down, knee to knee, eye to eye, and to talk about my defects of character. The book says to be honest with God, myself and another human being.

As a young child in the parochial school system, I learned to embellish what I thought were grave sins against my fellow human beings. I could not comprehend the fact that I thought without action something is just between my ears. My actions as I grew older, which were induced by the liquid spirit, were actually offensive to those around me. I am grateful that I became teachable enough in the first Four Steps to take the individual that was placed in my life by the creator, sit down and talk about these defects of character.

For me fear was a hell of a motivator. The fear of being drunk again and ending up in the same shit show that I had left. So today fear has a new definition; Face every adversity and recover. That helps me become more motivated in completing this Fifth Step.

The book is very plain about the Fifth Step. If you don't do it, you will drink again, so today I face those adversities, because recovery is a priority of my life.

Number one is to be grateful to the creator who gives me the breath of life and allows me to walk through life on a daily basis.

Expect A Miracle

She said: Step Five of Alcoholics Anonymous states: "Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs." On paper, it sounds simple—but in practice, Step Five asks for a kind of honesty, vulnerability, and humility that doesn't come easily. For me, this step was one of the hardest to face. The idea of sharing the darkest corners of my past with another person filled me with fear. I worried about judgment, rejection, and being seen differently. It was a challenge to break through the isolation I had clung to for so long.

My sponsor reminded me that "solitary self-appraisal is insufficient," as the Big Book says. She told me that until I was willing to speak the truth out loud—without holding back—I would still be living a double life, caught in shame and secrecy. She didn't push me, but she stayed close, encouraging me to trust the process. She shared that when she did her Fifth Step, it was the first time she truly felt free. That gave me hope.

So I followed her lead. I prayed before we began, asking God for courage and honesty. I read my Fourth Step inventory aloud—every resentment, every fear, every secret behavior and pattern I had carried. There were moments I wanted to skip over certain things or soften the truth, but my sponsor gently reminded me to "pocket my pride" and keep going. When I finally finished, something unexpected happened: I felt relief. I wasn't crushed by shame. Instead, I felt lighter, like I had laid down a heavy burden I didn't even know I'd been carrying.

She Said (cont) The promises of Step Five began to come true almost immediately. I "could look the world in the eye," and felt a sense of peace and ease I hadn't known in years. My fears began to fall from me. I realized that by being honest with another human being, I had confirmed that I was finally being honest with myself—and with God. The loneliness I had lived with for so long began to fade, replaced by a feeling of belonging and connection.

Afterward, I sat quietly, as the Big Book suggests, and thanked God from the bottom of my heart that I knew Him better. I began to feel the presence of a loving power guiding me forward. For the first time in a long time, I didn't feel broken—I felt whole.

Today, Step Five continues to shape my recovery and my life. It taught me that connection heals what secrecy breaks. It showed me that humility is not about shame, but about truth and willingness. It gave me a foundation of honesty and spiritual growth that I carry into all my relationships. Step Five didn't just help me stay sober—it gave me the chance to live free.

The Best of Big Book Dave: May in Our History:

May 1939: In A.A.'s beginning the first "Intergroup" was called the "Central Committee" in Cleveland, Ohio. This was 4 years after our cofounders first met; a committee of 7, including Dr. Bob was meeting once a month to 'coordinate' efforts regarding sponsorship and hospitalizations. Dr. Bob was not only a supporter, but an active participant of this committee.

May 1943: The second Intergroup office opens in Columbus, Ohio. In May 1944 Los Angeles opens their office. A.A. was not easy to find but selected groups of priests, ministers and judges in the early days had the Intergroup's phone numbers. These numbers were not listed anywhere else!

Before the first General Service Conference was held in New York, April 1951, 16 Intergroups were serving local groups. Today there are over 1800 of these offices in North America!

May 1902: Dr. William Silkworth married Marie Antoinette Bennett while he was working and developing his theory about alcoholism at Bellvue Hospital, New York City.

May 1932: Rowland H. visits with Dr. Carl Jung in Zurich, Switzerland for one year to 'cure' his alcoholism. Dr. Jung finally told Rowland there was no medical or psychological hope for an alcoholic of his type, except perhaps a spiritual conversion.

Rowland returned to the U.S. and joins 'The Oxford Group.' This is considered by most historians as the first link in a chain of events that led to the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous.

May 12th, 1935: Bill W. goes to Akron, Ohio on a business trip that fails, where he will meet Dr. Bob for the first time. Because of this meeting most archivists believe that the birth of A.A. took place one month later.

Our AA Founders



Bill Wilson

Bill Wilson was the co-founder, along with Dr Bob Smith, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. Bill Wilson believed "one alcoholic talking to

another" was key to recovery and based the AA program on the Twelve Steps, a spiritual connection to a higher power and the "Meeting" concept.

Dr. Bob Smith was the co-founder, along with Bill Wilson, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. "Smitty" or "Dr. Bob", as he was known to AA friends,

was instrumental in assisting Bill Wilson turn a small group of recovering alcoholics, known as Alcoholics Anonymous, in Akron, Ohio in the late 1930s, into a worldwide organization.
