# Garden Island Sobriety Step Six

"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."

He said: This step may be even more confusing than the previous one, because it requires me to place myself in a state of readiness to allow God to do His work in my life. I was unsure of how this was going to be accomplished. What does it mean? How do I become entirely ready?

My experience with this step comes from the instructions in the Big Book. It states that I am to go home and take the Book off the shelf and to review the work that I have just done. Making sure that I had done a thorough job and that the work was solid, as solid as it could be having never done this before. I had identified the weak items in my inventory and had also noted some assets. The weak items need to be replaced by healthier actions and the assets need to be built upon to make them stronger. This can only be accomplished by becoming ready to have God discipline me through the principles of the steps. I must be willing to grow up through the process of recovery.

The readiness to have God remove all these defects of character is the direct result of the amount of uncomfortability that I am willing to stand in my life, before giving it to God to take away. One by one the degree to which I indulge in my defects has slowly shifted from being an active participant to an occasional spectator. This does not happen just because I think about being a better person. It happens when I start to actually be a better person. I must actively seek a spiritual solution to my human problems.

**Somewhere in the** Big Book it states that pain is the touchstone to all spiritual growth. It is a promise that comes true for me with regard to letting go of my defects of character. My defects must bring more pain (Cont. p. 2)

She said: Ah yes, another Step towards freedom! Moving forward on my path to becoming spiritually and emotionally fit. Was it easy for me to swallow this whole concept at first? I'd love to say yes, that I came home from working Step 5 with my sponsor and I was so enlightened that I was immediately and entirely ready to give ALL my defects of character over to God. Yet, that wasn't the case for me. I stalled and I even dragged my feet a little. I remembered a suggestion from my sponsor-could I be open to the possibility of being willing to be willing? Yes, I could do that and in fact by opening the crack of willingness, more willingness flowed into my heart until I was entirely ready.

Please understand there were some glaring defects of character that I was VERY willing to let go of right away. Some had already subsided just in the mere fact that I wasn't drinking and using anymore. My behavior in some areas had already begun to change. Since I had started lightening my emotional load in the previous steps there were some that obviously no longer fit into the picture of who I wanted to be. Those were the easy ones actually. It was the little less obvious, more sneaky defects that wanted to stay hidden in the corner as some false idea of self preservation. You know the ones.... the ones that you wonder what you would do otherwise if they were to be removed? Who would you be if you let "ALL" of them go? The ones where I would secretly still get a rush from getting away with something or feeling better than someone else since in my mind I can be an egomaniac with an inferiority complex. I still kinda wanted to hold onto them because I wasn't quite sure of who I would become.

The irony is that I was asking myself all these

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**He Said** *(cont.)* than joy in order for me to want God to take them from me. All of my defects of character are actually still with me and can flair up from time to time.

The biggest difference between before and now is that I am aware of them and have tools to use to prevent them from totally engulfing me life and causing me to spin out of control.

Nowhere in the one paragraph dedicated to Step 6 on page 76 does it state that I have to figure out how I am going to get rid of all these defects, what I will do in the meantime, what I will have to do differently or who I will become with all these characteristics gone. This Step only asks for me to be entirely ready and if I am not to ask God to help me with willingness. Sometimes I feel we miss the simplicity of this Step and we complicate it out of fear of the future. A loving reminder, we are only here in this moment and by being willing and ready in THIS moment we will create a smoother path for the rest that is yet to come!

#### **June Archives Report, 2013:**

#### This Month's highlight is June 1935:

It was a very difficult and uncertain time. Our country was in the grip if a major economic depression. Millions of Americans were homeless and jobless. The men were selling apples on the corners of America for 2 cents each and a war was imminent as Europe moved closer and closer to what would become World War II. But in a modest house in Akron, Ohio, a movement was started that would change the lives of millions of people for the better – worldwide.

What began in June 1935, when Dr. Bob sobered up for good with Bill W's help, was not only our community, our organization, our fellowship, it was also the birth of a new and revolutionary idea that when alcoholics talked to each other about their common problem, they could stay sober! Medicine hadn't been able to offer hope of long-term abstinence, religion hadn't done it, psychiatry hadn't. What was needed were not lectures or sermons. Bill and Dr. Bob's secret to sobriety lay in the simple process of one alcoholic identifying with another. This identification has proved so powerful that it crosses all differences of gender, race, culture, language and nationality. Today there are approximately 3 million active AA members located in 181 countries. The sun never sets on AA.

**June 1919:** "The World League Against Alcoholism", an international body formed to combat alcoholism worldwide, is launched in Washington DC.

**June 1945:** Book "God is Calling" is published, Author A.J. Russell. Our early members adopted the practice of daily readings, including our co-founders. This book has been found in personal collections after their deaths.


