enters the everyday. The result is a presepe that feels as alive as Naples itself—dramatic, layered, colorful, and endlessly detailed.

Figurines and Craftsmanship:

A Handmade Legacy

The magic of the presepio lies in its artisans. Traditionally, figurines (**pastori**) were sculpted in terracotta, with hand-painted faces and carefully tailored miniature clothing. Many included real fabric, silk, and even jewelry. Scenes were built using cork, moss, paper-mâché, and wood, all arranged into intricate landscapes of mountains, grottoes, and village streets. In Naples, **Via San Gregorio Armeno**—known as "Christmas Alley"—remains the beating heart of this craft. Workshops here produce figurines year-round, combining ancient techniques with contemporary creativity. Alongside the traditional shepherds and kings, artisans famously sculpt modern political figures, celebrities, and local characters—an evolving commentary on current events that keeps the presepe relevant and playful. The Tradition Stands Today! Across Italy, the presepio remains a treasured Christmas ritual. Families still pass down handmade figurines, churches stage large-scale nativity scenes, and towns compete in presepe exhibitions.

GIORGIO ARMANI

The Quiet Architect of Modern Elegance



When simplicity becomes a statement. On September 4, 2025, the fashion world lost one of its greatest visionaries: Giorgio Armani passed away at 91, leaving behind a legacy that reshaped how we think about clothing, identity, power, and elegance.

From Humble Beginnings to a Revolution in Style

Born on July 11, 1934, in Piacenza, Italy, Armani initially followed a conventional path — he enrolled in medical school before leaving to explore other interests. In 1957, his journey into fashion began modestly: a window-dressing job at the Milan department store La Rinascente.

After years honing his craft — including a formative period designing menswear for Cerruti 1881 — Armani took a bold leap. In 1975, alongside friend and business partner Sergio Galeotti, he launched his now-iconic fashion house, marking the beginning of a new chapter in global style.

What followed was nothing short of a revolution. Armani challenged the prevailing norms of rigid tailoring by introducing unstructured jackets and soft-shouldered suits that draped naturally over the body. This refined yet relaxed silhouette — pared down to simple trousers, a monochrome palette, and effortless tailoring — would become a signature.



captured global attention — and within years, the “power suit” became a staple of executive life, red-carpet glamour, and urban sophistication alike.

Armani's influence went beyond menswear. He blurred conventional gender boundaries by adapting masculine tailoring for women — pioneering pantsuits and structured elegance that empowered women's presence in business, culture, and beyond. As he once stated: he “softened the image of men, and hardened the image of women.”

Over decades, Armani became a red-carpet staple, dressing icons across generations — not with flamboyance, but with subtle luxury: gowns, suits, and evening wear defined by minimalist precision, impeccable fabrics, and effortless grace.

Empire of Elegance: More Than Just Clothes

Armani's vision extended beyond runway looks. Under his stewardship, the brand blossomed into a full-fledged lifestyle empire: ready-to-wear lines, haute couture under Armani Privé, accessories, fragrances, cosmetics, home furnishings, books — even restaurants and luxury hotels. At the time of his death, the business, privately held and mostly controlled by him, was valued at more than **US \$12**



billion, with revenues of billions and an influence that spanned continents. Armani's emphasis on independence — refusing buyout offers from fashion conglomerates — ensured his brand remained true to his vision. His impact also reached the arenas of sports and global events. Armani designed uniforms for Olympic teams and major football clubs, and even owned the Italian basketball club Olimpia Milano.

A Legacy That Transcends Trends

Giorgio Armani did more than design clothes: he redefined elegance, reshaped how people saw power and presence, and crafted an aesthetic that remains timeless. From wartime Italy to global runways, from retail windows to Hollywood screens, his journey transformed fashion into a language of quiet confidence.

With his passing, the world lost a creator who believed there was “no virtue whatsoever in creating clothes ... that are not practical.” Yet his most enduring gift may be this: proving that simplicity and subtlety — when guided by imagination and precision — can speak louder than flash ever could.

As the industry reflects on his life and work, it's clear: Armani didn't just dress people. He dressed generations — in elegance, in dignity, in a way that will outlast any passing trend.

Rita Levi-Montalcini (1909-2012) was an Italian-Jewish neurologist and Nobel laureate renowned for discovering the Nerve Growth Factor (NGF), crucial for nerve cell growth, earning her

the 1986 Nobel Prize in Medicine with Stanley Cohen, and significantly advancing understanding of tumors, developmental issues, and neurodegenerative diseases like Alzheimer's, all while overcoming severe anti-Semitic restrictions during WWII by setting up a secret home lab, becoming a lifelong advocate for science, and later serving as an Italian Senator for Life.

Modena is a city in Italy's Emilia-Romagna region. It's known for its balsamic vinegar and opera heritage, plus Ferrari and Lamborghini sports cars. The Enzo Ferrari Museum has exhibits on the life and work of the car designer, in his childhood home, plus iconic models in a futuristic building. CUCINA CORNER

Chicken Tetrazzini

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 20 minutes

Total Time: 40 minutes

Servings: 6

Calories: 458 kcal

Ingredients

- 8 ounces dry linguine pasta cooked to package instructions and drained (half a 1 pound package)
- 1 eight ounce pack sliced crimini (baby portabella) mushrooms
- 1 yellow onion diced
- 3 cloves garlic, finely minced
- 3 1/2 Tablespoons butter
- 3 Tablespoons all purpose flour
- 1 cup chicken stock or broth
- 1 cup milk any type (I used 2%)
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (may vary, based on saltiness of your butter, broth, parmesan)
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 1/2 cup shredded parmesan cheese divided
- 1 pound chicken thighs or breasts cooked and shredded or cut into bite-sized pieces (I used my Instant pot shredded

chicken. I have also used store-bought rotisserie chicken.)

Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees.
2. Add some cooking spray to a large non-stick pan or dutch oven, and preheat over medium heat.
3. Add onions and sliced mushrooms to the pan, and cook until tender, about 8 minutes.
4. Reduce heat to medium-low, and add the garlic, and cook another minute.
5. Add the butter to the pan (leave the mushrooms, garlic and onions in there), and let it melt.
6. Sprinkle the flour, and stir to incorporate (about 30 seconds).
7. Add the wine, and deglaze the pan using a wooden spoon to scrape up brown bits and mix in flour.
8. Add chicken stock, milk salt and pepper, and stir to incorporate.
9. Bring to a simmer and stir often (almost continuously) to avoid scorching. The sauce will thicken pretty quickly, after a minute or 2.
10. Turn off the stove, remove from heat, and add the cup of parmesan cheese, stirring to incorporate.
