



Who Do You Say That I Am?

Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" An easy answer if you just report what other people say and what you have heard. No commitment. No revelation. No risk. But it all changes when the question is more to the point: "Who do *you* say that I am?" Tell me what you know, not what you heard. The silence is almost deafening. Vulnerability, not just anonymous reporting, is required in the asked-for response. No surprise—it is Peter who answers. Never one to hide his emotions or edit his thoughts, it is Peter who reveals what he knows, perhaps even what he is unsure of, perhaps the truth that he only hopes for but has not yet declared. "You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God" (Matthew 16:16).

Jesus responds with a prayer of blessing; the apostles, on the other hand, remain silent. Although we are very familiar with Peter's assent of faith, his declaration was almost unheard-of or unexpected from a first-century Jewish man. It was dangerous to identify someone as Messiah. It was blasphemous to name someone as the Son of the Living God. Yet, in faith and humility, Peter made the declaration and, in the naming, entrusted his life, his hope, and all that he believed firmly into the hands of Jesus. This was no simple act. This was no ordinary day. ●

ENCOUNTERS WITH THE RISEN CHRIST !

The Sacrament of reconciliation is offered on First Friday and First Saturday after the 9 am Mass, Saturdays at 3 pm, and most any reasonable time by appointment. Your identity need not be known; your anonymity is respected.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is strongly encouraged by those seriously ill, the elderly, or those facing surgery. This sacrament of Our Lord's healing & comfort is usually available on the last weekend each month after every Mass, or by appointment.

The Sacrament of Marriage is a wonderful commitment to life and love, and the Church welcomes those who are called to this noble vocation. Christian marriage involves a couple's serious deliberation, prayer, and planning. The diocesan policy requires all engaged couples to contact the pastor at least 6 months before setting any wedding date.

The Sacrament of Baptism presupposes sufficient instruction according to the age of the candidate, and a desire to practice the faith. Expectant parents are encouraged to ask the Pastor for the Church's blessing for a safe and healthy delivery. Call the Church Office to schedule instruction and the service.

Matrimony

The grace of Matrimony which a husband and wife receive to love each other and their children unselfishly comes from the Passion of Christ. They receive the grace to make their love a reflection of the love of Christ for His Bride, the Church, personified in Mary. In the flesh Mary was His Mother, but in the spirit she was His bride. Children, seeing such love in their parents, can more easily learn what love Christ had for them on the Cross.

1. What is the sacrament of Matrimony?

Matrimony is the sacrament by which a baptized man and a baptized woman bind themselves for life in a lawful marriage and receive the grace to discharge their duties.

2. What are the chief duties of husband and wife in the married state?

The chief duties of husband and wife in the married state are to be faithful to each other, and to provide in every way for the welfare of the children God may give them. Married people must learn to love unselfishly, to forget themselves so that they can spend themselves for each other. They surrender themselves to God's plans for marriage to bring children into the world and to care for them and educate them, bring them up morally good and and to grow in God's faith.

3. Why does the bond of the sacrament of Matrimony last until the death of husband or wife?

The bond of the sacrament of Matrimony lasts until the death of husband or wife because *Christ has said: "What therefore God has joined together, let no man put asunder."* *Mt 19:6, Mk 10:9*

Love must be permanent or it is not true love. It is not a feeling which comes and goes but a power to give which should be there even when feeling dies out.

4. What is meant by the unity of the sacrament of Matrimony?

By the unity of the sacrament of Matrimony is meant that the husband cannot during the life of his wife have another wife, nor the wife during the life of her husband have another husband.

5. Why is every true marriage between a baptized man and a baptized woman a sacrament?

Every true marriage between a baptized man and a baptized woman is a sacrament, because Christ Himself raised every marriage of this kind to the dignity of a sacrament. In order to love each other the way Christ loves us, husband and wife need special graces. A Christian marriage demands far more love and ability to make sacrifices than does a pagan marriage. That is why Christ made it a sacrament.

Ex: Wedding at Cana *Jn 2:1-11*.

6. Why has the Catholic Church alone the right to make laws regulating the marriages of baptized persons?

The Catholic Church alone has the right to make laws regulating the marriages of baptized persons because the Church alone has authority over the sacraments and over sacred matters affecting baptized persons.

