

Although this book is sometimes characterized as a prison narrative, Byers also described his experiences on such fields as Shiloh, Corinth and Vicksburg." - Krick. 



Frontis of Fox Volume I, Frontis of Farragut Volume II with a full page portrait of Admiral Porter. A limited numbered edition of 1200 copies. Fox was assistant Secretary of the Navy during entire war. His correspondence begins with the attempted relief of Fort Sumter. Much material on the South Atlantic and west Gulf blockading squadron. Included are letters of L.M. Goldsborough concerning the expedition against Roanoke Island, NC and the campaign in the sounds of NC. "Undocumented letters that reveal a great deal about Union naval operations during the war." – Civil War Books.

A most attractive set of books with white vellum spines and gray boards stamped in gold. First edition, interiors clean and tight, white vellum, spines not darkened as has been the case with all sets we've previously offered, retains fragile glassine dust wraps, which are incomplete and wrinkled. You discard them, seems we can't throw anything away. The limitation numbers don't match, per usual, in original shipping boxes. The Naval History Society which published this set jumbled the volumes together and never were able to match up limitation numbers. One time I purchased 100 plus sets and didn't find a single pair of matching volumes. Accompanied by Marshall Krolick's uncommon 55 page mimeographed index. *The best set we've offered in 51 years, probably the best set there is.* \$300.00

#23 Harper's Weekly 1860-1865

23. HARPER'S WEEKLY: A Journal of Civilization. New York 1860-1865. Vol. IV - No. 158 January 7, 1860 through Vol. IX – No. 470 December 30, 1865. Volumes IV (1860) through IX (1865). 6 volumes. 11¹/₂" x 16¹/₂". Professionally bound by year, January 1860 through December 1865 with all weekly issues present. 5 volumes are bound in brown cloth, 1 in black. Gold lettering on spine. "Harper's Weekly was an American political magazine published from 1857 until 1916, featuring foreign and domestic news, fiction, essays on many subjects, and humor. During its most influential period it was the forum of the political cartoonist Thomas Nast. By 1860 the Weekly's circulation had reached 200,000. Illustrations were an important part of the Weekly's content, and it developed a reputation for employing some of the most renowned illustrators, notably Winslow Homer, Granville Perkins and Livingston Hopkins. So as not to upset its wide readership in the South, Harper's took a moderate editorial position on the issue of slavery. It supported the Stephen A. Douglas presidential campaign against Abraham Lincoln, but as the American Civil War broke out, Lincoln and the Union received full and loyal support of the publication. Arguably, some of the most important articles and illustrations came from the Weekly's reporting on the war. Besides renderings by Homer and Nast, Harper's also published illustrations by Theodore R. Davis, Henry Mosler, and the brothers Alfred Waud and William Waud." 11¹/₂" x 16¹/₂". Widely acclaimed for its illustrations and promising literary works in serial installments. The superb period reporting and artist's illustrations provide contents in these Weekly Magazine volumes include articles, poems, essays, and exceptional illustrations by noted authors and illustrators of the day. These editions feature the illustrated serials Armadale by Wilkie Collins and Our Mutual Friend by Charles Dickens. Interesting articles on the Social Life of China, Teheran, Nevada, Oxford University, the Pozzuoli and Vesuvius volcanoes, and hundreds of others. Major Civil War related coverage and articles include: Four Years Under Fire at Charleston, Jefferson Davis, Dirge for the Fallen, Recollections of General Grant, Abraham Lincoln, Sherman's Great March, Recollections of General Sheridan, and more.

Noted illustrations of Abraham Lincoln's funeral [issue #436 May 6, 1865], Execution of Lincoln conspirators [issue #447 July 22, 1865, African slave ship "Wildfire" [issue #179 June 2, 1860]. Many 2-page center illustrations. Volumes V-VIII [years 1861-1864] provide an Index to illustrations and a General Index in the front of the bound volume. Volumes IV [1860] and IX [1865] do not have Index.

Volume IV [1860] is in exceptional condition. Volumes V-IX [1861-1865] have few minimally repaired pages. Some issues have a very small yellow sticker [approximately 1" x $\frac{1}{4}$ "] identifying "436 L. Boisot 323" which probably identified a subscriber. Clean and tight in bindings. Harper's was issued in two formats. 15" x 23" and 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". This version is preferable as it is not as unwieldy; much easier to house and use. Bookplate on inside front cover of Nathan B. Krausman, Chicago entrepreneur, portraying a medieval typesetter. *This is the best set we have offered in 51 years*.

This is a heavy set. Pick up or delivery to a show would be best for this 6-volume set. \$7,000.00




