It was noted that the agenda notice of the meeting had been properly posted as required by law.

### PUBLIC COMMENT

Mr. Landen expressed his concern with the school zone street markings near Northfield High School located at 56<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Central Park Boulevard. He has witnessed many potentially dangerous situations with students attempting to cross the street and requested that the District consider traffic control improvements. It was noted that 56<sup>th</sup> Avenue is a City street, not a District street.

### CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

It was reported that Directors Chrisman and Fennelly had previously filed a Disclosure of Potential Conflict of Interest Statement with the Board and the Secretary of State in accordance with statutory requirements. Directors Chrisman and Fennelly's potential conflicts arise from their consulting and contract services with Forest City Stapleton, Inc., Forest City Stapleton Land, LLC or other subsidiaries of Forest City Enterprises, L.P. and its related entity, Brookfield Properties Development (collectively "Forest City"), the developer of property within the District and Westerly Creek Metropolitan District ("Westerly Creek" and together with the District, the "Districts"), including entering into various reimbursement, funding, management and service agreements with the District. Director Fennelly also was previously a director on the Board of the Master Community Association, Inc. ("MCA"), which provides property management services for the District.

Director Harris also has previously filed Disclosure of Potential Conflict of Interest Statements with the Board and the Secretary of

State in accordance with statutory requirements. Such potential conflict arises from his director or officer position with Stapleton Development Corporation, a non-profit corporation ("SDC"), which is responsible for the disposition of the development property owned by the City and County of Denver ("City") within the Districts, including entering into agreements with the Districts and with SDC Services Corp., a subsidiary company, which provides administrative services to the District under the Professional Services Agreement.

Director Hundley and Director Bartlett noted their present director positions with the MCA, where Director Bartlett also serves as Association president, and have filed Disclosure of Potential Conflict of Interest Statements disclosing such relationships with the Board and the Secretary of State in accordance with statutory requirements.

All Disclosure of Potential Conflict of Interest Statements, whether filed for this meeting or previously, are deemed continuing in nature and are incorporated into the record of the meeting.

All Directors stated that the participation of at least four of them in the meeting was necessary to obtain a quorum of the Board or otherwise enable the Board to act; that written disclosures of such potential conflicts of interest of each Director had been filed with the Board and the Secretary of State in accordance with statutory requirements; and that the nature of each Director's private interests related to their consulting, director or officer positions with either Forest City Stapleton, Inc., Forest City Stapleton Land, LLC or other subsidiaries of Forest City Enterprises, L.P, MCA, and SDC or SDC Services Corp. After each Director had summarily stated for the record the fact and nature of his private interests and had further stated that the determination to participate in voting or take any other action on any contract or other matter in which he may have a private interest would be made in compliance with Section 24-18-201(1)(b)(V), C.R.S., on an ad hoc basis, the Board turned its attention to the agenda items.

### **MINUTES**

The Board reviewed the Minutes of the October 24, 2024 regular meeting and Executive Session. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board approved the Minutes of the regular meeting and Executive Session.

### PUBLIC ART

Ms. Neal introduced Ms. Steinfurth, who will be taking over as the Public Art Consultant on January 1<sup>st</sup>, after Ms. Neal officially retires. The Board reviewed the Public Art Report submitted by Ms. Neal, a copy of which is attached hereto. Ms. Neal then presented a retrospective of the public art in the Central Park community. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board accepted the Public Art Report.

Chair Harris requested that the Board adopt a Resolution of Appreciation for Barbara Neal at the December Board meeting.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

Ms. Bevier provided the financial report through October 31, 2024. After discussion and motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board (i) accepted the Treasurer's Report and (ii) authorized the payment of all accounts, including current payables in conformance with budgetary appropriations, the encumbrance of all funds necessary for infrastructure projects, and the investment of any surplus funds.

### 2025 BUDGET

Chair Harris then opened the public hearing to consider the proposed 2025 Budget for the District, after noting that the Notice Concerning Proposed Budget was published pursuant to statute. No written comments have been received. No one present at the hearing offered any objection. Thereupon, Chair Harris closed the public hearing.

Ms. Wheeler reviewed the Budget, including projected revenues and expenditures. Discussion ensued regarding the proposed Budget and specific line items.

Upon discussion and motion duly made, seconded, and unanimously carried, the Board approved and certified the 2025 Budget and adopted the Resolution to Adopt Budget and Appropriate Sums of Money, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

### DEVELOPMENT MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Truesdale reported that there were no recommendations for the Board this month.

Director Fennelly reported that the estimated cost of the completion of Smith Road would be approximately \$15 million. Upon discussion and motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board accepted the Development Manager's report.

### LEGAL REPORT

Mr. Cockrel reported on the status of the street transfers and storm drainage fees.