7. What authority has the State regarding the marriages of baptized persons?

Regarding the marriages of baptized persons, the State has the authority to make laws concerning their effects that are merely civil.

8. What is necessary to receive the sacrament of Matrimony worthily?

To receive the sacrament of Matrimony worthily it is necessary to be in the state of grace, to know the duties of married life, and to obey the marriage laws of the Church.

9. In whose presence do the laws of the Church require a Catholic to be married?

The laws of the Church require a Catholic to be married in the presence of the parish priest, or the bishop of the diocese, or a priest or deacon delegated by either of them, and before two witnesses.

In so-called marriages before a justice of the peace, even if only one party is a Catholic, there is no marriage. God will not forgive him unless he gives up his sin and is married by a priest. If this is impossible, then the couple ordinarily must separate, even if they have children, since they are not really married and cannot keep on living in sin. The man must support the children, but he cannot live with the woman, since she is not really his wife.

10. What are the chief effects of the sacrament of Matrimony?

The chief effects of the sacrament of Matrimony are: *first*, an increase of sanctifying grace; *second*, the special help of God for husband and wife to love each other faithfully, to bear with each other's faults, and to bring up their children properly. "*The family that prays together, stays together*".

God gives married people special helps to bear the crosses of married life. He even guarantees them all the material things they need (such as food, shelter, etc.) provided they keep His laws in marriage, trust Him, and pray for their needs.

