January's newsletter included an affordable and safe insect control spray. I've just finished a second round of spraying every plant, and as always, I am appalled at how quickly an



infestation can appear. Always check the underside of leaves, base of pseudobulbs, dry sheathing leaves. Although this spray is not a systemic insect killer, if used regularly, it will keep the little monsters at bay...safely. Thanks you Jeanne, for providing the formulation (1 Tbs Dr, Bronner's liquid peppermint castile soap, 1 cup alcohol, and water to fill a 2 qt sprayer)

Let's see, February is the time to think about repotting my Habenerias, because they seem to sprout any time from about late March through May. Twenty or thirty years ago, these frequently showy terrestrials (from Thailand, China, India & environs) were not so common and appreciated as they are now. Fortunately, these days there is an expanding number of hybrids and species from which to choose, and at least one of our spring show vendors (Edgar Stehli) will have a good selection.

Our ZOOM only February meeting is on the 14th, at 6:30 for Q and A, 7pm for the main meeting featuring Alex Minter speaking about those wonderful Australian orchids. Also, I will try to do show and tell at the beginning.

Orchid of the Month - Cattleya warscewiczii

This is one of my favorite orchids and, sadly, I do not grow it well. So here is a short course on growing it and why you want to do so.

Joseph Warscewicz discovered a large, stately flowered purple orchid in the mountains around Medellin, Colombia is 1848 then promptly lost his plants in shipping. Herbarium specimens, though, arrived safely in the hands of his friend, H.G. Reichenbach who published a proper description in 1854 in a German botanical publication Bonplandia and named the orchid Cattleya warscewiczii. For years though, if you found this orchid for sale or in a personal collection, it may have borne a tag that said Cattleya gigas, which means 'giant' and which was given by another botanist John Jules Linden who published in 1873, 19 years too late for his name to be the official one but which had the advantage of being easily pronounced so it stuck for quite a while as a horticultural name.

I can say with certainty that everyone who is reading this has seen *C. warscewiczii* on the covers of orchid magazines and orchid books, a dark purple cattleya instantly recognizable by two bright yellow 'eyes' at the base of the lip. What may not be apparent is the sheer size of the flowers; it is the king of the species, with flowers up to 12 inches petal tip to petal tip and up to 10 flowers per inflorescence, beautifully presented. There are two forms, distinguished by bloom time and size: one blooming late June to early July, with pseudobulbs about eight inches tall. The alba clone 'Firmin Lambeau' and purple 'Imperialis' are in this

group. The second Sanderiana form blooms late July to early August with taller pseudobulbs, larger flowers with darker lips. Both has the bright yellow eyes, of varying sizes, in a few plants the eyes more or less merge.

C. warscewiczii has only a few color forms: a true alba; a semi-alba (white with a colored lip), the most famous one being the clone 'Frau Melanie Beyrodt' and which was the parent of the classic cattleya C. Enid. There is also a coerulea form and some forms which could be considered blush.

Now for the hard part, hard because we orchid growers love to repot in the spring. Most of our cattleyas (and other orchids) are throwing new roots with abandon, having bloomed over the winter and spring. So, we repot, outside, a beer on the potting table next to us. Do not repot *C. warscewiczii* at this time; its new roots have been out for a while and even the most careful repotting technique will set the plant back.

Instead, follow this schedule: in late January, early February, put C. warscewiczii in bright light (without burning) and lightly spray pseudobulbs until the new eyes break. Leaves and pseudobulbs should be yellow-green. Keep spraying the plant until the new pseudobulbs are about 4 inches tall. Too much water at this stage appears to retard the plant's growth. After the pseudobulbs are taller than 4 inches, start regular watering but let the plant dry thoroughly between waterings. Be patient and just let the plant grow. After the flower sheaths and the developed buds start emerging, if daytime temperatures get above 90 degrees, try to move the plant to a cooler location. This will the inflorescence prevent drooping and not displaying the flowers well. After the flowers have faded, then repot. Do not wait because this is when the plant will throw its new roots for the next year from the newest pseudobulb. The plant also rests a long time after this

stage because of all the energy that went into flowering. This is what I usually forgot and then watched my plants falter. Get your timing right though and *C. warscewiczii* will reward you year after year.
