Dornbusch II, NC(C)-722. *In Tall Cotton #24*. Civil War Books I-70. Illustrated with portraits, maps (some folding), plans and plates, front boards stamped with Confederate flag in color. "Regimental sketches vary in quality, but the work fully merits Douglas S. Freeman's classification as one of the most indispensable works for the Army of Northern Virginia." – *Civil War Books*. "...a historical undertaking of a magnitude matched by no other single state." – *In Tall Cotton*. "Probably ranks next after O.R., S.H.S.P. and B&L in value for the student of the Army of Northern Virginia." – Freeman. Most of the sets of Clark that have survived have been in libraries and thus have been heavily used, often rebound, with library markings. "The appeal of Stonewall Jackson is evident in the number of good biographies of him, and equally as many poor ones. The earliest of any importance was John Esten Cooke's, published in Richmond in 1863..." – *In Tall Cotton*. Cooke wrote on May 12, 1863, only a few days after Jackson's death: "I have been incessantly engaged on the 'Life of Stonewall Jackson' having in about a week or ten days, got him through the Battle of Cedar Run. Rarely have I worked so hard." His book was published in Richmond, VA, August 1863 and its publishers sold 3,000 copies on its first day. It was pirated almost immediately in New York and London and banned by a Federal army order for the Department of Ohio. 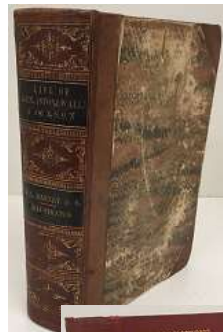

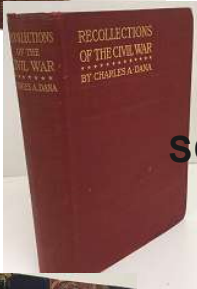

Curtis mustered in with the Sixteenth New York Infantry as a Captain on May 15, 1861 to serve two years in the Sixteenth New York Infantry. Mustered out October 21, 1862 to become Lt.Col. of the 142nd NYI. Mustered in as Lt.Col. 142nd NYI 22 Oct. 1862. Colonel, 142nd NYI 21 Jan. 1863. Brig. Gen. U.S.V. 24 Jan. 1865. Awarded the Medal of Honor on November 28, 1891 for bravery during the battle for Ft. Fisher, North Carolina on January 15, 1865 as “the first man to pass through the stockade, he personally led each assault on the traverses and was 4 times wounded.” First edition, a fine tight bright copy, blue cloth in gilt with red cross on front cover; dust jacket, signed with compliments of Newton Martin, laid-in Document “No.52 Statement exhibiting the allowance of clothing provided by Captain Newton Martin Curtis to each soldier during his enlistment and his proportion for each year respectively, as established by the Secretary of War”, 18" x 2'. 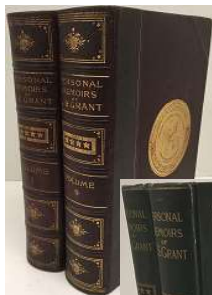

Archibald Gracie (1858-1912) wrote the Chickamauga book in large part to defend his father and namesake. Soon after it reached print in 1911, Archie went sailing on the *Titanic*. His documentation for *Chickamauga* apparently went down with the ship, and several sources (including some available on line in 2020) say that Archie went down with the *Titanic* himself. In fact, he survived and hurriedly published *The Truth about the Titanic*, which has remained in print ever since, albeit under several other titles. Gracie died late in 1912, which no doubt contributed to the notion that he drowned with Leonard DiCaprio. First edition, interior clean and tight, slightly scuffed.
