The last few newsletters we have shared stories of gifted young men on the spectrum. As we mark our first full year as an organization, we remember why this all started. We would remind you that at age 4, Nicholas spent his preschool days hiding in a play tent or outside sleeping under the play structure because the world was often too much to bear. This October, Nicholas was confirmed. In our church there is a two year preparation process filled with community service projects, social events, sermon reviews and other requirements. When we started this I thought "I have no idea how we are going to do all of this". Well he did it, with the help and kindness of amazing people at our church and the ongoing support of his very caring father. The Sunday services were overseen by the young men and women being confirmed. Each person had to serve a role, Nicholas was required to attend three morning services; at the 10:30 service he walked up to the podium and read Psalms in front of hundreds of people and more amazing still was that he did it all in a starched white shirt, a tie, dress pants and dress shoes. So at the time of year when we reflect on where we've been and where we are now, we feel quite fortunate and we hope to inspire you to remember, Kids with Autism Can ...(we hope you'll fill in the blank).

What We've Learned

As the year comes to an end we hope that this letter finds you well and enjoying moments of peace and joy and that 2011 will be a year of great hope. We want to share some of what we have learned over the last year as we have moved along in this venture.

- There are many people invested in your child's success that you aren't even aware of. We have met people creating school environments that might work for your child or work environments that will be prepared to hire young adults on the spectrum, as they come out of school.
- Small organizations as well as large exist to provide support and for you and your family. We hope you will find a cause and give generously of both with your time and money. Many of the people we have met create organizations because there is a need, they put their heart and soul as well as huge amount of their personal time into their groups and they have large amounts of people who take advantage of what they have to offer. Please give of yourself in return. I am not speaking of us but of groups who provide meetings and social groups and speakers for your benefit. Use what they offer but do your part to help our community maintain these programs.
- ❖ There are amazing opportunities for our children as they grow! People are becoming more informed and more understanding of this very challenging diagnosis. At a local community college there are currently 24 students on the spectrum enrolled at the school. Last year there were 12 students enrolled at the same school.
- ❖ One ASU campus has at least 8 young adults on the spectrum; they are provided the extra help that is required for their success.
- ❖ The best way to improve our kid's chances for success is through early intervention and community education! We are seeing more of this. Not only is it important to educate people but to change the perception of the diagnosis. It is not the end of the world. It's just a different world. These kids may have limited verbal skills and rock and shake their hands but some children, at the same time are brilliant, or have amazing memories or teach us that you can do 18 holes of mini golf in 10 minutes or show us what honesty really looks like. The spectrum is vast but each child can be their best and offers gifts to us if only we choose to see them.

We hope you will embrace the life you have been given!

Baby It's Cold Outside

Are you feeling the chill? Are you looking for something to warm you up? Try some of this hot cocoa! It is a fun family project and everyone can join in.

Instant Cocoa with Marshmallows:

- 8 ½ cups (25.6 oz package) non-fat dry milk
- 1 ½ cups (6 oz jar) non-dairy coffee creamer
- 3 cups (16 oz package) instant chocolate drink mix for milk
- 1½ cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 bag mini marshmallows
- ½ cup sweet ground chocolate (optional)

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients. Store in an airtight container.

Yield: 16 cups of mix

To make hot cocoa in a mug, combine $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mix with 9 oz boiling water and stir. Top with whipped cream and a candy cane.
