The Seafaring Adventures of Walter and Caroline Wright

Chapter 1: <u>Bass Strait Blues.</u>

Once we made the decision that it was time to do another extended cruise along the East Coast of Australia, we prepared *Sea Change* (a Seawind 1000 catamaran), getting her sea-worthy for hopefully a hassle-free cruise.

Our last crossing in 2018 from Eden NSW to Schouten Passage Tas, took three days & so we thought that if we departed from further north, Binalong Bay, we could do the crossing from Tas to Eden in just over two days.

However it ended up taking an extremely tedious four days.

We departed on 1st May with a 10 to 15 knot north-westerly, but three hours later the wind dropped to less than 5 knots & didn't get above that all the way to Eden. On the first night, east of Flinders Island we had a current resulting in a 60° difference between the heading vector & COG vector.

We never have a formal watch routine, as we find it hard to sleep while underway & so we tend to nap, half an hour here or an hour there.

We arrived at the shipping lane near Gabo Island right on dusk on the third night & this is when things got interesting.

We had to call up two ships on the VHF to make sure they could see us on AIS or radar & requesting one to alter course by 10° to port, so we could continue safely.

Sea Change dropped anchor in Nullica Bay, Eden at 12:30pm on Saturday 4th May. We made pizzas for lunch & then slept until early the next morning. (more pics on the next page)







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

Commodore's Report: (as published in our 2024 Annual Report)

My first year in the role of club commodore has been sailed in nice calm waters thanks to the support I have received from the other club committee members who all work very conscientiously on behalf of all club members.

The money the club collects from membership, hardstand and marina fees, after covering costs of running the facilities, continues to be reinvested in facilities. After dredging and pile driving last year, the next step is to provide a pontoon type jetty on the northern side of the boat ramp at an estimated total cost of \$50,000. The pontoon kit has been purchased and delivered to the club site. The next step is to prepare a landing\abutment, insert a shore pile, and assemble the pontoons. The result will be a replica of the pontoon jetty at the public ramp next door. It will make the boat ramp a first-class facility, and something we can be very proud to offer to members.

Membership seems to be stable at around 230 family memberships. Unfortunately, we have lost a few in recent times, mostly due to age, old age that is, and we are very sorry to lose the likes of Graeme Salmon who has been a long time and active member of the club; he, and wife Jill's cheerful persona will be missed at club events. But hopefully we will still see them from time to time.

It is not getting any easier to run any organization due to the ever-increasing complexity of society and the legal obligations an organization like ours needs to comply with. We seem to get a continual list of various government directives that mostly arrive via our umbrella organization, Australian Sailing. They have been helpful however, by providing links to government policy which we add to our website. So, if you are interested in Child Safe, Coll. Regs and Refuelling policies for example (to name three recent ones) please look at the club website. A special thanks to Tim Geard (and his safety committee), Greg Maddox and David Catt for the work they have done to keep us compliant.

Our Rear Commodore, Leanne O'Brien, hoped to retire at the recent AGM. Fortunately, she decided at the last minute (because there were no takers for the position) that she would give us one more year. The club has not always had a rear commodore; it has been a position first filled by David Read about 8 years ago when he saw the need for leadership of our social calendar. The position is beneficial for bringing the membership together from time to time for fun events and for keeping things ship-shape at the Club-rooms. Looking forward to the summer boating season!



Recently, Ron Bugg (one of SBBC's founding members from the 1970's and a valued member of our Club to this day) was honoured for his outstanding contributions to sailing at the *Australian Sailing -Tasmania Awards*.

And what a well-deserved recognition it was! He received the **Lifetime Achievement Award** and was inducted into the **Tasmanian Yachting Hall of Fame**.

Ron Bugg is a name synonymous with dedication, craftsmanship, and excellence in the Australian sailing community. With a steadfast commitment spanning over 56 years, Ron has significantly contributed to the sport and its community, leaving an indelible mark on Australian sailing history. (cont, P 10)



Ron has also had a long association with the Derwent Sailing Squadron (DSS). His journey with the DSS began in 1968. His remarkable dedication and contributions earned him Life Membership there for the past 12 years. Throughout his time with DSS, he was instrumental in shaping the club's direction and activities, serving in various leadership roles, including Vice Commodore and a notable four-year term as Commodore.

Ron's influence extends beyond DSS. He chaired the Tasmanian Yachting Association for four years and represented DSS as a delegate to the association. His exceptional service has been recognised by prominent organisations, including the Cruising Yacht Club Of Australia. A testament to his impact, DSS recently named their new committee boat the RL Bugg, affectionately known as "Buggy," in his honour, underlining his enduring legacy within the Squadron.

Beyond administrative roles, Ron Bugg is an experienced yacht designer and builder, a passion that has been a cornerstone of his life. His craftsmanship is renowned, with various yacht clubs and racing teams benefiting from his intricate half models and trophies. Using traditional and recycled boat-building timbers like Huon Pine, King Billy Pine, and Celery Top Pine, Ron creates models that are not only beautiful but also capture the essence of the boats and races they represent.

Ron's portfolio includes prestigious trophies such as the Iron Pot Trophy for the King of the Derwent winner and the Eddystone Point Trophy for the Launceston to Hobart Yacht Race. His craftsmanship extends to national events, with notable Rolex Sydney — Hobart Yacht Race creations (and now one for SBBC!!).

Despite his numerous achievements, Ron remains a humble figure, continuously volunteering his time with the Race Management Team, continuing to race and mentor younger sailors and serving actively on the DSS Sailing Committee. Over the past 40 years, he has crafted around 500 models, each taking two or more days to complete, reflecting his unwavering passion and dedication to sailing.

Ron Bugg's legacy is a tapestry of leadership, craftsmanship, and service that resonates not only within the Derwent Sailing Squadron community but also throughout the broader sailing world. His contributions have shaped the sport, inspired many, and set a standard of excellence that will be remembered for generations to come.

Ron and his partner, Carol, attended the SBBC Annual General Meeting on September 13th and were able to catch up with boating mates, young and old, from our Club. He was also kind enough to make a presentation to us of one of his handmade and highly-valued sailing trophies (see photo on the next page) which will bolster our ability to award trophies for some of our long-distance races in the future. The presentation was a total surprise and a very welcome one. We were all completely chuffed! Thank you and congratulations, Ron.
