Fellow members, I would prefer to talk about the season's boating, fishing sailing and socialising, but I need to talk to you about the management of the SBBC into the future. Forget about the past, other than the great memories, friendships, the excellent volunteer-built and -run infrastructure, and the lessons of history (all good things!) The challenge, as always, is to use the opportunities of the present, to secure the future.



Thanks to the work of past and present committees, volunteer helpers and members, the SBBC has a very serviceable infrastructure and healthy finances. The point needs to be made that the financial reserves are not excessive, merely prudent, when considered against the ongoing costs and more particularly the future maintenance and renewal needs of the existing infrastructure.

The ongoing well-being of the SBBC is dependant on the prudent actions and judgement of your elected volunteer committee, who are supported by a small number of regular volunteer helpers. By and large, it is the same people, year after year, until time or circumstance takes them elsewhere: a diminishing group unless there is continuous recruitment. Some of the executive committee positions involve a significant workload and it is unreasonable for members to expect other people to serve indefinitely! Nor should the SBBC simply recycle past committee members, volunteers and helpers; that would be equally unreasonable.

Panic not! Many members of our current committee are prepared to serve again should the members wish. **But, as a minimum, we must recruit a new secretary!** Leanne O'Brien has temporarily stepped back into the role as acting secretary until the AGM, but not beyond! The position description is available on the website, and Leanne would be happy to act as a mentor. Please consider if you can undertake this role! The committee is looking for ways in which peripheral parts of the secretary's role can be reallocated to ease the secretarial burden.

We also want new and preferably younger elected committee members, ideally representative of all the club members' varied interests. The same applies to works and social volunteers. Please come forward. Talk to the current committee, express your interest.

Finally, my thanks to all those who currently contribute to the operation and management of the SBBC infrastructure and activities.

On a beautiful April Sunday, 28 members and friends met at The Cannery for coffee at Dunalley.

After lovely cup of coffee, cake etc., with great service from the team of The Cannery we set off to our mystery destination.

Coal was discovered at Plunkett Point, Saltwater River in 1833. With the price of imported coal from NSW very expensive it was decided open a mine using convict labour.



The mine had quite a chequered history with the first shipment leaving in June 1834. Although conditions were atrocious, the government closed their operations in 1848, but the mine did operate in various forms til 1877. Surprisingly, 60,000 tonnes of coal was extracted.

Today, there are remains of prison cells, mine shafts etc. The historical group has erected interpretive signs which give a good description of operations, also a lot restoration work has been done.

From your Vice-Commodore (Sail):

The second half of our sailing calendar started in early February with both our Second Twilight Series and our Long Distance Series:

TWILIGHT 2023

In the first heat of our second twilight series we had a south easterly breeze. One casualty was had with *Vite* ending up on the mud hence they retired after receiving "outside assistance." Then there were six vessels to negotiate "the gate" and return to the East Coaster mark and to the finish.



Vite had a better race in the second heat! We were kept on our toes with lifts and knocks as we tacked from the East Coaster to the Paddy's buoy and a reach to the finish line.

The next race took a different "tack" with five boats at the club stuck in the mud. Just so happens Ray had cooked up a venison stew with all the trimmings. We all enjoyed the delicious dinner with even his perfect sponge cake. Race 3 was scheduled to be re-sailed on Tuesday 21, March.

Short but long for the fourth scheduled twilight. We had wind but very light from the North East. *Madiba* sent us to the Eastcoaster mark and return (shortened course). By the time we finished we were very wet and no wind! *Vite, Baiame, Madiba* and *Kooranya* neared the line to finish with our times not relevant to how close together we were.

Race five was postponed due to bad weather. It was set to be resailed on Tuesday, 28 March.

Race six sent us out to Windlass with a north, north-easterly breeze. Some confusion about which way round the buoy then I believe how many marks to go around at the Eastcoaster turn. The middle of Spring Bay seemed the best place to aim for the finishing line.

Unfortunately our two resail events had to be cancelled due to a very low tide and bad weather. John Hall in *Sagittarius* won the series.

LONG DISTANCE

February 5, the Lachlan Island Race started with a ten minute delay as we changed radio channels due to our channel being very busy. After we all started with a rush the wind ran out of power and the boats behind caught up to the leaders. A westerly, south westerly and finally a north-easterly came in to help with the last leg from Darlington to the finish line at the East Coaster. *Vite* won.

We all had the wind behind us for the start of the South Maria Race. Spinnakers flying! to the virtual mark off Green Point. Now for the tacking up the Maria coast until we passed Lachlan Island on our port side. As we approached Prosser Bay the wind was undecided between North easterly and Westerly until the strong Westerly prevailed. A hard slog to the finish! *Madiba* won.

Darlington Race was our final for the series. Raspin's buoy was discarded from our course as light South-South Easterlies were forecast. A bit slow to get around the South West marker of the Seaweed Farm. There was just enough wind up Maria's West coast for our spinnakers. We also held them across to the finish at the Eastcoaster buoy. By this time the slower boats were saturated! *Sagittarius* had cleared out earlier in the race to finish forty five minutes ahead of *Vite* and win the race.

**Vite* won the series over all.
