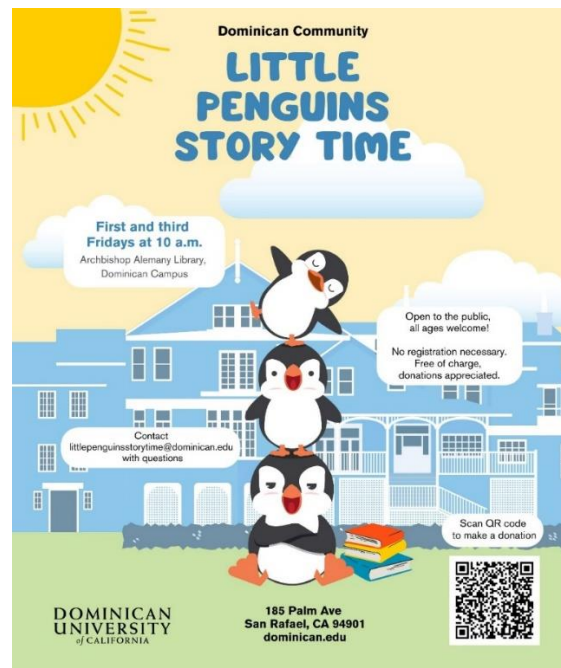
Little Penguins Story Time

Back by popular demand - How to host a Block Party!

Want to meet and welcome new neighbors down your street? Anxious to get your neighborhood together? Think about having a Block Party! It's truly simple. And the payoff is big!

All you need is:

- a front or back lawn
- A few tables for hors d'oeuvres and drinks (coolers)
- Make it a potluck: bring your favorite hors d'oeuvre and drinks
- Maybe a speaker for music
- Name tags
- Send invitations to mailboxes or email.
- Suggested time 3:00 to 6:00 pm.
- Blankets or quilts to throw out on the lawn, beach chairs

Maybe have games:

- Egg Toss. (People stand in two parallel lines facing each other. You start up very close to each other, tossing the eggs to one another. Then you step back and throw again until one couple is the winner! This is always a huge success! Have lots of eggs handy!
- Decorate your bikes! Kids love this! Have crepe paper and balloons available.
- Water balloon toss in two lines like the egg toss!
- Two-legged race (tie legs together with bandannas)
- Upon arrival, each person is given a sticker for their back with the name of a famous person, and they must ask questions of others to guess their identity. Great way to mix up the crowd.
- Guess how many candies are in the jar!

Spring and Summer is Here!

Lemonade

Share the abundance from your tree with neighbors! Add raspberries or a splash of your favorite adult beverage. Make it as tart or sweet as you like.

- 4 Cups water
- 1 Cup granulated sugar
- 1 Tbsp. grated lemon zest
- 1 1/4 Cups fresh lemon juice
- Lemon slices for garnish

Heat sugar, water and lemon zest over medium heat stirring often, until sugar dissolves. Remove from heat and cool. Pour lemon syrup into pitcher, stir in lemon juice and remaining 3 cups of water. Serve over ice and garnish with lemon slices. Enjoy!



Limoncello

- 10 lemons, washed and dried
- 1 750 ml bottle vodka (100 proof)
- 1 to 4 cups of sugar, to taste

- ~ Peel lemons skin with vegetable peeler, excluding pith
- ~ Cover peels with vodka in 1 quart jar. Screw on lid
- ~ Let vodka and lemon peels infuse out of direct sunlight for at least 4 days, up to a month for a more lemony limoncello
- ~ Strain vodka by lining a strainer with coffee filters.
- ~ Prepare sugar syrup. Use at least 1 cup of water to 1 cup of sugar, bringing the water to a simmer and stir in the sugar to dissolve. Allow to cool. Play with the ratio of sugar to water, up to 4 cups water and 4 cups of sugar. The more water the less alcoholic, milder a liqueur. More sugar will make a sweeter limoncello.
- ~ Mix the sugar syrup with the infused vodka. Stir gently to mix.
- ~ Bottle in 2 clean 16 ounce bottles or several of similar volume.
- ~ Chill the limoncello for at least 4 hours before drinking.

