the Council meets monthly to decide the business of the Company, surrounded by several paintings by old masters such as Rubens and a superb collection of wine glasses from the last 400 years or more.

Our guide explained that all swans on the Thames are owned by the Crown, the Vintners or the Dyers and he showed us the Swan Room with the Company flags used on the boat and pictures of the swan upping in progress. There was also a portrait of the Swan Master distinguished by a huge swan feather in his hat.

We afterwards had an enjoyable lunch at the Little Ship / City Livery Club and had the opportunity of making closer links among the members.






This annual award is presented to the local Muscadet wine producing region / municipality having won the most prizes for their latest vintage against other regions / municipalities.
