We have our usual array of workshops throughout the year, as well as initiatives for support in your classrooms, all intended to develop our musical and teaching skills while bringing new and engaging resources into our programs. Our Winter Workshop will feature graduates of Level 3 Orff Schulwerk courses who are now full-fledged Orff specialists (Details to follow). This will be followed by our annual Children's Day events on April 16 (Winnipeg, English), 18 (Winnipeg, French) and 26 (Brandon, English). Five Orff clinicians will present a wonderful day of musical activities to Grade 5 students from around the city, which teachers are encouraged to attend as a valuable professional development opportunity.

We encourage you to attend the biennial Carl Orff Canada National Conference "Constellation" which will be held in North Vancouver. There will be many presenters bringing fresh and proven ideas and activities for you to add to your programs and build on your skills. As a special highlight at this conference, our own Manitoba Orff treasure, Morna-June Morrow, will be presented the prestigious award of Honorary Patron of Carl Orff Canada!

ADVOCACY CORNER

Well, here we are entering into a new school year. For some of us this is a new adventure. For others it is a return to the excitement of music creation and sharing. If you are a music teacher you are in a job where creativity and enjoyment is sparked daily if not hourly, or even minute by minute. I wish I had the time and the ability to capture every second that happens in my classes as I never know when those moments are going to happen.

Now some of you may be saying "no way that just isn't true!" and you're right. There are times when I miss the moment given the madness of singing goodbye to one class while singing hello to the next. Most often with very little transition time in between classes or dealing with interruptions by students or adults. But at the end of my day, in the quiet of my house, as I relive the moments within my day, I do uncover the jewels. Sometimes it doesn't even take to the end of the day. For instance, today-after dismissal I went in search of teachers to highlight what happened in music class for some of their students. At times music class is where these children shine or turn it around or respond in a way that the classroom teachers may miss as they deal with the many, many hundreds of little things that happen within their day. I know that you may be thinking there are some classes I only have to deal with for 30 minutes, while the classroom teachers deal with these personalities all day, every day. But I am here to encourage every one of you to seek out those moments of CELEBRATION and SHARE them with admin, with parents, with co-workers. Highlighting these special moments can raise awareness of what we do in our classes in a quick, non-invasive manner. After all, we want everyone to realize that music is imperative to a child's education. Don't we?

As musicians, we focus on skill development and performance. Don't hesitate to CELEBRATE the moment when someone who has struggled to get a rhythm suddenly plays it accurately! CELEBRATE! SHARE! Don't wait for that performance to showcase the growth!

If you advocate every day for what is happening in your room, maybe a big sell will be viewed more openly. There are many brochures out there telling us what we already know as music educators, but if we give our colleagues real life daily examples maybe more of them will begin to recognize it too. Advocating for proper education cannot be understated, but at the same time perhaps it is the simplest way which will prove to have the most impact!



MAKE 'N' TAKE WORKSHOP REVIEW

MOC's biennial event, Make 'N Take, occurred on Tuesday evening, September 19, at École South Pointe School. What a joy to see nearly 40 fellow music teachers at this event. The connection and support we give to each other as music educators is crucial for our survival, especially in a field where we can feel isolated. The purpose of the evening was to share ideas and create some ready to use resources for the music classroom. Participants rotated through three different 40-minute sessions and enjoyed a delicious pizza supper together.

In the first session, Piper McKinnon shared a fun rhythm reading game called "Sunk". Participants got busy cutting out colourful, card-stock fish, and constructing a fishing rod. Then with the aid of some velcro, made a game in which students can go fishing for rhythms. This activity would be excellent for reinforcing grade appropriate rhythms, doing assessments, or just a fun warm-up or center activity.

In the second session, Julie Phillips shared her impressive assessment techniques that emphasize student voice and student choice. Her detailed and thorough system of assessment is extremely child centered, individualized, and gives the students tremendous ownership over their own learning. Even adding a little bit of Julie's ideas to your current teaching practices is sure to yield great results.


In the third and final session, Jewel Casselman showed us her rhythm grids and sent participants home with their own set. Each grade level, and corresponding curricular rhythms where represented in the grids. This would be extremely useful for student assessment, as well as practice hearing, reading, and creating rhythms.

I am grateful for all the ideas, and fun, ready to use resources I received at Make 'n' Take this year. I look forward to implementing some of these ideas soon in my own music classroom.

The Orff Level 1 course was in high demand this year as it received over thirty participants. My basic Orff instructor, Amanda Ciavarelli had so much teaching knowledge to share. The Orff approach was very clear in her lessons. The seminar sessions were well planned. They included topics such as analyzing a piece to sing in elementary choir, song sharing in Indigenous culture, Jamaican songs and games, an introduction to Kodaly pedagogy and more! The afternoon presenters were as varied as they were enriching; movement with Mary-Lynn Berti, recorder with Jewel Casselman, and Choral with Avonlea Armstrong-Green. Recreation – Jane Austen Society of North America, Winnipeg Early Music Society (Ye Merrie Company vocal