11. What should Catholics do to prepare for a holy and happy marriage?

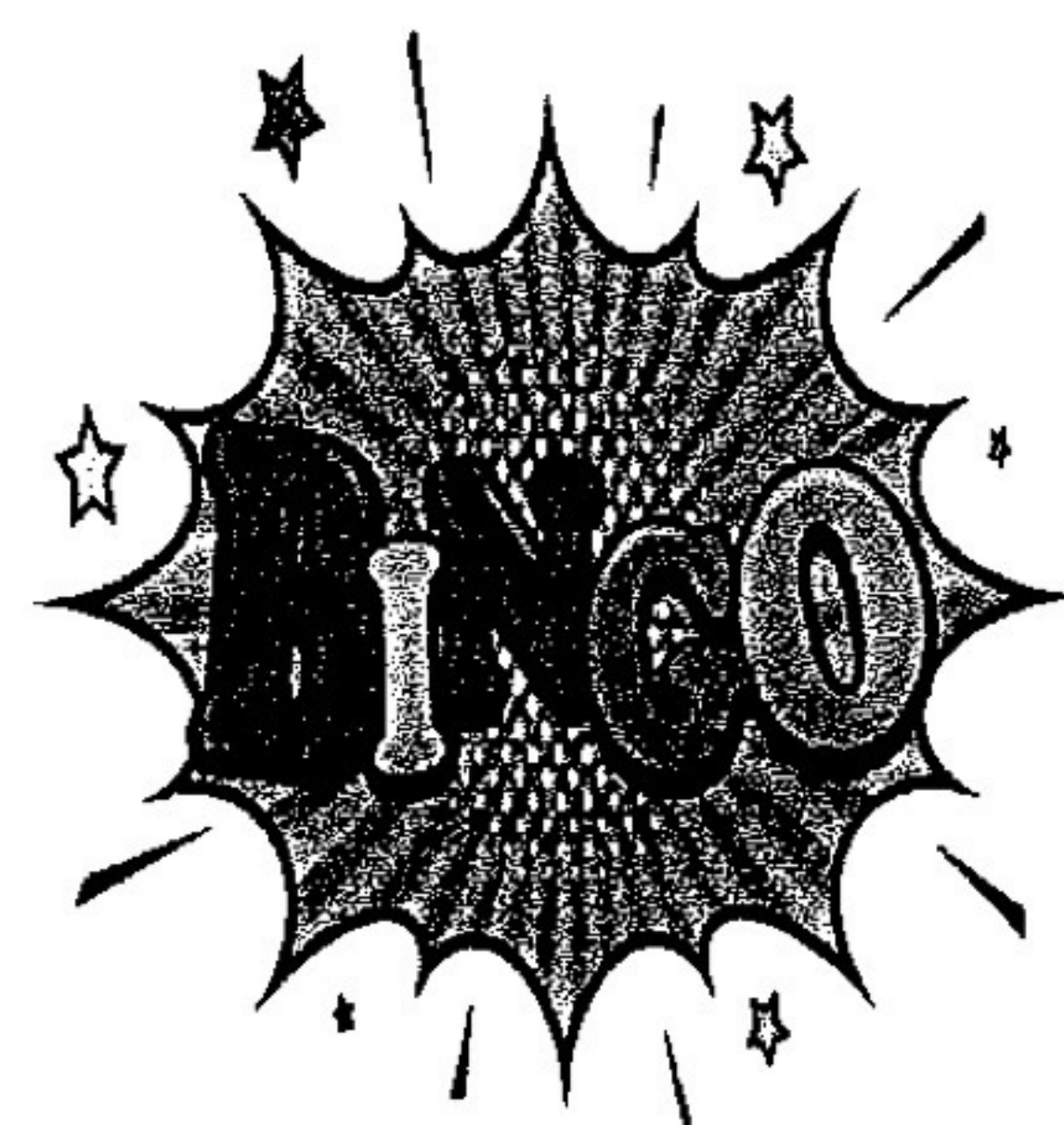
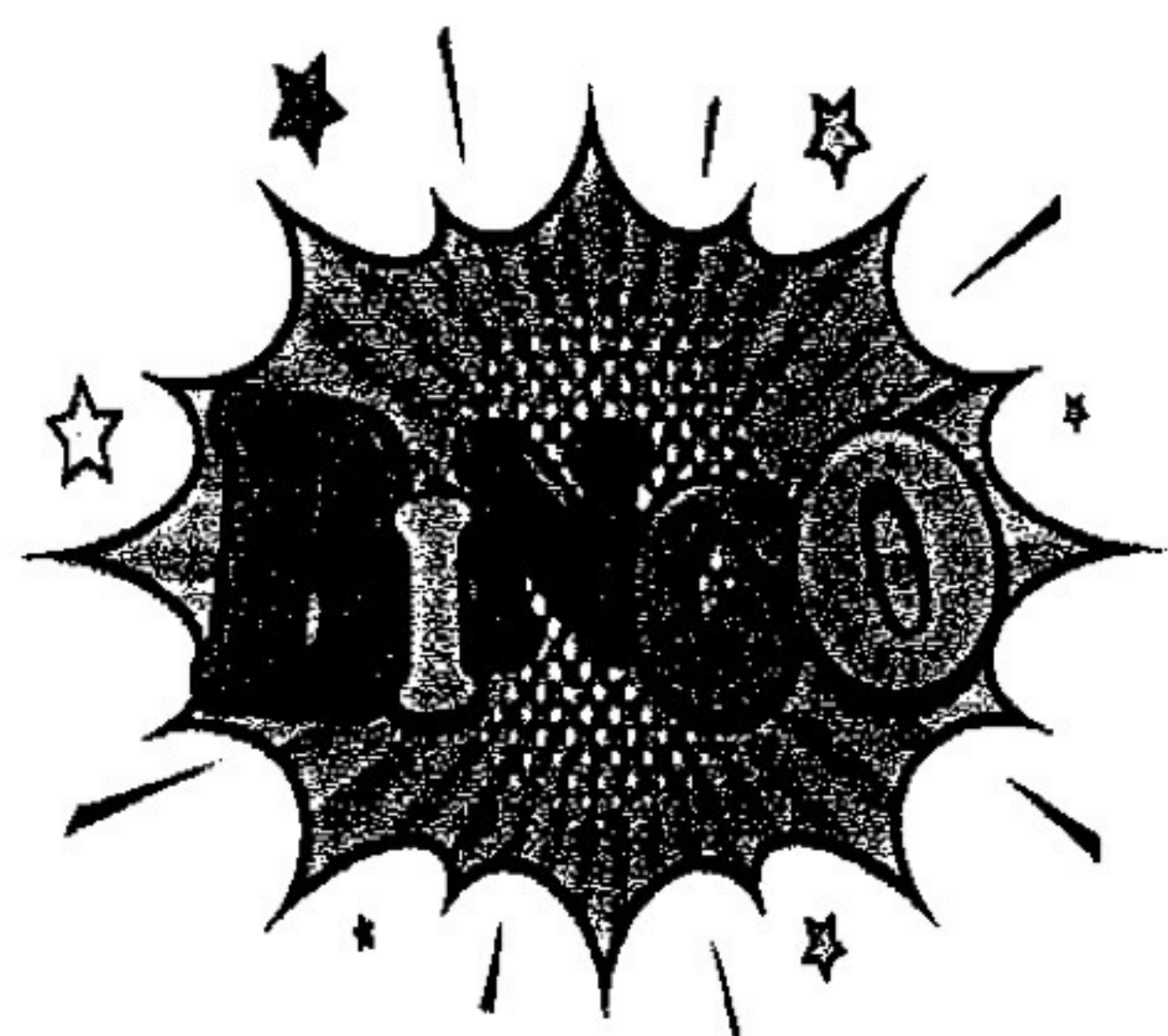
To prepare for a holy and happy marriage, Catholics should: *first*, pray that God may direct their choice; *second*, seek the advice of their parents and confessors; *third*, practice the virtues, especially chastity; *fourth*, frequently receive the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist.