Ms. Jones reported that the Long Term Finance Plan for Outstanding Debt has been submitted to the Westerly Creek Board, and Ms. Jones, Mr. Wendelin and Mr. Cockrel briefed that Board earlier in the month. The Plan will be submitted to the City on Friday, November 22<sup>nd</sup>. Thereafter, the Plan will be finalized and will be ready for public comment and approval by the Board at the December meeting. Upon discussion, the Board determined to move the December 19<sup>th</sup> meeting to December 12<sup>th</sup> in order to finalize the Plan before year end.

Mr. Cockrel presented the annual Resolution Ratifying and Approving Prior Actions. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board adopted the Resolution, a copy of which is attached hereto.

Ms. Mills then summarized the election proceedings and deadlines for the upcoming May 6, 2025 regular Board of Directors election. Self-Nomination and Acceptance forms must be filed with the District's Designated Election Official no later than February 28,

2025.

Thereupon, Ms. Mills presented the Election Resolution calling for the election as a mail ballot election; designating Micki L. Mills as the District's Designated Election Official for conducting the election; and providing authorization for the District's Designated Election Official to proceed with the conduct of the election, including the authority to cancel the election on or after March 4, 2025, if there are no more candidates than positions to be filled. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the Board adopted the Election Resolution, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this

### EXECUTIVE SESSION

Chair Harris then moved that the regular meeting of the Board be temporarily adjourned and that the Board reconvene in Executive Session for the sole purpose of providing direction to and receiving advice of General Counsel regarding Westerly Creek's request for amendments to the Intergovernmental Finance and Construction Agreement, in accordance with Section 24-6-402(4)(b), C.R.S. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The Board temporarily adjourned the regular meeting at 10:00 a.m. and reconvened in Executive Session.

The Board then reconvened in regular session at 10:15 a.m.

### CENTRAL PARK

### PUBLIC ART COLLECTION MAP and DESCRIPTION

These artworks have been commissioned by Park Creek Metropolitan District with funds from the Denver Urban Renewal Authority (DURA) which has a one percent for art provision on its bond funding. Also included are artworks commissioned by the City and County of Denver or the Regional Transportation District (RTD) and installed at Central Park, formerly known as Stapleton. The following descriptions correspond to the alphabet on the Public Art Map,

### A. Founders Fountain

Artist(s): Artscapes (Andy Dufford and Christian Muller) (Denver, CO)

**Ouebec Town Center** 

Funding: PCMD/DURA

Formerly known as the West Crescent Fountain, this installation is the heart of the 29<sup>th</sup> Avenue pedestrian and retail district. The granite and sandstone elements of this fountain environment tell the journey of water in our arid climate.

- Notice the granite dome that symbolizes the Colorado mountains; the source of our water flow.
- The grey stone "river" connects the two water features and the light runnels.
- The vortex pool symbolizes the process by which water returns to the earth to fill the aquifers.
- Sandstone columns represent the mountains and valleys carved by the flow of water.
- Light runnels, the narrow channels for water extending north and south of the grey stone "river" demonstrate human demand for water.

This project was funded in part by an allocation of \$450,000 from the public art funds provided by the Denver Urban Renewal Authority (DURA).

### B. Sam Gary Branch Library LaminaLight

This project was commissioned by Arts and Venues Denver. Steven Appleton's large light sculpture, *LaminaLight*, in the Sam Gary Branch Library gives light an active character. The artwork suspended from the ceiling in the children's library area

distributes the intense light from the complex Sundolier sun-tracking device outside on the roof brought down the large aluminum tube into the interior space of the library. Carefully placed mirrors and other reflectors bounce this light against the elliptical fabric elements, or pods. Graceful bent wood arms connect the tube to the pods and high efficiency LED lights that will interactively dim with the changing light levels during the day.

C. <u>Fire Station #26</u> Tradition

This project was commissioned by Arts and Venues Denver. *Tradition* is a two-subject bronze sculpture. It includes a life-size firefighter standing proudly with one of the Denver Fire Department's beloved comrades, 'Chief', the last firehouse dog to ride with the firefighters. The firefighter is in uniform with one leg resting on a fire hose while holding his helmet in one hand and his coat in the other. 'Chief' is looking up at the firefighter and wearing a collar from which the Maltese cross, a symbol of protection and honor, hangs. The sculpture incorporates the Denver Fire Department logo on the right side of the fireman's shirt.

### D. Central Park Boulevard Bridge Embellishments Geodes

These embellishments on the Central Park Boulevard Bridge take their inspiration from geode formations. Carved from limestone, each form is split in half and then split again to create surfaces that reveal the play of light and shadow throughout the day and at night. This project was funded in part by an allocation of \$450,000 from the public art funds provided by the Denver Urban Renewal Authority (DURA).

