How's your orchid growing journey progressing? If you have plants outside, a trip to snatch them from frost is in order, if not done already. Check them for bugs, as some like to crawl into the pots, especially if they are on or near the ground.

If your path is similar to mine and others, you will be discovering new and different varieties for your collection. I still like the same ones I've had for years but lately I've added Habenaria, Bulbophyllum and assorted "odd-balls" to the mix. Some of the bulbos have noteworthy characteristics: B. tremulum has floral parts which quiver in a breeze, B. hirundinis as bright orange/red flowers which are slender and fringy at the top. Then there are the stinkers. I recently bought a B. levanae, and when I finally went to IOSPE on the web, I found out that it is one of the malodorous dudes of the orchid family... just like the human family! A grateful thank you to "Mother Nature" for producing all of the botanical treasures of the planet.

Speakers being considered for "23" include Mark Van Der Woerd (basement tent growing), Ron Parsons, our own Matthew Speights, Edgar Stehli (Windswept in Time) Leon Glicenstein and Eric Sauer. Conservation Committee Report

Remember in 2021 when you took part in a contest? Three societies were voted on, to decide which group the GCOS would award our \$100 yearly Orchid Conservation Coalition donation. Well, the top two choices were very close. So this year the Conservation Committee decided our contribution should go to last year's runner up. The Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden is part of the Exceptional Plant Conservation Network. The network list of exceptional plants includes over 26 species of orchids, most of which are on the list because their seeds are short-lived. To increase the longevity of these seeds CZBG and the Exceptional Plant Conservation Network uses cryopreservation, freezing them at extremely low temperatures.



To the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden

Each year the Greater Cincinnati Orchid Society donates \$100 to further conservation efforts as a supporter of the Orchid Conservation Coalition. We are impressed with the conservation efforts of the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden especially as part of the Exceptional Plant Conservation Network. Species of orchids are on the list of exceptional plants, most of which because their seeds are short-lived. To increase the longevity of these seeds we want to be a small part of CZBG and the Exceptional Plant Conservation Network using cryopreservation.



Orchid of the Month Habenaria *rhodocheila*

The genus *Habenaria* is in the tribe Orchideae. Orchideae has currently over 1800 accepted species. About 880 species of Habenaria have been described and have been found in tropical and subtropical zones on every continent with exception of Antarctica.

The genus *Habenaria* was first formally described by Carl Ludwig Willdenow in 1805. The name *Habenaria* comes from the Latin word habena which means"strap" or "reins". The common name for Habenaria is Bog Orchid or Rein Orchid. Habenaria *rhodocheila* is known as the Red-Lipped *Habenaria*.

Habenaria rhodocheila has been awarded 85 times by the American Orchid Society and is



the most awarded species in the genus. There have been at least 20 crosses made using *rhodocheila*. *Habenaria rhodocheila* is found in South-Central and Southeast China, Laos, Cambodia, Assam, Malaya, Myanmar, Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam. *Habenaria rhodocheila* is widespread and can be found growing up to 3600 ft elevations. They usually grow as terrestrials but can be found growing as lithophytes on mossy rocks. Growth initiates from underground tubers. They grow in dappled light to bright indirect light conditions.

There are unusually 5 -16 flowers on each inflorescence opening up from the bottom to the top. Flower size is from 1-2" in diameter with the lip being the most prominent feature of the flower. Flowers can be scarlet or brick-red to orange and coral to pink and yellow. A well grown specimen plant can have up to 450 flowers. Flowers can last for 2-3 weeks. Dorsal sepals and petals are greenish in color. A nectary spur that is approximately 2" long extends downward and backward from the base of the lip. Green leaves with a network of dark veins can be up to 5" long and become smaller towards the end of the stem. Usually, 6 leaves are found at the base of the plant. The leaves are deciduous (drop off) after each growing season which is typically in the Fall in the Northern Hemisphere. The plant goes into a dormant phase until new growth arises from a tuber in the spring.

Habenaria rhodocheila is a cool to warm growing orchid species. Summer day temperatures average 84-87°F and night temperatures average 71-71°F. Winter day temperatures average 81-87°F and nights can be as low as 53°F. Grow in shaded to dappled light conditions between 1500-2300 foot candles. Plenty of air movement is recommended. Relative humidity should be at least 85% during the summer and 60% during the winter months. Water and fertilizer frequency will depend on when it is actively growing and its growing conditions. Water at least twice a week during the summer with a weekly light misting on the soil surface during the winter/dormant phase. Potting mix should be moist but not soggy and slightly dry between waterings. Do not overwater because this will increase the chance for tuber rot. Dilute the strength of the fertilizer to about ¼ to ½ the strength recommended and

fertilize weekly during the growing season and discontinue fertilizing in winter during the rest/dormant cycle.

Habenaria rhodocheila is best grown in plastic or clay pots no more than 6" deep. Any good terrestrial soil mix that is fast draining is ideal. Repot in the late winter to early spring before new shoots are too large and easily damaged and it gives the tuberous roots a chance to not be disturbed sooner than they have to.
