### Board of Trustees - President's Corner Bruce Simeone

It's Spring, which can only mean the Lake season is just around the corner. Once again, this year, I am urging people to be alert and safe on our Lake. This year, we have already had to "discuss" speeding against Yellow Flag conditions with a few fishing boats. (All had the appropriate stickers at least.) Flags are important to observe. Just 2 weeks ago, I personally had a 51-year-old friend in Florida ignore a red flag on the beach and drown due to what is believed to be a riptide. Let's have a safe and fun year. As a reminder:

Watercraft will not be permitted to operate on the lake if it is closed due to an emergency or lake maintenance. This will be indicated by a <u>red warning flag</u> or flashing red light at various points on the lake. In the event of high or low water levels, <u>yellow flags</u> or a yellow flashing light will indicate that no watercraft may operate beyond a no-wake speed. Members may be held responsible for damage or erosion caused by their wake. A yellow flag will be assumed during winter pool.

As you know, Issue 1 passed the voting process. I want to thank everyone who showed their trust by voting "Yes." Issue 2, although it narrowly failed, was very close. In my opinion, since the vote failed by a narrow margin, we hope that means the project plan is close to being correct. The CHMP team has already begun to reformulate a plan. Please read more information later in this Legend to understand more of the details.

Dredging will begin soon now that the Lake has reached "normal pool." Shannon has already been here doing maintenance on his equipment. Our goal is to have the remaining 18% of silt removed by July. We then will begin the next Phase. ODNR calls this phase stabilization. Len Pohlar has been working on the plans since the Fall of 2023. Simplistically speaking, the plans fall into 3 main categories. They are:

- 1. Stabilization in place so the property can be maintained. This would mean proper grading with grass planting so the properties can be mowed as needed.
- Removal or relocation.
- 3. Stabilization with access to the Community and contractors if dirt is needed.

As plans firm up, we will communicate what site is in each category.

If you recall my last Legend article, it is time to look at our code, compare it to ORC 5312, and modify it as needed to align as much as possible with the Ohio Revised Code. With the passing of Issue 1, Steve Russell has agreed to do that work with his Committee. In that modification, we also intend to correct contradictions, definitions, and obvious points that are out of date due to such things as outdated processes that have not kept up with technology and, if possible, reduce the sometimes lengthy wording. We will communicate that progress and, of course, have Lake meetings as a change in the Code will require the Lake to vote. #LakeLoreleiStrong

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# Clubhouse Campus Masterplan Project Todd Steele

I successfully launched the pontoon in March, as I had hoped, but to my surprise, I was the 2<sup>nd</sup> boat on the lake this year and not the first. I guess I'm not the only one who can't wait for the summer to begin! By the time you read this article, the lake will be full of boats. The bravest kids (and maybe a few of the crazier adults 12) will be back in the water. The summer will officially be underway even though Memorial Day is still around the corner.

Much has happened since we last updated the community on the Clubhouse Campus Masterplan Project. The referendum earlier this year had two components: 1) the financial stability initiative, which passed and increased the operating budget of the lake (thank you to everyone who voted yes!), and 2) the clubhouse assessment, which was voted down by only a few votes and would have funded the Clubhouse Campus Masterplan project.

Upon hearing the disappointing news that the Clubhouse plan did not pass, Committee members started reaching out to people and asking for feedback. What we heard was that members wanted more detail on the most basic restoration of the Clubhouse and wanted to understand the costs of all the components of the Campus Masterplan. We decided to launch another survey to provide more details and costs for the project and ask for any additional feedback members wanted to share. At the Annual Meeting on April 20, the Committee provided an overview of the plan with all the details on costs, and we invited all members in good standing to respond to a simple 3-question survey.

