This process of recovery kicks in to a new level. Or, I really have to learn to communicate with my sponsor on a different level, so that I can "learn the word humility." Humbly asked to remove my shortcomings. There are so many that I don't know how to be humble at times.

**So, now the illustrious** phone call, and the meeting with the sponsor, helps me learn about the process of seeking.

I know it's important to go to a meeting and share my experience, strength and hope, but sometimes I don't have to be the voice of the meeting. I could just be a participant in my own sobriety and in somebody else's.

**Being humble is** learning to be of service and not expecting that mahalo or thank you.

It's one of the secrets of this program, Service Work. It can do for you what it did for me, and that was teaching me to be teachable.

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remove our shortcomings" — is the pivot where willingness becomes action and the search for humility becomes a daily practice. It rests on three insights: that self-centered fear is our primary obstacle, that real freedom rests on spiritual rather than material aims, and that God does for us what self-reliance never could.

Before Step Seven, most of us lived by a crude formula; Happiness would come once every appetite — security, prestige, romance — was satisfied. But the harder we chased comfort, the more restless we grew, drinking to inflate dreams that never stayed inflated. Our real handicap was not lack of opportunity, but lack of humility — the perspective that places spiritual values first.

Humility begins as ego-puncturing pain. Step One's admission of powerlessness, Step Six's willingness to change, and Step Seven's prayer mark a movement from crushed self-sufficiency to chosen reliance on a Higher Power. In that prayer we offer "all of me, good and bad," trusting that defects blocking our usefulness will be lifted in God's time, not ours. The act if simple, but its implications are radical: we stop playing God and start cooperating with God.

This new stance rewrites our daily priorities. Instead of demanding that life meet our terms, we try to align with principles like honesty, tolerance, and love. Character building is no longer a grim duty but a real aim, because we've tasted the "priceless gift" of peace that follows even brief moments of right action. Where humility once felt like forced servings of humble pie, it now feels like (cont. p 2)

**She Said** (cont) nourishment-- something that turns failure and misery into insight.

Fear remains the chief activator of our defects – fear of losing what we have or not getting what we want. But Step Seven offers a remedy: reduce unreasonable demands and trust that God supplies what we truly need. Each time we pause, shift perspective, and redirect our thinking toward the "correct use of will," we align with a Power greater than ourselves.

The promise of Step Seven reaches far beyond sobriety. If humility and grace can remove the obsession with alcohol, they can help us face any other problem. The longer we practice, the clearer our "deeper object" becomes: to ;ive at peace with ourselves, others, and the God who does for us what we could not do for ourselves.

In the end, Step Seven is less a single prayer than a way of life. It asks us to choose- again and again- between the pain of self-will and the sometimes-uncomfortable growth of spiritual awakening. Humility may not erase all trouble, but it gives us a foundation strong enough to meet anything with faith, not fear. That is real freedom.

## **July in Our History:**

**July 1751:** "Sobriety Circles" are formed within most Native-American tribes. Many will evolve into or become abstinence based Native American cultural re-vitalization movements and temperance organizations.

**July 22, 1873: Dr. William Silkworth** born on a blistering 100° day in Brooklyn, New York to William and Isabelle. On the third weekend of every July there is <u>always</u> a large group of A.A.'s at his gravesite to celebrate his birthdate at the Glenwood Cemetery, Route 71, West Long Branch, New Jersey.

July 20, 1924: "The Christian Herald" magazine had an interview with Henry Ford in which he states: "Gasoline and liquor do not mix. We need to protect ourselves from fools who think they can drink and drive!"

**July 1940:** "The Philadelphia Group" sets the precedent for the 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition (the Traditions have not been written yet.) by sending ten percent of its basket money to the "Alcoholic Foundation" later re-named "The General Service Office."

**July 1947:** This issue of The Grapevine carried for the first time, the AA Preamble, written by the Grapevine's editor, Tom Y.

**July 1988:** Our General Service Office begins compiling the first list of On-line Meetings.