The artwork installed at this site in Greenway Park features a forged steel entry gate and a series of slim, graceful wrought steel poles with abstracted garden images at the top. Fruits, vegetables in various stages of development, and images of common garden tools remind viewers of the purpose of a community garden. The story poles tell of movement and change, celebrating both the endless inventiveness of nature in a plant's cycle from seed to fruit and the human work and ingenuity involved in cultivating that transformation. Story poles define the garden space and welcome viewers and gardeners from throughout the community.

This artwork is now owned by the City and County of Denver Parks Department; it is maintained by Arts and Venues Denver on behalf of Denver Parks.

### F. Montview High School/Denver School of Science and Technology Airfoil

This artwork is one of four "airfoils" fashioned from salvaged 737 horizontal tail stabilizers; they speak to the past and future definitions of Stapleton International Airport. This 16' high sculpture reflects the sky on its surface and the wind in its subtle movement. Placement here recognizes the science and technology focus of this school.

This fourth "airfoil" is on permanent loan to the school from The Park Creek Metropolitan District. The other three "airfoils" are installed in Navigator Park at Northfield Boulevard and Beeler Court.

### G. <u>Central Park Boulevard Median</u>

This median project features a large composition of 20' high kinetic steel prairie grass forms combined with calligraphic swirls depicting wind currents. The artwork spans two medians and serves as a landmark for the southern entry to Central Park.

### H. <u>Ellipse I</u> The Eye and the Horizon (After Monet)

The 15' high stone eye shape and a horizontal line of recycled stones and steel rods create an enormous frame for the surrounding neighborhood images. The view to the north is Central Park and to the south is Westerly Creek Elementary School; parks and schools are a major focus of the Central Park community. Fabricated from recycled stone and steel, this sculpture also speaks to transformation from airport to neighborhood.

These vessels demonstrate the balance between human interaction and nature. Each of the five nodes features a different grouping of vessels in arrangements that relate to human movement and the movement of the sun giving each grouping a subtle narrative, as if voices telling their story of this place.

This artwork is now owned by the City and County of Denver Parks Department; it is maintained by Arts and Venues Denver on behalf of Denver Parks.

There are two digital artwork(s) installed in the Central Park Recreation Center. *Thought Balloons* is a large black glass frame placed in the on the north wall of the long entry hallway. Interactive, the artwork playfully inserts software generated text-based dialogue over the heads of people seated on the frame.

The second project, *Staplefield*, is another interactive artwork suspended from an aluminum and plywood frame holding 2160 individually addressable multicolor LEDs arranged in a cylindrical volume. As someone moves through the space, a software application creates three-dimensional animations with the lights. *Staplefield* is now owned by the City and County of Denver Parks Department; it is maintained by Arts and Venues Denver on behalf of Denver Parks.

L. Eastbridge Town Center Talking Parking Meters

Three ordinary parking meters create this installation; each one is strategically placed at an entrance or gathering location on the Eastbridge Plaza. Each meter features an interactive sound work creating a serendipitous, playful environment attracting visitors to the plaza. The menu of approximately 64 brief sounds will be different for each meter and activated by motion sensors, not coins. M. Ellipse II The Picnic

This sculpture tableau is based on classic 18<sup>th</sup> century European paintings about picnic themes. Instead of humans, it features four elegant bronze dogs lounging on a large flat boulder and having a relaxed picnic. This combination of factors gives the sculpture a pastoral yet amusing personality which will appeal to children and adults in this intimate neighborhood park.

N. <u>Central Park Station</u> Balloon Man Running

Artist: Sean O'Meallie (Colorado Springs, CO)

Commission: \$85,000

Location: Central Park Station on Smith Road at Uintah Street

Funding: Regional Transportation District

This project was commissioned for the Central Park Station on the University of Colorado A Line by the Regional Transportation District (RTD). The 12-foot high white Forton sculpture is poised atop a 20-foot pillar and oriented toward the Central Park Station, as if it was running to catch the train. At programmed intervals at night, the sculpture will be bathed in a series of soft colors from LED lights. At one moment, it will appear to be blue, a few moments later it will transition to green, then red, etc. The luminous paint surface will shimmer under the cast light as well as sunlight. This highly visible presence will function as a landmark for the neighborhood and the station.

O. <u>Navigator Park</u> Airfoils

Three "airfoils" fashioned from salvaged 737 horizontal tail stabilizers speak to the past and future definitions of Stapleton International Airport and now Northfield and the mission of sustainability. The 16' high sculptures reflect the sky on their surface. There is a fourth "airfoil" at the entrance to Montview High School (DSST) recognizing the science and technology focus of the school.