### The survey was the following:

The Base program to repair and improve the Clubhouse, net of all insurance money collected, is \$1,834,100 upfront, which is \$258 per voting member per year for 20 years. The Base includes the following:

- A renovated clubhouse interior with updated fire protection, security, AV equipment, HVAC, new electrical and plumbing, and ADA-approved facilities throughout
- Event floor space of 2700 ft<sup>2</sup> that could accommodate 160 seated guests with an overall occupancy of 235
- Opened up east wall to create a beautiful view of the lake from inside
- Updated Bavarian-feel clubhouse exterior with ADA-accessible front entrance
- 1000 ft<sup>2</sup>outside patio
- · Ample storage space for clubs
- 2 restrooms accessible from the beach

# Question 1: Would you vote for the Base program at a cost of \$258 per voting member per year? Yes or No

In addition to the Base program, the initial design of the Clubhouse Master plan included <u>Key Enhancements</u>, which were found to be important to the community members who participated in prior surveys and focus groups.





The Clubhouse Committee is taking all the feedback from the survey and members who attended the Annual Meeting and preparing for another referendum later this year to hopefully fund the restoration and expansion of the Clubhouse and all the enhancements in the Masterplan.

We are hopeful to once again have a Clubhouse that meets the diverse needs of our community. The plan creates an updated common area with wonderful views of the lake and is surrounded by a patio and fireplace for the community to enjoy. The warming kitchen and electric connections to the parking lot will allow for multiple food trucks and even caterers to help feed us consistently throughout the summer. There will be no excuses not to work out, given the expanded workout gym that is part of the plan. More boat docks on the beach, new tennis and pickleball courts to enjoy, and a walking trail that weaves around the entire area are all part of the Masterplan. The LLPOA team looks forward to the day the office and maintenance building are repaired and functional to serve our members.

Please consider voting in favor of the Clubhouse Campus Masterplan Project to fund an area we all can be proud of and will serve the community for the next 50 years.





# Roads Committee Stephen Diacont

### Hello everyone!

First and foremost, we'd like to apologize for the absence of an article in the last issue of The Legend. We have had a lot of changes being made and have spent some time with Bruce and Chris to create a better game plan for the Roads Committee operations to fall into a smoother and fairer routine.

Let me start by saying that it is no secret there are drainage issues around our community. We're working hard to prioritize the issues and have proper corrections made. We purchased a commercial elevation laser to get our own readings for ditch line elevations and to double-check areas after contractors complete work. Some of these **ditch line drainage issues** will require the removal and/ or replacement of member's driveway culverts. Don't panic! We will contact any affected member(s) directly if we have to do any work on a driveway culvert pipe at least 30 days before the potential starting day of work. We are working on an official document for this, but if you'd like more details, please feel free to contact us.

We do have a game plan in place to have the entrance lane (including the newly widened area) and exit lane grinded, repaved, and new marking lines/arrows painted this year. We've had the gravel cul-de-sacs prepped for paving, and we'll be patch paving where the dredging equipment has damaged roadways.

Moving forward through 2024, the Roads Committee will generate a 3-year plan for work that needs to be completed. This is a new process for us, and the expectation is that this will help keep issues brought to our attention from falling to the "back burner" as other issues arise throughout the year.

We look forward to presenting more updates as we complete our plans. Until then, we hope everyone enjoys themselves and stays safe!

### **Dock Renovation Craig Warner**

The completion of **Adam Warner's** Eagle Scout project is proudly announced. Adam, aged 17, along with his family, who have been residents of Lake Lorelei for 12 years, undertook the initiative. The fishing dock, situated near the store at Fisherman's Wharf, has been renovated and modified. With the assistance of his Troop 96, Adam ensured structural enhancements to the dock and installed a limited mobility access gate, facilitating easier boarding for individuals with mobility challenges. Additionally, a new ADA picnic table was purchased and set up. Adam, currently a Senior at Campbell County High School, is set to attend Morehead State University in the fall. Known to many residents for his Boat Detailing and Power Washing business, Adam received support for his project from a Lake Lorelei Donor in memory of **Linda & Curt Burge**, long-time residents of Lake Lorelei.

