

Twilight Series 1

We brushed the cobwebs off to start the season by using the outer buoy at Windlass Bay. *Sagittarius* and *Thomas A* had a rush and left *Baiame* and *Vite* to finish a minute apart on the line.

The Windlass buoy was used again in the second twilight race. A moderate Easterly was enough to get around the buoy but the wind dropped hence a drifter became evident. *Vite, Madiba, Baiame* and *Farrijk* finished with a minute between each boat.

Number three race started in another Easterly. This time wet! More close finishes with *Baiame* and *Vite* six seconds apart with their elapsed times.

Thunder storms threatening and an actual hail storm but five boats braved the fourth heat. Another close finish with *Vite* and *Thomas A* with the same elapsed time and *Madiba* finishing thirty seconds earlier. A warm fire was welcoming the sailors when they arrived back at the club.

An exciting start for the fifth heat with eight boats crossing the start line at once without any mishaps. We had light North-Easterly and Easterly breezes which were fluky at times. *Vite* had a perfect race finishing second across the line. We were all quite evenly spaced. Handicap results were still very close!

We missed two twilights due to bad weather.

All seven boats were keen to get out for the sixth race. What was a very stiff south-westerly, quietened down to a very pleasant sail. *Zebedee* gave *Sagittarius* some competition to be one minute behind on the finish line.

This series is now finished and final handicap results will be announced at our Annual Dinner in April.

Summer Pennant

Our Pennant series started on October 9, 2022. This is a series of six races in Prosser Bay/ Spring Bay. The first race started with adequate wind but unfortunately did not stay. A shortened course was in order.

We welcomed Rijk Hendricks in *Farrijk* and David Rees in *Topknot* in the second race. We all had a great time with many broad reaches and moderate East-Nor-Easterlies.
