SESSION 17. THE FIRETRAP OF OFFENSE

17.1	A firetrap is a building that, in the event of a fire, has means of escape.
17.2	The root of the Greek New Testament word σκάνδαλον (skandalon), that is translated "offense," "to sin," "stumbling block", etc., refers to the movable stick or trigger of a trap, or a trap stick; the place on a trap where the is placed.


