

"Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human being, the exact nature of our wrongs."

He said: This step is the one that most alcoholics fear the most, because it appears to ask one to incriminate oneself for all crimes past and present. Quite the contrary, if you actually read what it says in the Big Book about this step. When I keep the weak items in my inventory in the dark they eventually become stagnant pools of infection that keep me sick. Step Five is the vaccination shot for me that allows my spirit to begin the healing process. I had to understand that the Fifth Step was the pathway for me to be able to identify with other alcoholics that did what I did, sometimes better sometimes worse so that I would be able to lose my terminal uniqueness.

The Big Book states that if I skimp on this vital step, I may not overcome drinking. We must be entirely honest with somebody if we expect to live long and happily in this world. That being said, I was still not so sure that my sponsor, Dennis needed to know everything because I did not want him to think badly of me. Wow, the ego works overtime when we are still new and trying to get and stay sober.

We did my Fifth Step in the storefront where we held our meetings because it was a safe place and there were no meetings going on between noon and six thirty. We began by saying a prayer and invited God to be a part of the process and then I began to read what I had written. Dennis just listened, for the most part. Every now and again he would ask a question or make a comment or just nod his head. Not once did he appear to want to run screaming from the room as if I was the most deviant person he had ever met. In fact when I had read everything that I had written and we discussed it all. He asked if there was anything else I wanted or needed to add. How did he *(Cont. p. 2)*

She said: Step 5 is known as being one of the most liberating steps out of the 12. It is also viewed as the scariest, since we must invoke a lot of courage to be vulnerable with someone else who will hear our deepest darkest secrets. I knew this was something I MUST do "if we expect to live long or happily in this world" pg 74. I needed to be honest with someone else that I trusted, for me that was my sponsor. It was a logical choice for me even though the Big Book gives several suggestions as to whom we can approach. I had already established trust and a safe zone with my sponsor. She already knew most of my ins and outs from working the previous 4 steps together already. What I now had to do was share my inner-most darkest spots. I wanted to shine the lights on those musty corners because it was no longer serving me to hide those secrets.

We prayed before we began invoking God to be with us, to surround me with love and to give me the courage to let it ALL go. I shared things with her that I thought for sure I was taking to the grave. Things I felt so horrible about for so many years, emotions that I had long buried with my drinking and using. Low and behold, I found out that my sponsor and I were very similar, taking away my illusion of being "different" and "unique". She lovingly shared bits and pieces of her story to let me know that there is hope of living without all the shame, guilt and self-pity that ran me for so long. I walked away from her house feeling lighter... physically, emotionally and spiritually. It was a turning point in my recovery to be able to embrace life with a clean slate.

The most important thing that he shared with me is that I never have to live that way any longer. Shame and fear do not have to be constant companions in my life. That was the beginning of many days of walking in freedom, one day at a time. I am eternally grateful to Dennis L. for showing me the pathway to freedom.



Bill Wilson

Bill Wilson was the co-founder, along with Dr Bob Smith, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. Bill Wilson believed "one alcoholic talking to

another" was key to recovery and based the AA program on the Twelve Steps, a spiritual connection to a higher power and the "Meeting" concept.



Dr. Bob Smith

Dr. Bob Smith was the co-founder, along with Bill Wilson, of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. "Smitty" or "Dr. Bob", as he was known to AA friends,

was instrumental in assisting Bill Wilson turn a small group of recovering alcoholics, known as Alcoholics Anonymous, in Akron, Ohio in the late 1930s, into a worldwide organization.



<u>The Best of Big Book Dave:</u> <u>May in Our History:</u>

May 1939: In A.A.'s beginning the first "Intergroup" was called the "Central Committee" in Cleveland, Ohio. This was 4 years after our co-founders first met; a committee of 7, including Dr. Bob was meeting once a month to 'coordinate' efforts regarding sponsorship and hospitalizations. Dr. Bob was not only a supporter, but an active

participant of this committee.

May 1943: The second Intergroup office opens in Columbus, Ohio. In May 1944 Los Angeles opens their office. A.A. was not easy to find but selected groups of priests, ministers and judges in the early days had the Intergroup's phone numbers. These numbers were not listed anywhere else!

Before the first General Service Conference was held in New York, April 1951, 16 Intergroups were serving local groups. Today there are over 1800 of these offices in North America!

May 1902: Dr. William Silkworth married Marie Antoinette Bennett while he was working and developing his theory about alcoholism at Bellvue Hospital, New York City.

May 1932: Rowland H. visits with Dr. Carl Jung in Zurich, Switzerland for one year to 'cure' his alcoholism. Dr. Jung finally told Rowland there was no medical or psychological hope for an alcoholic of his type, except perhaps a spiritual conversion.

Rowland returned to the U.S. and joins 'The Oxford Group.' This is considered by most historians as the first link in a chain of events that led to the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous.

May 12th, 1935: Bill W. goes to Akron, Ohio on a business trip that fails, where he will meet Dr. Bob for the first time. Because of this meeting most archivists believe that the birth of A.A. took place one month later.
