Board of Trustees - President's Corner

In this edition of the President's Corner, I would like to address a couple questions posed by members during the Open Board Meeting.

1. How does the office being closed two days per week benefit property owners?

This answer is driven by multiple points that caused the BOT and Chris to think differently.

- In the past, we saw office employees sitting there waiting for someone to walk into the office with a question or a need. Those periods seemed to be followed by massive effort hour "loading" during March and September. In business, that is a clear indicator that something is designed poorly and, therefore, an opportunity exists.
- This year, for the first time we are aware of, we went back to basics on a budget. The BOT asked Chris to go through a typical effort hour month (for every employee), plus other high-volume months, and determined what effort hours were needed to perform the required tasks for that time period. Through that effort, we discovered specific times during the year when we had short falls and others we had available time.
- The BOT determined that if we leveled effort hours across the year, we could get better customer service with no wage increase and be able to use "extra time" to do moneysaving projects - Electronic voting is only one example of that utilization of time.

Those were just some of the reasons we decided to do two things:

- Change the time that the "non-dues fees were due, thus removing some of the workloads in March and September. That allowed us to spread that effort into what we considered to be slower months when we looked at "effort loading." Also, as a side note, NON-dues fees are from January to Dec 31. Not March to the end of February.
- 2. By shifting the office hours to appointments <u>only on Saturdays</u>, <u>Mondays</u>, <u>and Tuesdays</u>, productivity increased due to fewer interruptions, and we could better fit our budgeted effort hours, thus saving money overall. In addition, mistakes have decreased, and customer service has improved based on "wait times" and people standing in lines in the office.

Having said that, let me again correct a misunderstood fact about the "office being closed." It is only closed to walk-ins on Saturdays, Mondays, and Tuesdays. The office is open to people who make an appointment whenever they need it (other than Sunday). However, it does require people to be proactive.

- 2. It is disappointing that LLPOA cannot seem to establish a fully automated interface to facilitate all aspects of community needs. Why can't we fully automate?
 - We totally agree with your concept. However, all Lakes in Ohio are in the same position.
 Our technology seems to be "Homegrown" from when systems did not talk to systems.
 That is limiting all of us from moving faster into automation. It won't stop, but it makes moving forward time-consuming and more expensive.
 - The other part of reality is the fact that when we automate, we lose the portion of our Community that does not have the electronic interfaces or skills to handle the automated requirements.

• Finally, there is a segment in our Community that is pushing back on EVERY automation step we take. In some cases, it even gets very confrontative for our employees.

However, we have taken two very large steps. First, you can now pay online, thus reducing the tremendous workload in the office and helping us receive our money faster. It also helps reduce errors that are being made. Second, as mentioned above, electronic voting is now here. That will allow less expense to the voting process, which is now approximately \$1,000 every time we have a referendum. At the same time, electronic will be more accurate and less "effort hour" consuming.

We are not stopping there. Chris and I intend to be present at the next Ohio Lake Conference in April. At that time, we plan on challenging all the Ohio Lakes to pool our resources to develop a system that all the Ohio Lakes can use to bring us into this Century of automation.

Lake Life: The Plant That's Eating Cincinnati Lee Duncan

Back in early December, my son and his friend asked me to join them hiking in beautiful Mt. Airy Forest, Cincinnati's largest park. I'd been there 45 years ago when I was a student at UC, and remembered how beautiful it was, so I happily accepted the invitation. We weren't far into our journey, though, when a sinking feeling started to come over me. The leaves had fallen from the sycamores, maples, oaks, and other trees of the forest... but yet there was a solid understory of still-green woody plants for as far as the eye could see: the invasive amur honeysuckle.

Amur honeysuckle (*Lonicera maackii*) is a major ecological problem in southwest Ohio, and its impact on local ecosystems is hard to overstate. Honeysuckle was originally introduced from Asia in 1896, which was before we understood the problems that invasive species can cause. Now, 125 years later, it's become a dominant force in our landscape. While it may look harmless with its fragrant flowers and bright red berries, it's wreaking havoc on biodiversity, soil health, and water quality. While I have nothing against amur honeysuckle as a plant—it's absolutely fine in its native habitat—when I see it here it makes me sick to my stomach. Here are just a few reasons why I dislike this plant so much.

- 1. <u>It crowds out native plants.</u> Amur honeysuckle grows aggressively, forming dense thickets that block sunlight from reaching native plants. It leafs out earlier in the spring and holds its foliage longer into the fall than native species, giving it a competitive edge. Studies show that areas invaded by honeysuckle have 53% lower plant species richness and significantly fewer tree seedlings compared to uninvaded areas. This disrupts the natural regeneration of forests.
- 2. <u>It messes with both soil and water.</u> Honeysuckle alters soil chemistry by releasing chemicals that inhibit the growth of nearby plants. Its dominance also leads to soil erosion as native plants that stabilize the ground are displaced. This contributes to sedimentation in waterways, degrading water quality throughout the Ohio River watershed. Even honeysuckle's toxic leaves and berries can harm aquatic ecosystems when they wash into streams.
- 3. <u>It negatively affects wildlife.</u> Everything in nature is intertwined. Our local insects, which are at the base of the food chain, have coevolved to be able to digest the native vegetation. When honey-suckle takes over what was once a native forest, there aren't many bugs equipped to eat it. This imperils not only the insects but also the birds and other animals that depend on them for survival.
- 4. <u>It's ugly.</u> As I've said, I have nothing against the plant per se, but when I see entire hillsides that are a monoculture of nothing but honeysuckle where there used to be myriad different species of tree—it looks ugly in comparison. The dense growth of honeysuckle not only wrecks the beauty of natural landscapes but also makes forest management costly and labor-intensive. Eradication efforts often require repeated cutting or herbicide application, which are expensive, time-consuming, and have their own issues, especially in the case of chemical herbicide.

Amur honeysuckle may seem innocuous at first glance, but its long-term effects on our ecosystem are devastating. From reducing biodiversity to harming water quality and wildlife, it's a serious problem. I've done some honeysuckle removal over the years, and honestly it seems a Sisyphean task. But I hope you'll consider joining local habitat restoration projects or taking steps to remove honeysuckle from your own property—who knows, maybe eliminating invasive honeysuckle will

grow on you!



District Strategic Plan