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

# Little Free Library 1270 Rhine Drive Ken and Kathy Skau

The first Little Free Library was built by Todd Bol in 2009 and erected in Hudson, Wisconsin. His concept was relatively simple. A Little Free Library is a structure full of books constructed in an accessible spot, often in someone's yard. However, there are really few restrictions, and some such libraries are located in public places, including parks, school yards, and hospital waiting rooms. Indeed, this movement has expanded worldwide and is now a global phenomenon. Bol's idea was to have these libraries readily available to everyone. People are encouraged to browse the books in the library. If they like what they see, they are welcome to take the book home and either replace it with another one or return the original book when finished. The motto is "Take a Book; Leave a Book". In fact, we have more books than can fit in our library. So, if anyone wants to take a book but doesn't have one to donate, we encourage you to take one anyway.



One can buy a fully assembled Little Free Library from several different sources. We chose to build our own. There are many blueprints available: some cost, some are free. We found a free plan and adapted it to our capabilities and access to materials. If you decide to build your own, you are encouraged to use recycled material or scrap material from other projects. If you google Little Free Library, you will find an amazing number of creative structures that are in use. We elected to keep ours simple as we don't have the ability to make any of the very ornate models.

Our library has been very successful. These libraries are really considered to be community projects. The Little Free Library organization lists us as the steward, and that's our approach. We have tried to keep a variety of books in many areas of interest. We keep books for children, young adults, and adults. The community has helped keep this variety as we find books donated for all age groups and many different genres.

Furthermore, we encourage others to construct Little Free Libraries. On the Little Free Library web page, we are the only library listed in the Lake Lorelei community. The success of our library indicates that there is a need for more. Constructing such a library could be a good Boy Scout or Girl Scout project or one for retired people (like us).

### **Attracting Beneficial Insects to your Yard**

Beneficial insects come in all sizes and shapes, but they all have one thing in common: they all solve problems in your yard if you can provide certain things they like. Let's start with the insects that help pollinate your flowers, tree buds, shrubs, and vegetables. These include our native honeybee, bumblebees, mason bees, and many small but important wasps. Planting the yard with some of their favorite plants is all you need to attract them, yes all the plants I will mention are food attractants to these great pollinators, so here is a list of some of the most common flowers and herbs; sunflowers, zinnias, black eye Susan, purple coneflower, asters, verbena, lantana, lavender, bee balm. This next list not only attracts pollinators but the good bugs like ladybugs and parasitic wasps who in turn feed on the bad guys (bugs); lots of herbs in this list; dill, Queens Anne's Lace, fennel, cilantro, and parsley are just some of the common herbs that attract the smaller insects that we don't pay much attention to. Attracting the beneficials to your yard plays a big role in the success of your trees, flowers, shrubs, and vegetable production. Once your garden is in full swing and things are blooming, take a walk around and notice how many insects are on these great pollinators I mentioned above. The beneficials say Thank You. 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## Women's Club Marybeth Cooper







# **KWY PINNACL**

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### Lake Life Lee Duncan

### One of our local carpenters

I was at the lake, sitting down to write this on a warm day in early April. The grass was long and green, the trees in bud, and the birds and squirrels were busy... I went out on the deck to have a drink of water and soak up some warmth before getting to work cutting the grass. It didn't take long for a very large bee to come and hover about two feet in front of me, and we had a sort of "staring contest" before it rapidly flew off. Many of you will immediately know which insect I'm talking about -- the carpenter bee.

There are around 500 species of carpenter bee in the world, but the primary one we see in our area is the eastern species Xylocopa Virginica. Some people confuse them with bumble bees, as they are about the same size. An easy way to tell them apart is to look for the carpenter bee's black "shiny hiney," which has no hair. In contrast, the bumble bee's abdomen is entirely covered with black and yellow hair.

Besides its look, there are plenty of things that set the carpenter bee apart.

While bumble bees live in extremely complex societies underground with division of labor, several generations living in the hive at the same time, and cooperation of individuals to care for offspring that are not their own, the carpenter bee does none of this. The female carpenter bee lives a singular life. She will forage for nectar, build living quarters (perhaps in the wood of your house), lay eggs, and defend the nest all by herself.

