

For our June meeting we will join with MVOS to hear our planned speaker, Peter Lin of Diamond Orchids, over Zoom on Wednesday, June 10 at 7:00 PM.

Mini-Catts: Delightful Cattleyas in Miniature

Peter T. Lin will be presenting a talk on one of his favorite topics: Mini-Catts, also known as miniature Cattleyas. Peter will be sharing a fast-paced Powerpoint presentation on these charming orchids. The journey will begin with a review of the miniature species, early hybrids, and then to some of the relevant hybrids of today. He will also review how to grow these wonderful plants.

Peter started growing orchids over 30 years ago, but then stopped due to school and starting a career. It wasn't until about 14 years ago that the orchid "bug" came back and he is now heavily involved once again. He is an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society and a hybridizer of mini-catts. He enjoys meeting with other orchid enthusiasts and can often be found at various orchid shows and societies around the country. Orchid of the Month Angraecum (an-graY-kum) ... sesquipedale (ses-kwi-peh-daY-lee) Darwin's orchid, Christmas orchid, Star of Bethlehem orchid, and King of the Angraecums

The hawk moth Xanthopan morganii praedicta uses its long, specially adapted proboscis to pollinate the Madagascar star orchid (Angraecum sesquipedale).

Angraecum sesquipedale grows in the lowlands of Madagascar. *In situ* it grows on trees at the edges of forests at altitudes below 500 feet. It is found in regions with heavy rainfall (150 inches per year). It has a continuous growing season blooming from June to September. In cultivation

it blooms from December to January getting the name "Christmas Orchid"


Flowers are large (up to 7 inches), star-like and waxy with a long (10 to 18 inches) green spur. Its species name sesquipedale in Latin means "a foot and a half" and refers to the length of the spur. When the flowers first open, they are green turning white with age. As the flower begins to wilt, it turns yellow, then orange and ultimately brown.

The plant gets its name "King of the Angraecums" from its large plant size getting over 3 feet in height in cultivation with leaves over a foot long. Best growing conditions are intermediate to high light (Cattleya), humidity of 50-70%, temperatures 70-80 degrees F and prefer a temperature drop at night of 10-15 degrees. For



best blooming the light intensity should be high in September and November. They should seldom be repotted as their roots dislike being disturbed. When potting becomes necessary, the potting mix should be a very coarse mix that can dry quickly or may be mounted.

The plant has a strong, spicy fragrance at night. As such, it is moth pollinated. Longer spurs have higher concentrations of nectar. *Angraecum sesquipedale* pollination methods make it one of the most historically interesting species. In 1798, Louis-Marie Aubert du Petit-Thouars, a French botanist discovered it, but it was not described until 1822. But in 1862, Charles Darwin received a group of orchids from Madagascar. When he saw the length of the spur of



Angraecum sesquipedale, he predicted that a moth with a long proboscis must be its pollinator. He surmised that they must have evolved together. It took 150 years for the moth to be found and Darwin did not live to see its discovery. In 1903, the hawk moth, Xanthopan morganii praedicta. was by Walter discovered in Madagascar Rothschild and Karl Jordan. It was finally photographed pollinating Angraecum sesquipedale.


