Orchid of the Month





Aerangis (air-ANG-giss) luteoalba syn rhodosticta (click on link above for pronunciation)

Known as The Beige Aerangis with Red Spots.

The genus Aerangis is in the Vanda Alliance and related to Angraecums. The species luteoalba has been awarded 63 times and used in creating 13 registered crosses.

Aerangis lutealba is an epiphytic cool to warm growing miniature to small sized orchid species that is native to equatorial Africa from Cameroon to Congo in the west through the central and western forests of Uganda to Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya in the east at 3000 to 5000 ft. elevations. Habitat is in forests along rivers under shaded light conditions (1200-2000-foot candles during summer months). They usually grow on twigs and branches of shrubs and sometimes on tree trunks and prefer moist conditions for good growth.

There are up to 25 or more very flat long-lasting sweet delicate fragrant flowers in two flat rows on a pendulous inflorescence. Crystalline flowers are 1" to 2" with colors that vary from


pure white, ivory white, cream or pale yellow with a bright scarlet or vermilion column which really makes the flower pop. Blooms throughout the year.

Aerangis lutealba is usually grown mounted to cork or other suitable substrate with sphagnum moss between its flattened roots and the substrate. Summer temperatures on average range from 56-81°F and 56-73°F during the winter. Plenty of air movement is required. Watering frequency will depend on how it is grown. Mounted plants may need watering daily to every third day with some influence from temperature levels. Potted plants should be watered at least twice a week during the summer which may depend on the type of media used. Relative humidity should be between 55-75% depending on the time of year. Spanish moss may be draped over roots to help retain moisture for absorption.


