Our Zoom meeting will start at 6:30 with society members Show-and-Tell and Q & A. The presentation will start at 7.




Bill Goldner, Ph. D.

The Conservation Committee Survey Results

Thanks to everyone who participated in the online survey by voting for the recipient of the GCOS Conservation donation for 2021! Your input was greatly appreciated in deciding between the 3 excellent options.

The winner is the Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust!

Highly recommended by Brenda Oviatt during Orchid Fest, the Trust's focus is on "Rewilding Our World". In other words, by restoring biomes or habitats, species are best preserved. Brenda was distressed that her favorite orchids, Angraecoids, are regularly becoming extinct in Madagascar. Lee Durrell from American Friends of Durrell wrote to GCOS: "Madagascar is our biggest field program. We are working on species and habitats in at least six sites, all of which have wild orchids, so they will certainly be benefiting from our activities."

Since the Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust (DWCT) is based in Britain, donations are collected in British pounds. American Friends of Durrell is the non-profit organization that accepts donations in US dollars for the work of DWCT. GCOS sent the donation in December 2021.

Again, we appreciated your involvement in the decision.

Orchid of the Month Bulbophyllum medusae





Bulbophyllum bulb-oh-FILL-um medusae

The genus *Bulbophyllum* is in the Tribe Dendrobieae. *Bulbophyllum*s are closely related to the genus *Cirrhopetalum*. *Bulbophyllum* has currently over 2000 accepted species. The genus has been separated into 120 sections and subgenera. The genus was described by Louis-Marie Aubert Du Petit-Thouars in 1822. The name *Bulbophyllum* comes from the ancient Greek words bulbos (bulb) and phyllon (leaf).

Bulbophyllum medusae has been awarded 28 times by the American Orchid Society. There have been 15 crosses made using medusae. Named after the mythological Medusa's hair head full of snakes. Most Bulbophyllums are found in Asia. Bulbophyllum medusae is found in Southeast Asia growing in lowland forests in upper and lower areas of the canopy. They grow in shaded to dappled light conditions.

Bulbophyllum medusae has ovoid to pear shaped sometimes slightly curved pseudobulbs that are spaced far apart on the rhizome. Each pseudobulb has a rigid leathery leaf which can be up to 8 "long. The inflorescence emerges from the base of the pseudobulb. Bulbophyllum medusae is named for its threadlike tails at the tips of the lateral sepals. Flowers have a yellowish lip and can be up to 6 "long. Blossoms are yellow to white with scattered pink to red spots and have a give off a musty odor. Well grown specimen plants can have over 6000 flowers.

Bulbophyllum medusae is a hot growing small epiphytic orchid species. Day temperatures average 85 – 91°F and night temperatures average 71 - 73°F. Grow in moderate shade, filtered or diffused light conditions between 1500–2500-foot candles. Plenty of air movement is recommended. Relative

humidity should be at least 85%. Water and fertilizer frequency will depend on when it is actively growing and its growing conditions. Water mounted plants daily every other day or more frequently if humidity is low. Dilute the strength of the fertilizer to about ¼ to ½ the strength recommended and fertilize weekly during the growing season and otherwise every other week.

Bulbophyllum medusae is best grown mounted on tree-fern or cork slab or baskets/pots if humidity is difficult to maintain. Media must be fast draining. In nature they bloom in Fall-Winter but has been known to bloom during other times in North America and may bloom multiple times during the growing season. Flowers stay open for three or more weeks.
