Vice Commodore (sail) Report:

The first half of the 2024/25 sailing season in brief.

The 24/25 Spring Bay Boat Club season opened with a cool blustery and lumpy day. Despite this, a good roll up of yachts and power-craft saluted Ron Bugg aboard Carolyn V. Further random salutations continued in the clubhouse afterwards.

Interesting conditions also prevailed for most of the first twilight series, with only four of the races being sailable. The series was won by Bob Wilson in "Vite" closely contested by Raymond Coope and Ashley Emmerton in "Biaime" and Phil Emmerton in "Thomas A".

The latter part of the pre Christmas Tuesday night season has been the turn of the "outside twilight pennant", replacing on a trial basis the poorly patronised "Sunday Pennant". Given the excellent turn up it feels likely to be a long term series. The weather has been fickle, and with one race to go it seems that "Baiame" can't lose; "Vite" and Deb West in "Kooranya", likely to contest the minor placings in the last race. Bill Love in "Archie Boy" (formerly "Bodyguard") has joined the fleet, perhaps not the fastest yacht afloat, but very competently sailed.

The Pacer Challenge was the most hotly contested to date: six boats, 6 competing crews, three different heat winners, the final positions all down to the placings. Bruce and Frances Palmer (first overall) only just holding Nick and Will Corkhill out in the last race. By some miracle no Pacer marked the committee boat. My thanks to Jack Lockley for providing the committee boat and assisting all day with signalling and photographs, to the shore crew, Heather and Bob Wilson, Alison Wheaton and Leanne O'Brien and to Malcolm Fergusson and Ben Morice for operating the rescue boat.

East Coast Classic



Madiba was provisioned and loaded up ready to go to Schouten Island for the annual East Coast Classic. The weather was looking favourable and so we set off after lunch on Thursday 16th planning to overnight in Okehampton Bay and have a shorter trip up the following day.

But what is the saying....best laid plans of mice and men.....

We were tucked up by the beach ready for the 'gentle' Westerly that was forecast, all very pleasant and fast asleep

when at 11.30pm the anchor chain started making a noise and we could hear wind coming...not from the W...but the SE. We decided we had better move and decide what to do....Darlington?...home?. It was a bright moonlit night and as we had 15-20K from the SE decided the sensible thing would be to get going north. It was quite lumpy at times but we were getting an average 6.5kn and so in the end a good option and sailed all of the way. It was a relief though to come round the corner into the passage and drop anchor in Morey's Bay at 3am.

Thankfully our stay was uneventful after that, we had lovely weather, no strong winds needing us to hunker down, our quota of flathead and one crayfish. Sadly, we didn't see anyone else from the Club, but someone may have arrived after we left to come home. In fact, it was very quiet considering the time of year and the most that were ever anchored were eleven boats one night.

For those who have been with us in previous years, they will remember that twice we have picked up a submerged long tree trunk on our anchor. Well we didn't do that thank goodness but on the

last morning as Roy retrieved the pot, no cray, but an enormous Conger eel. It was awkward to release him at the boat and so the pot had to be

taken ashore and sort him out there. Not an easy task with his good 2m length and sharp teeth.

Once again, a lovely visit to a special part of our Island!


