Forrest); Congressional and Senatorial letters to Jessica Smith; letters pertaining to the erection of planned memorials and the entombment of soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery; invitations to and programs of official functions in Washington, D. C.; Congressional Bills and Resolutions pertaining to Civil War archives; items pertaining to the Flag Presentation at the Washington Cathedral and the National Defense Conference; letters, invitations and programs relating to various associations and societies, such as the Colonial Dames, Daughters of the American Revolution, Daughters of 1812, Daughters of the Cincinnati, and the Lee Memorial Fund; official Stone Mountain Memorial letters and material pertaining to the sculptor Borglum; historical events pamphlets, including a George Washington Memorial Association item complete with the artist's plans and photo of the Washington Mall; personal letters pertaining to Father Ryan, Confederate Chaplain from the recipient of his papers; and booklets, speeches, and miscellaneous documentation acknowledging O. R. Smith as the designer of the *Stars and Bars*.

In addition to documentation pertaining to the designer of the *Stars and Bars*, there are also evidentiary items indicating that Miss Smith possibly succeeded in influencing the sculptor Gutzon Borglum (the Mt. Rushmore sculptor) to carve the features of her father into the color-bearer representing North Carolina at Gettysburg. There is also evidence that Miss Smith attempted to convince Borglum, to similarly represent her father in the Stone Mountain Memorial; however Borglum was fired from that project before it was completed.

Miss Smith tenaciously labored for many years to legitimize her father as the sole designer of the original *Stars and Bars*. In her quest to have her father appropriately honored, she amassed an impressive accumulation of provenance, as well as unique and interesting early 20th-century ephemera. With spunk and the capacity to enlist authoritative friends and dignitaries in high places to zealously aid in the cause of having her father properly indorsed, Jessica Smith has created a lasting tribute to Orren Randolph Smith

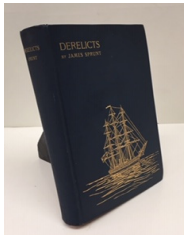
