Take Up the Yoke

The invention of the yoke 6,000 years ago marked one of the great advances in human history. The yoke—a wooden beam fitted across the neck—harnessed the energy of two cattle pulling in the same direction, hastening the tilling of soil and transport of goods.

It is easy to see why, among many ancient peoples, the yoke became a symbol of subjugation. When the Roman army won a battle, they forced defeated soldiers to walk beneath a "yoke" of spears to indicate they were now in a state of servitude. The prophet Jeremiah once walked through Jerusalem wearing a yoke to warn the people they were about to be conquered by Babylon.

In Judaism, however, the Torah was also sometimes referred to as a yoke. It was a law to be submitted to, but it also was a way of life that offered an alternative to the cruel "yokes" imposed by kings. The Book of Sirach encourages youth to "Take [Torah's] yoke upon your neck; that your mind may receive her teaching.... See for yourselves! I have labored only a little but have found much" (Sirach 51:26-27).

It is unclear exactly what Jesus meant when he invited us to accept *his* yoke, but it is likely that he was echoing the invitation of Sirach. He wanted us to know that following God's law makes it possible for us to work together, accomplishing much that we could not do on our own. And that God's law is a gentle law—one that enables rather than oppresses. Are you willing to receive Christ's gentle teaching and make it your own? ●

The Sacrament of reconciliation is offered on First Friday and First Saturday after the 9 am Mass, Saturdays at 3 pm, and most any reasonable time by appointment. Your identity need not be known; your anonymity is respected.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is strongly encouraged by those seriously ill, the elderly, or those facing surgery. This sacrament of Our Lord's healing & comfort is usually available on the last weekend each month after every Mass, or by appointment.

The Sacrament of Marriage is a wonderful commitment to life and love, and the Church welcomes those who are called to this noble vocation. Christian marriage involves a couple's serious deliberation, prayer, and planning. The diocesan policy requires all engaged couples to contact the pastor at least 6 months before setting any wedding date.

The Sacrament of Baptism presupposes sufficient instruction according to the age of the candidate, and a desire to practice the faith. Expectant parents are encouraged to ask the Pastor for the Church's blessing for a safe and healthy delivery. Call the Church Office to schedule instruction and the service.

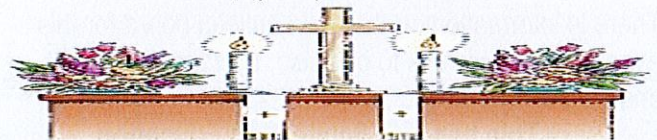

To Learn More About Penance

Part 4

Penance

1. What is the sacrament of Penance?

Penance is the sacrament by which sins committed after Baptism are forgiven through the absolution of the priest. Penance is the medicine for our soul. The sacrament of Penance is a SIGN. Like every sacrament it is a sign of three things: past, present, and future. *First*, it is a sign of the **Passion of Christ** and of His Precious Blood, which is the medicine He uses to heal our souls, *second*, it is a sign of the **healing action** of Christ on the soul through the absolution of the priest, and *third*, it is a sign of the **spiritual health** which this sacrament gives.

2. When has the priest the power to forgive sins?

The priest has the power to forgive sins from Jesus Christ, who said to His apostles and to their successors in the priesthood: "Receive the Holy Spirit; whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them; and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained." Only God can forgive sins. But He can decide for Himself how He wants to do it. And the way He has decided upon is to use priests as His instruments. We can truly say that Christ forgives sins, using the lips and hands of the priest, or we can say that the priest forgives sins by the power Christ gives him.

With what words does the priest forgive sins?

The priest forgives sins with the words: "I absolve thee from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

3. What are the effects of the sacrament of Penance, worthily received?

The effects of the sacrament of Penance, worthily received, are: *first*, the restoration or increase of sanctifying grace; *second*, the forgiveness of sins; *third*, the remission of the eternal punishment, if necessary, and also of part, at least, of the temporal punishment, due to our sins; *fourth*, the help to avoid sin in the future; *fifth*, the restoration of the merits of our good works if they have been lost by mortal sin. The fruits of a good confession are: Grace, Forgiveness, Punishment remitted, Future help and Merits restored. Those who are dead in mortal sin are raised by Christ to the life of grace. Those who are sick with venial sin have this life made healthy and strong. Just as light drives out darkness, so does the life given by this sacrament drive out the darkness of sin. The sacramental grace of Penance is a spring from which flow the helps we need to keep out of sin for the future. It is something like a man who returns from a hospital cured and is now able to use his possessions again.

4. What else does the sacrament of Penance do for us?

The sacrament of Penance also gives us the opportunity to receive spiritual advice and instruction from our confessor.

5. What must we do to receive the sacrament of Penance worthily?

To receive the sacrament of Penance worthily, we must: *first*, examine our conscience; *second*, be sorry for our sins; *third*, have the firm purpose of not sinning again; *fourth*, confess our sins to the priest; *fifth*, be willing to perform the penance the priest gives us. Our share in the fruits of a good confession depends in large measure on our preparation

6. What is an examination of Conscience?

An examination of conscience is a sincere effort to call to mind all the sins we have committed since our last worthy confession. O. _____ our conscience is the judgment or decision our mind makes on what is right and wrong. It does not depend on what we feel is right and wrong, but on what Our Lord tells us is right and wrong.

7. What should we do before our examination of conscience?

Before our examination of conscience we should ask God's help to know our sins and to confess them with sincere sorrow.

8. How can we make a good examination of conscience?

We can make a good examination of conscience by calling to mind the commandments of God and of the Church, and the particular duties of our state of life, and by asking ourselves how we may have sinned with regard to them.

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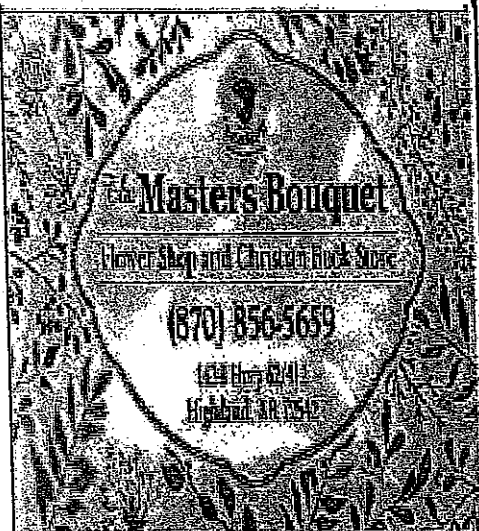

Dear Padre,

Is it appropriate to display the American flag in our church?

A diocesan bishop—who often delegates this matter to the discretion of the pastor—determines regulations on whether and how to display the American flag in a Catholic church. Displaying the flag, and a book of remembrance for those serving in the armed forces, seems to have originated in many US parishes during World War II. The practice has continued through subsequent wars and national tragedies.

While the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy advised that national symbols should not be *permanent* fixtures of a worship space, they may be appropriate at worship services on a civil holiday, etc. This same committee discouraged pastors from displaying the American flag within the sanctuary itself—a space reserved for the altar, ambo, presidential chair, and tabernacle—but instead to place the flag in the vestibule of the church together with a book of petitions for the living and deceased.

Fundamentally, a church building is where the liturgical assembly gathers as one body in Christ—the same Christ of the Eucharist who is beyond time and place, who came to unite our divisions. “The church building is a sign and reminder of the immanence and transcendence of God—who chose to dwell among us and whose presence cannot be contained or limited to any single place” (US Conference of Catholic Bishops, *Built of Living Stones*, 2000). ●