Carpenter bees are excellent flyers and can appear intimidating. For instance, the "staring contest" I mentioned could be misinterpreted as being a threatening gesture. But actually, they're not much of a threat, even to people who have an allergy to bee stings. Like other bees, the male cannot sting, and the female must be very provoked (by grabbing her and squeezing, for example) for her to reluctantly give you a sting. They're much more interested in searching for nectar, mating, and, unfortunately, tunneling into our houses.

Carpenter bees are not like termites: they don't actually eat wood. The only reason they bore their almost perfectly round half-inch holes is to create a cozy living space to raise their family. The nest is made up of many cells, often arranged in several different branches off the main tunnel, called a gallery. The gallery is where she'll lay eggs, and the offspring will grow. (Interestingly, carpenter bee eggs are very large relative to the size of the female and are some of the largest eggs of any insect.)


Of course, for 99.9 percent of the time they've existed, these bees have constructed their homes in dead trees in the forest. It's only because we've built our homes where they've lived for millennia, constructed of very appealing material, that they now torment us. Unfortunately for homeowners with wooden exteriors, these bees can do significant damage. I won't go into it here, but there are ways to battle them, which you can learn about online. While I certainly find these bees extremely frustrating, they are important and interesting creatures that occupy a valuable place in the ecosystem. I'm hoping that's something we can all get bee-hind!

# The Legend Looks Back Martha Wallace

# A brief summary of what was published each decade during the same time of year.

### 1974

- Taking frogs from the lake was prohibited at this time. Besides being cute (IMHO), they support the aquatic ecosystem. Bass find them very tasty.
- A Grandmother's Club was mentioned. They were fundraising to purchase silverware for the Clubhouse. Maybe this was the precursor to the Women's Club?
- Due to a lake-wide algae treatment, the main lake was scheduled to be CLOSED for five days in June.
- The Men's Club was newly formed by **Bill Herdman** (deceased). They focused on improvement projects around the lake. See the current CEVC article in this issue!

### 1984

- 27 NEW members were welcomed to the community in the last quarter.
- This year's B & B weekend saw over 200 members get involved with general clean-up projects around the lake. The hearty group then consumed THREE kegs of beer, 70 pounds of hamburgers, 15 pounds of hot dogs, plus 25 pounds of coleslaw, onions, and tomatoes.
- The restaurant's finances improved this year due to increased use by members.
- The bulk of this issue contained transcripts of the Annual Meeting. Finances were the majority of talking points, with an \$86,000 loss in 1983.

### 1994

- A ballot to **BAN jet skis** was mailed, received, and counted. The ban passed by 11 votes: 155 to 144. The Board decided to consult an attorney to determine the ban's legality.
- The Activities Committee hosted a DERBY DAY party at the clubhouse. Mint Juleps and "Burgoo" were served.
- Finances were much improved in 1993 as reported. Total Income was \$394,448, with Expenses totaling \$214,623. What was not reported were any major expenses that may have been delayed to the current year.

#### 2004

- A 10% decrease in the general liability insurance premium was negotiated by the Board of Trustees, but it was still over \$100,000. The Lake was considered to be high risk.
- The Board was pursuing new ways of providing security at the lake. One idea
  was to secure a grant to purchase a home for a Brown County Sherriff's
  Deputy that would serve as a sub-station/residence.
- The Fireworks Committee hosted a Line Dancing Party in April. Western dress was optional.



• The Women's Club was already hosting their annual Flower & Plant Sale during the B & B Weekend in the Clubhouse.

#### 2014

Total

- A Summer Kick-Off Weekend was being promoted to happen in June and was sponsored by all of the Clubs and Committees. Activities included a golf outing, a block party, a community 'walk & clean-up,' a fish fry, and a concert. They ended with the infamous (but FUN) Cardboard Boat Race.
- Algae was a major concern for the Water Quality Committee. Suggestions for members included 'do not feed the geese' and NOT use fertilizer on lawns (on and off the lake). Water sample testing began on May 5th.
- At this time, the use of any wake-enhancing device was BANNED.
