"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."

He said: At first glance one would think that Step Six would be an easy one to take, however are any of the Steps easy?

I remember in early recovery I was totally convinced that God would not remove all my defects of character. I was sold on a false narrative that I had made up in my mind, that there would be no reprieve for me. That's when my sponsor had told me "To think of it as taking the best possible attitude towards a beginning of a lifetime job." So that's what I did, which at that time was the best of my ability, and it helped for a while.

After the first 5 years of recovery, and a little more understanding of how the Steps had helped me and were working in my life, I became more willing to work on all my bad behaviors. This happened as my trust in a higher power grew. Keeping in mind that I had done considerable damage with a 32-year alcohol addiction, as well as other addictions which destroyed had physically, spiritually, and mentally, I had to get real with my sponsor. It was very clear to me that this is a life and death situation and the right action needed to be taken.

Over time I eventually did develop the capacity to be "entirely ready to have my

She said: Step 6 for me flowed into the next Step without any effort on my part. Step 6 was meditative for me. It was a matter of letting God love me. Convinced my heart speaks to God with or without my intention, the key was to feel it in my heart as well as hear it in my head, without any interruption.

Speaking to God from my heart meant serious action. To prepare for the next step the prior steps were crucial. I had to be introduced to a meditative state of consciousness. I get ready by saying to myself, "God I really mean this".

Step 6 was going into the core of my being, and getting settled there long enough to keep my attention on the task. The task was coming, and I best feel real about it. For me, talking to God means life or death. I no longer wanted to be on death's doorstep. I only needed to feel better and alive again.

Being convinced I'm sick motivated me to turn to the great healer. Given hope through the first several steps, I believed that God, and this program, could save me. I found this way to connect, an opening through the doors of A.A. soberly. Alive and (Cont. p. 2)

Our Founders:



Bill Wilson - Bill Wilson was the cofounder, along with Dr. Bob Smith, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935.

Bill was the primary author of the "Big Book" of Alcoholics Anonymous, and was

the driving force to turn a small group of alcoholics in Akron, Ohio during the late 1930s into a worldwide organization. Bill Wilson believed "one alcoholic talking to another" was key to recovery and based the AA program on the Twelve Steps, a spiritual connection to a higher power and the "Meeting" concept.

Bill Wilson died in 1971, with almost 36 years sober.



Dr. Bob Smith - Dr. Bob Smith was the co-founder, along with Bill Wilson, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. "Smitty" or "Dr. Bob", as he was known to AA friends, was instrumental in assisting Bill Wilson

turn a small group of recovering alcoholics, known as Alcoholics Anonymous, in Akron, Ohio in the late 1930s, into a worldwide organization.

Bob Smith died in 1950, with 15 years of sobriety.



The Best of Big Book Dave: <u>June in Our History:</u>

June 10, 1935: Dr. Bob who becomes AA's cofounder takes his last drink on this date. June 10th is considered by most AA members and historians as the Birthdate of AA.

June 28, 1935: In the hospital Bill W. and Dr. Bob confront Bill D. a well known attorney in Akron, strapped down on a bed. (He will become AA # 3.)

June 1940: "The Serenity Prayer" is found in the N.Y. Tribune newspaper by two members and brought into our N.Y. office. Bill W. liked it so much it was re-printed and sent out with all replies to inquiries about AA from that day forward.

June 1947: This issue of The Grapevine carried for the first time, the AA Preamble, written by the Grapevine's editor, Tom Y.

June 11, 1971: Ernie G. died. He was "AA #4". Married Dr. Bob and Anne's daughter Sue but could not hold onto his sobriety and the marriage fell apart.

June 1994: Our AA Grapevine celebrated it's 50 years of continuous publication!

June 14, 1999: Time Magazine" special issue. The 100 most influential people of the 20th century. Bill W. is included with a well written article by reporter Susan Cheever.


