




rainfall, we had green grass coming into fall, which is abnormal. The country looks really good going into this winter with plenty of winter grass for the cows and wildlife.



After a successful buffalo hunt in 2016, Fred Burd returned for a two day trophy antelope hunt with Pat Fiedor as his guide. On the morning of the first day, a good buck was spotted in the hay meadows. Fred showed he had extreme patience watching this buck for several hours just out of range from a haystack. The buck finally cooperated and came within range. Fred was presented with a long shot and found a solid rest on a

hay bale. This shot was successful and Fred was rewarded with the best antelope buck of the season scoring 84 2/8. We have enjoyed Fred's company over the years and look forward to seeing him and his wife at the 2019 SCI Convention.

Due to the Wyoming weather, our second week proved to be the most challenging of the season.

Returning hunters, Bill Etter and John Petersen booked the entire camp for the week to bring their families for their first Wyoming hunts. This group consisted of eight hunters. Bill also brought his young son Tony to experience the hunts. We had six trophy combo hunts and two management deer hunts. With the nature of this family hunt, the family rotated between Pat, Randall, and Mick as their guides. Day one was difficult for the hunters due to the rain turning to snow. This did not deter the hunt as Bill was able to take a real nice mature 6X6 mule deer with a non-typical score of 172. As the snow continued for day two, John's son Greg Petersen, shot a pretty antelope that scored an even 70. Bill's sister Jennifer Wilson, shot a 15" antelope that scored 76 1/8. Jennifer's daughter Corrine, made a successful stalk and made a great shot on an old management mule deer buck.

Day three was a busy day. We found a buck that was spotted









On the morning of day five, Greg put a stalk on a tall mule deer in



some pretty rough terrain. Greg made a nice shot on the 5X5 that scored 155 1/8. Getting the buck back to the truck was difficult due to the steep country. After several days of glassing deer and antelope, Bill's brother Charlie Etter,





took both his animals on the same day. Midday, Charlie found an antelope he liked and made a good shot.



The buck scored 75 even. That evening, Charlie was waiting for a mule deer to return to the hay field he had seen earlier. With only a few minutes of daylight left, the buck appeared and Charlie made a good shot. The buck was a 5X4 with two cheaters with a non-typical score of 172. There was an antelope that we watched



all summer that eluded us on the first week of the season. The buck finally made a mistake and Bobbie was able to make a good shot. This dandy buck scored 77 3/8. On day six, another

snowstorm hit the ranch. In heavy fog and snow, Jennifer was able to connect on a 4X4 mule deer that scored 148 1/8. This large group had a good hunt and everyone was successful in filling their tags. Again this year, Bill and John brought out fresh oysters from California for the whole camp to






enjoy. The Etter and Peterson family headed home one day early due to the bad weather. Bill and John are returning for the next few years and plans are for the family to return again at some point.

the first morning, Bill with Pat as his guide,



for quite some time. Tim made a nice shot on his management buck. Later that evening, Fred and Mick were able to locate a nice 5X5 mule deer. Fred made a great shot on the



buck. The buck ran down into a draw and died. This made for a challenging drag to get the buck to the truck. Fred's deer scored 154 3/8. Bill and Fred are returning next year for a bison hunt and all three

will be here in 2021 for another deer hunt.

The start of week three was still muddy and difficult to get around. Long time hunters Woody Porter and Phil Gaines returned for a couple of hunts. Woody's wife Angie came along as a non-hunter and Woody's son in law, Andrew Adamson came along for an

antelope hunt. On the first day, Andrew with Pat as his guide passed up numerous



young bucks that morning. Later that day, they found a herd of antelope that had migrated into the ranch with a real nice buck that hadn't

been seen before. Andrew made a great shot on a heavy horned antelope with big prongs that scored 79 4/8. Phil and Pat had found a really nice mule deer buck the first day. It wasn't until the third day they were able to get close enough to make a shot. Phil

made a very difficult shot which was successful. This buck was a 5X5 with four

cheater points with a non-typical score of 173 6/8. On day four, it was finally dry enough to get around and hunt the whole ranch. Woody and Pat found a nice 5X5 mule deer. Woody made a good shot and ended up with a nice trophy that scored 163 7/8. Woody is scheduled for a return trip in 2020.

Tony Nienas traveled in from Wisconsin for his first hunt with us. With Randall as his

guide, they hunted at the Clabaugh Ranch. After several days of glassing mule deer, Tony was able to shoot a nice buck on the fifth day. This buck was a 5X5 that scored 151 5/8. Tony enjoyed his hunt with us as he expressed that he saw numerous mule deer everyday. Tony is returning for another hunt in 2021.


is the classic case of never pass a buck on the first day that you would shoot on the last day. Although Don enjoyed his hunt, he wasn't able

The first stalk on the bedded buffalo was unsuccessful as they had moved. Another plan was put together and this one was

successful with Dan making a good shot on the number one buffalo of the year that scored 73

7/8. Dan enjoyed his hunt with us and left the next day.



Bill Hukill drove in from Michigan for a buffalo hunt. Bill hunted mule deer and antelope with us last year. Bill with Mick as his guide, found the buffalo on a windy cold morning. The first two stalks were unsuccessful as the terrain wouldn't allow them to get close enough. Finally, they were able to get within



range and out of the wind behind some rocks. Bill was able to make a good shot and put the bull down. Bill's trophy bull scored 68 2/8. Bill is returning to hunt mule deer and antelope in 2019.

Jay Koetsier and his good friend, John Rothlesburger as a non hunter drove in from California for a buffalo hunt. Jay with Pat as his guide found a pretty black haired buffalo that Jay really liked.
