During Term 4, a group of Triabunna District School senior students enjoyed three sessions at Raspins Beach with the Pacer dinghies and members of SBBC sailing group to learn, practise, improve and really come to grips with some of the essentials of dinghy sailing, an experience which will give them confidence and stand them in good stead for any sort of sailing they might choose to undertake in future years. Mr James McKean (Triabunna School) and Mr Malcolm Fergusson (SBBC) have both recently qualified as Dinghy Sailing Instructors with Australian Sailing so, with the help of other school staff and our willing Club volunteers and with the co-operation of the weather over three Fridays, the students received an excellent introduction to sailing. Several students became confident enough to take boats out by themselves and acquitted themselves admirably.

Congratulations to all involved. The students were extremely courteous and well-behaved. And so were the old fogeys!! The Club Rescue Boat was deployed on all occasions and put to good use with coaches and helpers on board, but, fortunately, was not needed for any serious rescues.

From your Commodore:

I am certainly not scratching my head wondering what to put in my report as there has been quite a lot going on this Spring.

During the Winter, MAST contracted Tas Marine Construction to dredge the channel approach to Triabunna harbour adjacent to Parkers' jetty where there was some rock obstruction causing a tight bend and narrowing of the channel. Taking a close interest in this process was Ben West (our volunteer Marina and Hardstand Manager). He suggested to our Committee that we

take advantage of the equipment being in the vicinity and do some deepening of our Club marina. Once the Council agreed to the spoil being dumped close by on the reclaimed area north of our Club, the decision was made to go ahead. Many truck-loads of silt, heavy clay and some rocks were removed in early November. I must thank Ben for spending many hours overseeing the project including removing and replacing the hinged arms on the fixed marina and organising temporary berthing of vessels. Access has been greatly improved.

Three piles were also driven by the contractors, two of which were driven on the north side of the boat ramp and they will support a floating jetty of the same type that exists at the public ramp next door. This will be our next major project.

People may have noticed that the Club entrance gate has been open during daylight hours. This is a temporary measure due to a technical failure involving the swipe-card system. The problem has been hard to pinpoint amongst the electronic wizardry but progress is being made and "business as usual" is about to resume. The phone app system is working, however, so I do urge all members to download the **PalGate App** to your phones and get familiar with using it as, although we have hope-fully fixed the card system, it will eventually be phased out.

Unfortunately, Deb West has resigned as Rear Commodore (Sail). We thank Deb for her excellent devotion to the job over the past two and a bit years and hope to see her regularly on the water and around the Club. Tim Geard has generously agreed to take over the Rear Commodore's responsibilities. So thank you, Tim!

Recently our Club received a document from Australian Sailing, "*Sailing Safety in Tasmania*" which is the result of a collaboration between Australian Sailing and MAST. The document has given yacht clubs around the state information about safety equipment, navigation light requirements for coach boats and sailing boats and much more as regards safety around clubs. In response, our Committee has nominated a sub-committee to deal with safety, more generally. Tim Geard has also generously offered to chair this sub-committee which will summarise and identify regulations that we will need to comply with. Already we have added some equipment to our Rescue Boat.

On the social front, we have had several Friday night cosy gatherings, the Seafarers Memorial Lunch and a fun Quiz Night. Christmas Party coming up! Good work (as always), Social Committee.


From your Vice-Commodores (Sail):

The race was shortened to one leg. *Vite* went out wide to cross the Eastcoaster finish line first in front of *Madiba*. This race of one leg took longer than last week's full course.

Racing at "The Pond"

Members may not be aware that there is a second tier of yacht racing occurring in Spring Bay, and it has attracted both local residents, and those who visit holiday houses in Spring Bay from time to time. The competing yachts are the internationally popular "DF65", a 65cm model designed under the rules governing the RG65 model yacht class. Racing of these amazing small craft is conducted in many countries of the world and winning skippers are recognised internationally. Local competitions are less formal and run by the "Spring Bay Radio Sailing group" in a picturesque local fresh water location. The competition is keen. Races are conducted under normal yacht racing rules, and whilst the boats are identical, handicaps assist those who are still getting the hang of operating a model via radio control. The DF65's (version 6 Pictured and recommended) are available from Hobby Warehouse at around \$300.00, considerably less if they are supplied without the radio equipment.