12. How can Catholics best obtain God's blessing for their marriage?

Catholics can best obtain God's blessing for their marriage by being married at a Nuptial Mass and by receiving Holy Communion devoutly.

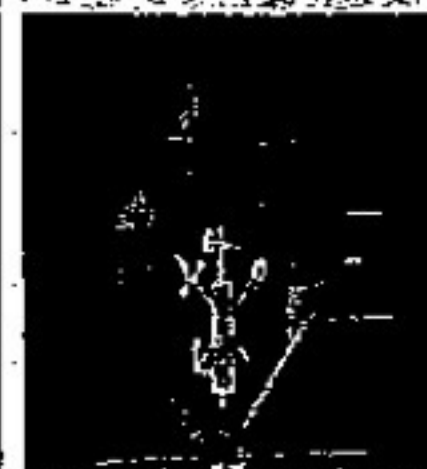

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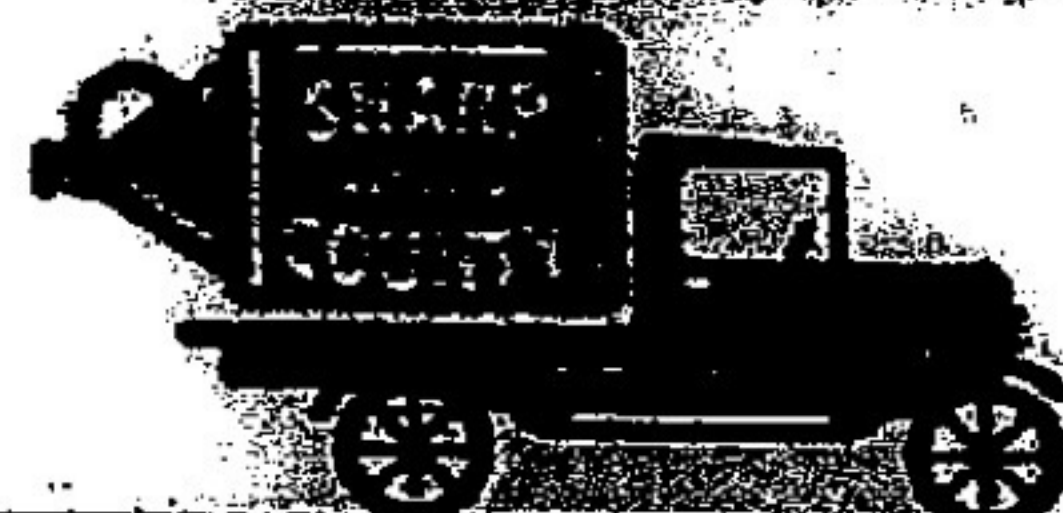