Signs of Spring: Look What’s Blossoming at the Dominican Pollinator Garden

Happy spring from Refugia Marin and all the caretakers of the Daniel Stralka Memorial Pollinator Garden. In the last newsletter we mentioned **curiosity, connection** and **care** in reference to an upcoming work party and signage. Almost 40 volunteers showed up at that November work party including Refugia Marin board members and staff, Dominican Black Canyon neighbors, Refugia Rangers, California Native Plant Society members, Marin Monarch Working Group members, and Dominican students, faculty and staff! Our multigenerational workforce pulled off multiple tasks including weeding, deadheading, pruning, path mulching, Douglas Iris dividing, dry creek bed rebuilding, planting, and seeding annuals.

Keeping with the curiosity, connection and care theme, we offer the following tips and tidbits this season...

Curiosity: If you’re curious about the first of our three new sign installations, stroll through the garden to check it out. Special thanks to neighbor Leslie Stone, creative director of Leslie Stone Associates, and the Dominican facilities team for helping with the design and installation of this beautiful and informative garden addition. While there, wander through to discover and enjoy all the early sage, elderberry, blue-eyed grass, clarkia, phacelia, manzanita, and ceanothus blooms.

Connection: Join us on Wednesday, April 22nd from 10:30-1:30 for a campus Earth Day celebration. We’re excited that Dominican’s Sustainability Committee invited us to table at their event. We’ll have information to share and tools to loan for an early afternoon of dry creek bed weeding.

Care: Rains slowdown in the spring and temperatures warm (don’t we know it!), allowing native plants to flower and continuing developing roots. Spring is the time to evaluate a garden’s needs depending on past winter conditions.

With our extremely wet winter and recent record-smashing heat, weeding will be the number one priority this season. Replacing existing mulch and mulching around new plantings with a 2-3” layer in late spring will help repress further weeds and retain moisture during the upcoming dry months. Make sure you’re not covering up entrances to ground-dwelling native bees and keep some bare areas for these beneficial pollinators.

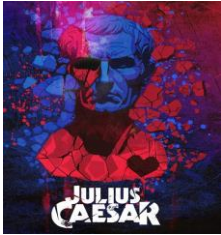
Marin Shakespeare Company

A Fun Slice of Local History: The Rise & Fall of Hotel Rafael

If you’ve ever wandered past the two mysterious concrete towers at Belle Avenue and Rafael Drive and wondered what they once belonged to... buckle up. San Rafael was *once home to one of California’s grandest Victorian hotels* - the legendary Hotel Rafael.



Built in 1888 as Marin’s first true luxury resort, the hotel boasted 101 rooms, sweeping gardens, tennis courts with grandstands, a photography darkroom, bowling alleys, donkey carts for kids, and even a 135-foot observatory with panoramic views of Mt. Tam and the Bay. It was designed to rival the Hotel del Coronado and Hotel Del Monte and for a while, it did, quickly becoming a hotspot for Bay Area Society with glamorous parties, big personalities, and even a little bit of scandal!

But the hotel’s life was as dramatic as its architecture. Ownership scandals, financial troubles, a stint as an emergency hospital during the 1918 flu pandemic, and finally an arson fire, set by a disgruntled employee in 1927 brought the grand structure to an end. The fire was set on the third floor, and burned the entire structure to the ground within three hours. Miraculously, all 134 registered guests escaped unharmed.

Today, the only remnants are those two concrete towers, once the grand entrance, quietly watching over what is now the Rafael Gardens neighborhood. It’s a fun reminder that our quiet streets were once the site of one of the most extravagant hotels in the West.

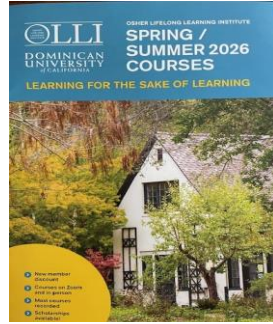

It bears repeating – Home and Property Safety Tips

The front line for protecting your home and property is you. The San Rafael PD reminds us that quite often crime in and around our home/property are those of opportunity. It was suggested that we take a more defensive approach as crime is increasing everywhere. Our little harmonious bubble of calm and tranquility is not immune to such crimes. Here are some suggestions that we can do for ourselves and our neighborhood. A neighbor shared with the Association on their old fashion light switch timer as their safety tip. Anything we can do to not invite the bad elements to take a second look at our home.