### P. Prairie Basin Park Phantom Pavilion

Artist: Volkan Alkanoglu (Portland, OR)

Commission: \$175,000

Installed: 2018

Location: 4592 Trenton Street at Stoll Place

Funding: PCMD/DURA

This pavilion structure, inspired by the shape and coloration of a butterfly wing, offers both shade and a colorful presence in this large, landscaped park. In addition to a color palette of teal, turquoise, black, white and slate, there is a complex pattern of openings on the surface that create shadows on the ground and a play of light throughout the day. The combination of light, shadows and colors creates a sense of motion, a dynamic that is intended to attract the local community and visitors to this destination. The structure,

fabricated out of aluminum, is approximately 18' high and fills the 30' diameter circle of the promontory. Orientation of the pavilion features views of the Front Range and Longs Peak. The concrete cylinders provide seating.

Woven Light 0. **Uplands Park** (Cambridge, MA) Artist: Catherine Widgery

This project was commissioned by Arts and Venues Denver. A unique structure, it is art to inhabit and a shady refuge. It offers a visual and physical experience that will change depending on the light and the vantage point of the viewer. The horizontal slats of weathered gray acoya wood echo common snow fences but this structure has small inserts of dichroic glass in the wood creating "bits of sky" that will animate the walls and the surrounding area depending on the time of day and the season. Formed of two interlocking semicircles, this artwork is approximately 38' in diameter and 19' high. The openness of the walls accented by the colorful glass and the light from above make this an intriguing changing space.

This yellow artwork provides a unique transitory experience as one travels through this space. The east/west orientation and the views during the different seasons and times of day give an ever-changing quality as the light and shadow play on the artwork.

### A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR THE 2025 REGULAR DISTRICT ELECTION AND APPOINTING A DESIGNATED ELECTION OFFICIAL

WHEREAS, the Park Creek Metropolitan District (the "District") is a quasimunicipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Colorado and a duly organized and existing special district pursuant to Title 32, Article 1, C.R.S.; and

WHEREAS, the terms of office of Directors James Chrisman, Brian Fennelly, Shalise Hudley and vacancy expire after the successors are elected at the regular special district election to be held on May 6, 2025 ("Election") and have taken office; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of the Special District Act (the "Act") and the Colorado Local Government Election Code (the "Code") (the Act and the Code being referred to jointly as the "Election Laws"), the Election must be conducted to elect three (3) Directors to serve for a term of four years and one (1) Director to serve for a term of two years.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Directors of the Park Creek Metropolitan District in City and County of Denver, State of Colorado that:

- 1. The regular election of the eligible electors of the District shall be held on May 6, 2025, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. pursuant to and in accordance with the Election Laws, and other applicable laws. At that time, three (3) Directors may be elected to serve a four-year term and one (1) Director may be elected to serve a two-year term.
- 2. The Election shall be conducted as a mail ballot election in accordance with all relevant provisions of the Election Laws. The Designated Election Official shall prepare the Plan for conducting the mail ballot Election. There shall be no election precinct or polling place. All mail ballots shall be returned to the Designated Election Official at the address designated in the Mail Ballot Plan.
- 3. The Board of Directors hereby designates Micki L. Mills as the Designated Election Official for the conduct of the Election on behalf of the District and she is hereby authorized and directed to proceed with any action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this Resolution and of the Election Laws or other applicable laws. Among other matters, the Designated Election Official shall provide the call for nominations, appoint election judges as necessary, appoint the Canvass Board, arrange for the required notices of election, printing of ballots, and direct that all other appropriate actions be accomplished.
- 4. Self-Nomination and Acceptance forms are available from the Designated Election Official via email: mmills@cegrlaw.com. All candidates must file a Self-

Nomination and Acceptance form with the Designated Election Official no earlier than January 1, 2025, nor later than the close of business on Friday, February 28, 2025.

- 5. If the only matter before the electors is the election of Directors of the District and if, at the close of business on March 4, 2025, there are not more candidates than offices to be filled at the Election, including candidates timely filing affidavits of intent no later than March 3, 2025, the Designated Election Official shall cancel the Election and declare the candidates elected. Notice of such cancellation shall be published and posted in accordance with the Code.
- 6. If any part or provision of this Resolution is adjudged to be unenforceable or invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining provisions of this Resolution, it being the Board's intention that the various provisions hereof are severable.
- 7. Any and all actions previously taken by the Designated Election Official, the Secretary of the Board of Directors, or any other persons acting on their behalf pursuant to the Election Laws or other applicable laws, are hereby ratified and confirmed.
- 8. All acts, orders, and resolutions, or parts thereof, of the Board which are inconsistent or in conflict with this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency or conflict.
  - 9. The provisions of this Resolution shall take effect immediately.