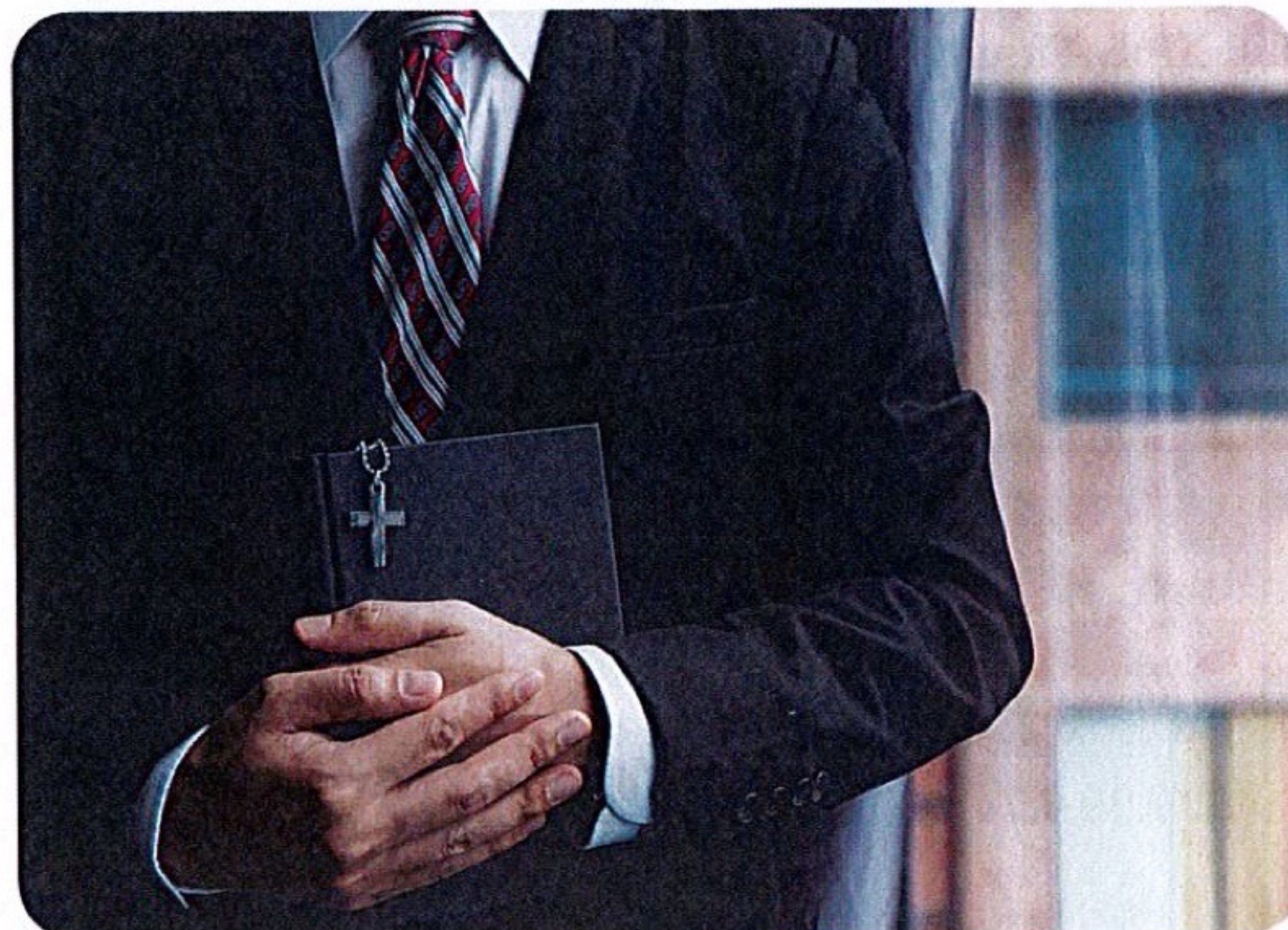

Dear Padre,

Can a non-Catholic serve and hold an office in a Catholic parish organization?

According to their knowledge, competence, and position, the Christian faithful have an obligation to assist in the necessary works of the Church and promote the common good of the parish—its worship, its apostolic mission, its charities, the care of its ministers, and its care of the poor. (See *Code of Canon Law*, 222.) In general, canon law and most diocesan regulations stipulate that members of primary decision-making entities must be active, registered Catholics who participate in the sacramental life of the Church. For example, members of a pastoral council must be “in full communion with the Catholic Church” (CCL 512 §1). However, non-Catholics—such as spouses of parishioners or experts in their fields (e.g., finance, law, architecture)—are sometimes invited to lend their skills by serving on advisory boards and committees or in other support roles that are usually in a non-voting capacity. In all cases, the pastor or bishop has the discretion to involve non-Catholics in specific initiatives. For instance, a bishop “can invite as observers to the diocesan synod other ministers or members of churches or ecclesial communities which are not in full communion with the Catholic Church” (CCL, 463 §3). A non-Catholic interested in serving should consult the local priest about available opportunities, based on the norms of a diocese. ●