Here are some renewed suggestions:

Purchase and use automatic light switches – the old fashion manual programming is the best in this instance. Have table lamps go on/off in various locations and at various times of the day. You can program a single lamp or multiple lamps for that staggered illumination. It gives the illusion that there is someone in the house and not very attractive for those crimes of opportunity.

Lock your windows and doors – unfortunately most of us grew up in a time when it was safe to leave the house unlocked and no one would enter. But, we are in different times and even in our “bubble” there are those who will take any opportunity to take your possessions.

Do not leave weeks of newspapers in the driveway – this gives a clear signal that there is no one home and a prime target for a burglary.

Do not leave garbage cans out after your pickup day – this again gives a clear signal that no one is home. Perhaps ask a neighbor to place the empty cans back in their storage area, or if you see your neighbors cans out and you know they are away for a couple of days, take protective measures and put the cans away.

Do not share with others that you are leaving town – by all means, share with your trusted neighbors, but those who may be around your home who you do not know personally, will see this as an opportunity to take what is not theirs.

Invest in an alarm or video surveillance systems – most alarm systems are quite efficient and give that peace of mind that your home is being watched while you are away. A video surveillance system will offer more than just an alarm, but the added ability to see on your phone what is causing an alert. Some systems offer the ability to remotely speak to the intruders.

Be sure to register with the SRPD your outdoor security cameras. This will give the SRPD the added ability to know if there are cameras in an area. It is so beneficial to the PD to see for themselves any intruders. It is also a tremendous deterrent to have alarms or cameras visible. Thefts don't want to get caught and will often defer to another property without surveillance rather than the home which is protected. Firewise Presentation on Personal Preparedness

Belle Cole and Susan Clancy, Dominican Black Canyon Firewise Group

The San Rafael Fire Department and Dominican Black Canyon Firewise Group are presenting a training and educational event, Firewise Presentation on Personal Preparedness on April 25 at 10:00 am to 12:00 noon. The presentation will take place at Dominican University in the Creekside Room. This room is in the same courtyard as the Caleruega Dining Hall. San Rafael Fire will offer a 90 Minute Disaster Preparedness Course.

Marin Wildfire and local fire departments are committed to working with residents to reduce the risk of wildfire through home hardening and defensible space evaluations. During this presentation you will learn about the value of inspections and the grant application process. The Firewise Group speakers will highlight benefits on being a “Firewise Community” and offer comments on its 2026 Action Plan bringing residents up to date on the current thinking on defensible space and Zone 0 ember protection guidance. An updated action plan is among the items on a prioritized list of risk reduction projects that a Firewise Community will complete over the next 3 years. It includes suggested homeowner actions and educational activities.

What is a Firewise Community and what are its benefits?

Neighbors helping neighbors is the concept. Residents join together as a Firewise Community and take action to prepare themselves, their home and their property against the threat of wildfire and other disasters. They lookout for one another and provide those in need with assistance in event of an emergency.

Firewise approved communities offer home insurance discounts. The number of residential property insurance companies offering insurance discounts for fire-hardened homes and communities has increased. The Insurance Commissioner, Ricardo Lara, is requiring insurance companies to give discounts to residential and commercial policyholders under the Safer from Wildfires framework. The invited speaker is a leading specialist in Marin on wildfire mitigation and will be able to answer your questions on home insurance and other related subjects after the presentation on April 25th. The Dominican Black Canyon Neighborhood Association has kindly offered to assist the Firewise Group by sharing a copy of the Firewise certificate on the DBCNA website: dominicanareanews.com. Please feel free to provide this certificate to your insurance carrier.

What does the Firewise Group do?

To start with, the Firewise Group gets to know one another and develop a contact list for the neighborhood. We hold regular meetings to share information and planned events. We promote wildfire education, hold evacuation drills and a neighborhood walk and encourage participation in Chipper Day events.

Firewise Communications

We would like to make sure you are aware that the Firewise Group is not affiliated with the Dominican Black Canyon Neighborhood Association. They are a Group unto themselves and there is no cross sharing of information gathered by the Firewise Group leaders. The Dominican Black Canyon Neighborhood Association has a Disaster Preparedness Committee which helps with all disasters and not just Fire. As with all special interest groups, DBCNA purely disseminates information for our neighbors. The DBCNA website has a variety of information needed for a resident to be prepared for any disaster.
