Electorates (Districts)

- 16 of 47 Electorates had boundaries adjusted i.e. Elizabeth, Giles, Heysen, Hurtle Vale, Kurna, Kavel, King, Lee, Light, Narungga, Ngadjuri (formerly Frome), Port Adelaide, Reynell, Stuart, Taylor and Wright.
- Seat of Frome (mid north) has been renamed as Ngadjuri.

6 Regions for Local First Nations Voice

Regions 5 and 6, had 3 female Candidates in each region and were elected for reserved 3 female positions.

- First Nations Region 1 – Kumangka Warrarna Wangkanthi (Central)
- First Nations Region 2 – Far North
- First Nations Region 3 – Flinders and Upper North
- First Nations Region 4 – Murraylands, Riverland and South East
- First Nations Region 5 – West and West Coast
- First Nations Region 6 – Yorke and Mid North

Some SA Issues to Consider

- Cost of Living Pressures (rising food, fuel, travel, energy, transport, rates and everyday costs)
- Affordable Housing/Supply, Social Housing, Rent Increases and Homelessness
- Health (ambulance ramping/delays and access to regional healthcare remain consistent issues)
- Energy Reliability (grid stability, renewables/gas transition, \$282.5M cost of scrapped hydrogen plant)
- Water Security (Murray River restoration, efficient water use, infrastructure upgrades/investment)
- Algal bloom disaster (need for coastal communities to recover from economic and social impacts)
- Education (teacher shortages, school infrastructure, childcare services and TAFE funding)
- Crime & Safety (youth crime prevention, police resourcing, community programs)
- Restrictions to freedom of speech and religious teaching (Conversion Practices Prohibition Act 2024)

Tips for Voters on How to Find Information (Electoralates, Candidates/Parties/Links etc.)

1. Find Your SA Electorate:

<https://www.ecsa.sa.gov.au/map> (interactive map - type in address in search engine at top to find electorate or First Nations Voice region). For e.g. High St, Grange SA, Australia is in electorate of COLTON and the Local First Nations Voice region of Kumangka Warrarna Wangkanthi (Central).

2. View the ballot paper order of SA Candidates shown on the Electoral Commission SA website - House of Assembly specific districts (47 electoralates in total) and Legislative Council region (11 seats) and note the Candidates, Parties, Groups and Independents. <https://www.ecsa.sa.gov.au/elections/2026-state-election/list-of-candidates>

Source the Electoral Commission website for voting instructions and other relevant election information.

3. Go to ABC News Elections SA 2026 Guides which provides electorate information, electorate borders, margin %, past election results, Candidates profiles, their photos and website links (where published) etc.

4. Source various family values and faith-based organisations and their websites such as FamilyVoice Australia. ACL has launched a website for the 2026 SA State Election <https://savotes.org.au/> providing how to vote information and details on listed Parties and Candidates (who have provided answers to questions or a statement). This information shows SA voters, the differences or similarities between the various Candidates and political Parties’ policies/values. Choose the preferred Candidate/Party for the Legislative Assembly (Lower House – 47 electoralates) and Legislative Council (Upper House 11 seats vacant) and then go to the Party or Candidate website and/or social media page to seek further profile information e.g. community work, civic ability, useful skills etc.

5. Additional information e.g. type the Candidate’s name into an internet browser search engine using quotation marks at beginning (before first name) and end of surname e.g. “Joe Bloggs”. However, for some Candidates, this method of internet searching isn’t possible; hence need to search Party/Candidate websites, social media platforms e.g. Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, X (formerly Twitter) and ABC News Elections SA 2026 Guides.

6. If in any doubt as to which is the preferred Candidate, search for the Candidate’s contact details (if available) to ask them questions e.g. policies, values, issues etc. A trustworthy recommendation for a Candidate/Party is also useful.

7. Make your decision as to the choice of Candidate/Party or Group in your preferred order for the electorate (House of Assembly) and region (Legislative Council) ballot papers. For the First Nations Voice Election, choose your preferred Candidate and follow the ballot paper instructions to number your preferred Candidate/s in your region.

8. Voters in the 2026 SA State Election who are deeply concerned about any of the issues listed on page 2 and/or family, freedom, faith and life values (which are fundamental to all human rights), will need to consider carefully how their vote will impact the next 4 years of the South Australian Parliament and the SA Government until 2030.
